

Now for a few BOATING bits. If you've already laid up for the winter, you have missed some FANTASTIC boating. You can maneuver it in the cramped spaces of your bilge, drain the oil into it and then be able to shape it as necessary so you can get it back out.

<u>Vice Commodore's</u> <u>Comments</u> Terri Petrey

As we come to the end of another boating season, it's hard to believe that two weeks ago we had 16" of snow!!! A few boats at the marina sustained some minor damage, (POWER PLAY among the group) most of it being bent canvas top supports due to the incredible weight of the snow. Although our Dockmaster, Dickie Lynn, said he tried to keep up with the boats who looked the worst, it was a battle fought in vain. There was just too much snow at one time! Case in point. For the smaller boats with 6 to 9 foot beams there are available on the market canvas supports to keep your covers taut and free of water and snow collecting pockets. Look through your Boat U.S. catalogs and get some rail bow sockets or some die cast bow sockets. Also needed are wood bow supports or adjustable wooden bow supports. Installation is easy and you can be almost assured that in the Spring you won't be going out and buying new canvas support poles.

For the larger boats with beams 10' and up Boat U.S. has come up with new adjustable cover support poles which are rubber tipped and telescope and lock for different cover sizes. My husband Bill, who is really handy when it comes to wood working skills, has devised a support system with wooden right angles which support the entire center seam of the slant cover making it almost impossible for anything to stay on the cover. A similar support was placed under the canvas support over the console.

Now these precautions still won't make our boats entirely exempt from future damage -- they are like I said <u>precautions</u>. The only way to make sure that everything is alright is for you to come down to your boat and check it out personally. We can't all get to our boats immediately after a snow but at least we will know that we have done something to at least help in preserving our boats until we can get to them. If anything drastic is happening we can be assured that Dickie or John and Merilyn Piper will give us a call warning us of any problem.

For me, in addition to thoughts of food, I have to now worry about getting the boats out of the water and winterized. Before joining OYC, I thought the boating season was over in October. This year I discovered that the river is beautiful during early November and I am still hoping to get out that "one last time".

The newly elected Executive Board met on November 18th to discuss a number of issues. Most of the issues concerned the upcoming social events such as the Chili Cookoff, boat lighting, Santa to Occoquan and the Change of Command and Christmas Party.

There were three other topics discussed at the board meeting that might be of general interest. First, OYC sends copies of the <u>Daymarker</u> to other clubs and organizations in the area. This year, we have asked these organizations to return a postcard verifying their current address. Organizations that return a postcard will be kept on the mailing list and those that do not return a postcard will be dropped. Note, that as always, each <u>member</u> of OYC will receive a copy of the Daymarker.

Secondly, the Board spent some time discussing Club property. In the past, some of the Club property was kept in the shed at the marina and some was kept at member's homes or boats. The Board agreed that a complete inventory of Club property would be done in order to identify the property and to determine its present location.

Thirdly, the Board discussed the make-up of the Club. When the Club was formed, the majority of the membership were "rag baggers". Over the years, this has shifted and currently the majority of the membership have "stink pots". The Club's

purpose, as stated in the By-Laws, is "to promote the enjoyment of recreational and competitive boating AND sailing". The Board is concerned about this apparent shift and we would be happy to consider any input from the membership on the topic. The most obvious solution would be for each of us to buy another boat?

And finally, I wanted to mention to all those new members of the Club, that OYC has a Cooperating Group Agreement with the Boat Owners Association of the United States (BOAT/US). Pickett Street), and be sure to take along a copy of the Daymarker as it has our BOAT/US accord number at the top, which is needed in order to receive the discount on membership. WINTERIZING CHECKLIST

Forget anything? Using the winterizing checklist below may jog your memory and keep your boat safe over the coming months.

DID YOU:

- Close all thru-hulls, save the one for the cockpit drains?
- Double clamp all thru-hulls, especially the ones for the cockpit drains?
- Double up on all docklines (nylon only), with chafe guards at the chocks?
- Winterize your engine's water cooling system with mixture of water and antifreeze (usually 50/50)?
- "Fog" the carburetor with the engine running (gas engines only) using light lubricant to coat the internal surfaces to prevent rust? Cover the carburetor with a sandwich baggie to prevent damp air getting into the manifold?
- Outboards and I/O's Drain the water from your lower unit?
- Outboards Make sure all gear housing drain holes are open and flush system with fresh water?
- Top off the fuel tank(s) to minimize condensation that could corrode the tank and get into the engine?
- Remove all flammables from down below -- thinner, paints, cooking fuels, varnish, etc.?
- Leave a fully-charged fire extinguisher in clear sight and take the rest home for recharging?
- Drain the potable freshwater system and flush with non-toxic antifreeze?
- Winterize the head and holding tank?
- Take all removable equipment -- stereos, VHF radios, tools, anchors, etc. -- home for safekeeping and lock all hatches, outdrives, trailers, outboard motors, and propellers?
- Those people with diesel engines, if you are leaving fuel in the tanks did you remember to add inhibitor to prevent the growth of fungus in the fuel?
- Take all containers of foods, spices, and anything that is in liquid form home?
- Remove all CD's or tapes?
