COMMODORE'S COMMENTS BY BILL SHAW

As we begin a new season, let us all remember the primary purpose of our existence. . . "to promote the safe enjoyment of recreational and competitive boating and sailing." To that end, I encourage all of you to continue to provide the "leadership-by-good-example" that OYC has become known for over the past year. Fly your burgee (more soon to be available) proudly and remind

others that we welcome them as prospective OYC members. Observe the new no wake zone from the town of Occoquan to well past marker 12, and even then please watch your wake, especially in the narrow channel out to Occoquan Bay. Large wakes are hazardous to the environment as well as other boaters. Repeated high wakes can and will erode the shore line and fill in the channel which will have a negative effect on us all.

The Occoquan will see more traffic this year than ever before as boats from 8 to 50 feet regularly transit our once quiet river. Estimates are that over 200 boats will pass under the route 1 bridge each Saturday and Sunday, with about half of these trailer launched. Obviously safe navigation is a must. A good knowledge of, and strict compliance with, the rules of the road is required. The "rule of good seamanship" and "general prudential rule," which both equate to "use common sense" are very important. Remember that large boats may take several boat lengths to stop or turn and may not be able to avoid smaller craft, especially in our narrow channel. Think out each maneuver ahead, evaluate pros and cons, and then proceed safely.

- A considerate move on the part of sailboaters is to tie their halyards so they don't clang against the mast in the wind. Some feel this is "music to their ears," but many boaters like peace and quiet at night in their anchorage or slip. Besides, the lines won't wear out as fast if tied with a bungee cord.
- It is rumored that some states, if not the Feds, are planning to instigate mandatory licensing of boaters similar to motor vehicles. Many organizations and individual boaters support such a plan, although it is said that manufacturers are opposed. There are some irresponsible people which this law may curb. What are your feelings? When I receive more information, I'll pass it on to you for your consideration.
- If any sport has an array of "gadgets" ours sure does. Just browse through the many catalogs available and "eat your heart out!"
- Prince William Marina in Occoquan has just received a large shipment of assorted Sperry Topsiders. What impressed me was the variety of styles and colors available. Don't forget you get a 10% discount as a member of OYC. Also, Jerry's Rings 'N Things in downtown Occoquan offers the same discount to members.
- Most organizations give a pitch for help and we're no exception. There are alot of jobs to be done in order to function as a club and to be viable. Most of them are one-shot deals during one day or part thereof. If you want to "get involved" please let me or any of the other Flag Officers know of your intention. Besides, we have fun doing things together.
- PET OWNERS! Please, please keep your dogs leashed. It could happen that they knock against someone, especially a child, and that person could fall off the dock with resultant litigation. Also, the dog walk area is the treed area in the rear of the lot, NOT the grassy area by the docks. People in bare feet could pick up parasites.

- The following areas are where Dave Robinson and Crew are placing NO WAKE signs: By Marker 12, (2); midway between marker 12 and the railroad bridge (4); on the route 95 bridge (2); on the small island by Hoffmaster's (2), and on the route 123 bridge (4). The signs will probably be meaningless at first to many of the "hotrodders" so it's still incumbent for all members to remind boaters of their responsibility concerning wakes.
- Dick Kelly (Queen Bee) is coordinating an 'escort for the Irish Ship Asgard II which should arrive on Thursday May 9th on its way to DC. If you would like to be part of this escort, contact Dick at 455-7389 evenings or 455-9455 during the day.
- You should have been on the river during the middle of March as several members turned out to welcome the Petry's and their new 38' Bayliner, "Equinox" and the Hampton's with thir new 28' Bayliner "Kukala." Champagne flowed and applause was heard upon their arrival.
- If you've been reading the literature you are aware of some fuel companies adding alcohol to the gasoline. This in turn can create a safety hazard since it deteriorates gas lines and gaskets on boats with a resultant leak and possible explosion. I have been informed by the management at Prince William Marina that their gasoline (Shell) is free of such substances. However, we have been told Texaco does. BEWARE!! Remember to keep your gas receipts for a tax refund next year.
- The club will soon be and maintaining a small shed to store club supplies such as race markers, coolers, water skis, crab pots and other paraphernalia we've accumulated. Several members have donated nautical items for the use of the club and we will accept usable materials for club use.

- Have you checked your rigging and/or lines? If they're frayed replace them before you experience trouble. It's always a good idea to have several lines in storage for emergencies such as towing.
- Pretty soon many in the area will be traversing the Potomac for after-work hours dinner and watching the sunsets. Some beautiful pictures can be obtained. Keep your camera loaded.

FIRST CRUISE OF THE YEAR BY REAR COMMODORE FOR POWER JOHN PIPER

Set aside the weekend of 18/19 May for the Flag Raising Ceremony at the Prince William Marina followed by the first OYC cruise of the year! The Flag Raising is scheduled for 1200 on Saturday the 18th of May after which we get underway for an overnight at the Dunes (Mattawoman Creek).

What's the appeal for a trip to the Dunes? It can only be reached by water so it's boaters only. Sandy beaches. Good anchoring spots. Bonfire on the beach for marshmallows or romance or ghost stories. Raft-ups. Tall stories. Bad jokes. A good time.

We plan to rendezvous at the mouth of the Mattawoman between 1530 and 1600 (that's between 3:30 pm and 4:00 pm for you non-military types) after the flag raising. Remember, May is daylight savings time. This will give the slower boats time to cross the Potomac and round up into the Mattawoman between buoys #46 and #47. Just beyond daymarker "1" (if it's still there) on the South side of the entrance to the creek is a good anchorage in 5 to 7 feet. Meet there with the OYC gang before proceeding up the creek in convoy.

Why the convoy? Two good reasons. First, it is impressive to any onlookers with all the OYC burgees flying. Call it "presence." Second, and most important, the convoy allows us to help each other in case of breakdown, grounding, etc. Those of us who have never been to the Dunes need to follow someone who has. THE CHARTS ARE WRONG. If the convoy has already left, late comers are always welcome to join us if you know the route (a radio call will get you a "talk-in").

We need to know how many boats will be joining us, so please indicate to any of the OYC officers if you plan to partake in this adventure. The Club will provide the firepit bricks and barbeque tools. If you want to eat or drink anything, bring it! We are trying to scrounge the firewood. If you know of a stash, or want to help gather, see Aaron Martin on the "Maggie Lynn."

Once we are firmly swinging on the hook (or firmly aground until the next mornings' high tide) "Attitude Readjustment" will commence. But, please stay off the sauce until we arrive. Safety in these narrow channels requires a clear head. Make sure you have fenders and lines available for rafting. Check your ground tackle out before you leave. Did you safety wire your anchor shackle? (That's "safety" twice in one paragraph. Think about it.)

As a final note--it was just this kind of a trip to the Dunes in 1983 that resulted in the formation of the OYC. Great things happen there!

Sailors--if you want to sharpen you sailing skills be advised that Neabsco Sailing Club (NSC) is sponsoring a spring tune-up series of races to which OYC sailors are invited. The races will be held on April 21st, 28th and May 5th. Entry forms will be available at the committee boat each race day from 11:30 am until race start (1:00 pm). The cost is a minimal \$5.00 for the series. Normally two races will be held each race day, but if the wind is fair and time permits, there may be more. The committee boat will be anchored about 1/2 mile south of buoy 51. If you want rules for the races, I will have copies on board the "Maggie Lynn" if you care to stop by. Let's win a trophy for OYC. NSC is also sponsoring a full blown Open Regatta 11/12 May to which we're also invited. See me or Bill Shaw for more details. let's participate!

Don't forget--Flag Raising day is approaching, with an overnight to the "Dunes" at Mattawoman. If you have international flags, be sure to fly them from the mast during the flag ceremony. If you don't have them, they are available from Boat US for less than \$60.00. Great way to pretty up your vessel for those "special occasions and holidays." The recommended order of flying the flags is: AB2, UJ1, KE3, GH6, IV5, FL4, DM7, PO3rd repeater, RN1st repeater, ST0, CK9, WQ8, ZY2nd repeater

All Boaters beware!! Failure to have emergency flares on board, when underway, with a valid expiration date will result in a \$25.00. Coast Guard informs me this is new this year. CHECK THOSE EXPIRATION DATES!!

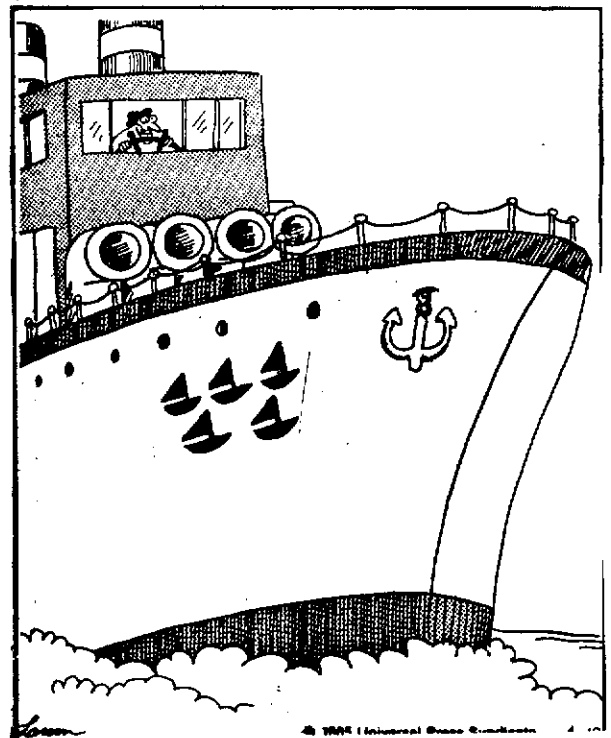

VISIT OF THE "DANMARK"

The big news is the arrival of the Tall Ships! The present schedule for these ships is:

4/19 - 4/24	"Danmark" - 196 Foot Full Rigged Sail Ship
4/19 - 4/25	"Mystic Clipper" - 128 Foot Baltimore Clipper
4/19 - 4/26	"Dove" - 68 Foot Historic Replica
4/19 - 4/24	"Alexandria" - 128 Foot Baltic Schooner
4/19 - 4/24	"Western Union" - 134 Foot Schooner

The visit of the "Danmark" marks the 45th Anniversary of its having been turned over by the Danish Government during the Second World War to the United States Government. The ship was then used as a training vessel by the Coast Guard and over 5,000 men and women were trained aboard her during the War years. A great effort has been made and many, many of these 5,000 have been located and invited to Washington for this occasion. The "Danmark" and all of the escort vessels will be arriving in Washington on Friday, 19 April. She will pass Fort Washington about 0920 where she will receive a 21 gun salute. She is scheduled to pass through the Wilson Bridge at 1020 and proceed up the river and into the Washington Channel, receiving another 21 gun salute as she passes Fort McNair, and be docked at the Police Pier. During her stay in Washington, there will be many activities and she will be open to the public for tours on Saturday and Sunday, as will be the escort vessels, most of which will be docked at the Gangplank Marina.

The departure date and time for the "Danmark" is Wednesday, 24 April at 1830. All yacht clubs and boaters are being encouraged to participate in a welcoming floating parade on her arrival (and departure).

OYC members desiring to join in escorting "Danmark" please contact Vice Commorore Gene Fichter who will lead our contingent in "Preface."

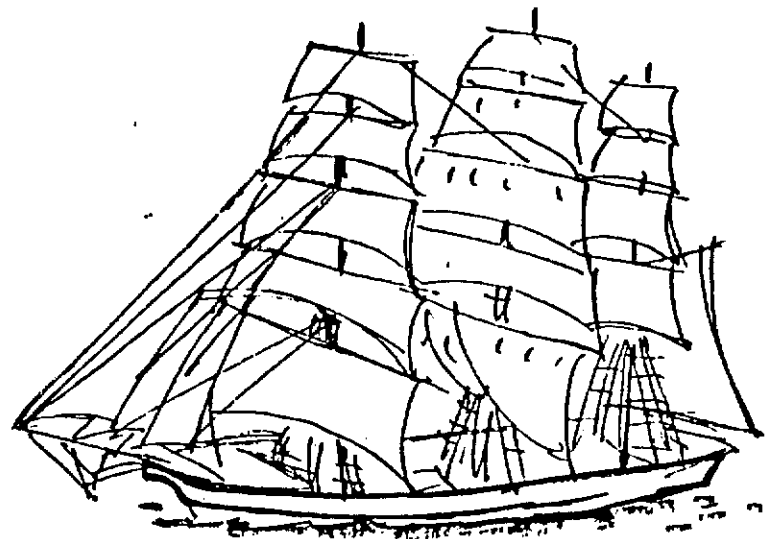

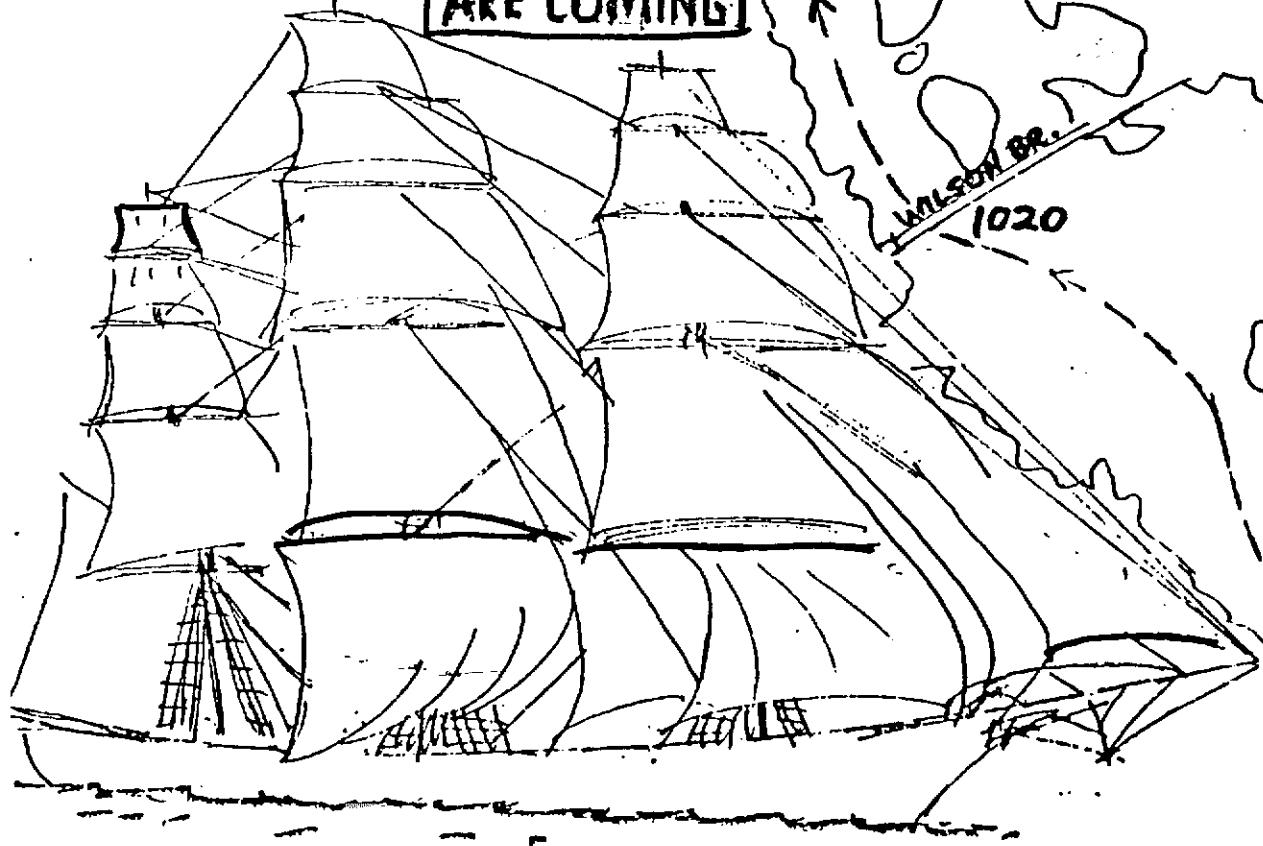

GALLEY NOTES BY LYNN MARTIN

Spring is the beginning of the boating season, so let's start with the beginning of a picnic meal. Prepare an attractive combination of some of the following fresh, firm, raw summer vegetables, selecting them for complementary combinations of taste, texture and color:

-cherry tomatoes, washed, with stems--green peppers, washed, peeled, and cut into strips or wedges--cauliflower "flowers" or broccoli "flowers" washed and broken or cut into bite-sized pieces--carrots or celery stalks cut into sticks--red or white radishes cut decoratively halved or served whole--fresh asparagus spears (tender tips only)--button-sized mushrooms trimmed and dried--cucumbers and zucchini peeled or unpeeled and cut into sticks

To keep vegetables crisp, store in the refrigerator in jars or containers filled with cold water; add a few ice cubes to the water to assure crispness. Store the strong-smelling vegetables (broccoli, radishes, and cauliflower) and the mushrooms separately so that flavors and textures will remain distinct. (Wrap the washed mushrooms in a paper towel, and store in a plastic bag.) Drain and carry to the boat in separate plastic bags or jars; store in a cooler so they will not become limp.

To serve, arrange decoratively on a platter, and place a bowl of dip, or several different dips, in the center. The dip recipes that follow are particularly good with raw vegetables.

Rita Jacobs gives us two versions of her favorite dip which she swears is simple enough for anyone to fix.

DIP FOR RAW VEGETABLES

16 oz of Sour Cream
1 Pkg of Ranch House Party Dip

Thoroughly mix together all ingredients. (Rita's right; you can't get much simpler)

For those among us who are trying to fit into last years swimsuit, Rita suggests using plain yoguurt instead of sour cream and leave the mixture in the refrigerator for a day.

The next vegetable dip comes from my Wolf Trap Picnic Cookbook

ROQUEFORT DIP

3-4 Tablespoons Roquefort or Blue Cheese
3 Tablespoons Cream Cheese, softened
1 1/2 Tablespoons Mayonnaise
1/2 Cup Sour Cream
1 to 1 1/2 Tablespoons Cognac

In a small bowl, blend together the Roquefort, cream cheese, mayonnaise, and sour cream. Add cognac to taste. Sprinkle the mixture with paprika to decorate, and chill. (NOTE: without the sour cream, this makes a good stuffing for celery stalks.)

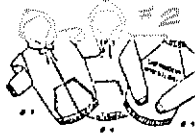
