



Commodore's Comments



Vice Commodore's Comments

With the start of boating season just around the corner, it is time for all OYC members to practice their nautical skills. I have some pointers on a skill that cannot be learned from Chapmans. I am talking about the art of inviting yourself onto someone else's boat.

BOAT/U.S. Responds Mer Piper

There is an explanation why our proposal for funds from the BOAT/U.S. Foundation Grant was denied. I quote in part what the explanation letter said:

"The reason the Occoquan Yacht Club's proposal for a Foundation grant was not funded does not really involve the fact that your request was for a relatively small amount of funding.

"The Foundation received over 130 proposals totaling nearly \$500,000. Since we had only \$25,000 to distribute, there were many proposals of merit–like yours–which we simply were unable to fund.

"The grants committee deliberated at great length over each of the proposals. Those that were chosen were ones that the entire committee agreed were appropriate to fund. Even so, there were a number of proposals the committee supported, but the funding would not. In fact, only one of the eleven projects chosen received the maximum grant amount of \$5,000. Several other proposals were funded at levels below their original requests."

We do have on file a press release giving the grants and the types of projects that BOAT/U.S. found worthy of funding. I must admit that I really didn't stop to realize that this effort was **nationwide** –for some strange reason I presumed it was a local effort. Yeah well– maybe next year.

Money From...Richmond?

What would you say if Governor Baliles and the rest of the Commonwealth of Virginia government offered to buy, or at least help pay for, your first tank of gas this spring? Boy, was I surprised to find out that it's true.

Every gallon of gasoline sold in Virginia has a <u>road</u> tax automatically built into the price. Those tax receipts are used by Virginia to pay for construction and maintenance of its vast, ever-improving system of highways and byways. If your boat is anything like mine, though, it hasn't been driven on a road in quite some time; nor is it likely to be driven on one in the near future. Therefore, every time you buy a gallon of gasoline for your boat, you are <u>subsidizing</u> those other residents of Virginia who use the roads just as much as you do, but who have never been afforded the privilege of also paying tax on the gas they put in their boats.

Well, relief is apparently out there. Virginia will actually refund the road tax on gas that you buy in Virginia and put in a boat. All you have to do is apply for the refund. I just got off the phone with the Department of Motor Vehicles people in Richmond (that's right, DMV is responsible for collecting and spending this road tax) who advised that it's as simple as filling out a form and sending it in with receipts showing the amount of gasoline that was purchased. You can save receipts up to one year from the date of purchase. The only restriction, at least according to the woman with whom I spoke, is that you can't apply for a refund unless it is for more that five (5) total gallons of gas (Shucks, I guess I'll have to save up a whole bunch of receipts before even being eligible!!). At 16 cents per gallon, it really adds up quickly. Even if you didn't save your receipts from last year, this should be inspiration enough to save them in the future.

In the way of disclaimer, I asked the DMV lady to send me a whole box of application forms, but, not having seen a copy in person, I don't know if there is any fine print. By the time this issue of the <u>Daymarker</u> gets to you, I should have one firmly in hand. Hopefully, there won't be any surprises. Depending on how many are received, I will leave some in the marina store and give some to the Executive Board. I also plan on attending the General Membership Meeting on March 18th and will bring some with me. If all else fails, give me a call at home (703-644-0415) and I'll see what we can do to get you one

P.S. If the boat is being towed overland on a trailer, I understand that the tax on the gas in the towing vehicle is deemed legally sufficient.

P.P.S. There are apparently special rules and requirements for diesel fuel which I did not inquire about. You should call DMV at (804-367-6327) about the specifics.


EPIRB Info

The following is quoted from <u>Lookout</u>, the "voice of the National Boating Federation":

"From: USCG Local Notice to Mariners - Satellite Detection of EPIRBs - On October 12, 1988 the National Aeronautics and Space Administration advised the Coast Guard that as a result of tests performed on samples of Emergency Position Indicating Radiobeacons (EPIRBs), the following Class A EPIRBs failed spectrum coherency requirements specified in Section 80.1053(a)(8) of the Federal Communications Commission rules:

"Manufacturer/Model: ACR Electronics, Inc/RLB-14; Modern Products, Inc./SAT-ALERT B-CON 200a; Dayton Granger, Inc./DOLPHIN EB-2BW

"Users should be aware that when activated, these EPIRBs may not be detected by satellites used by the CO-SPAS-SARSAT system."



On several occasions, I have overheard great concern as to the proper flying of the United States flag from a yacht club flagpole. Perhaps it is time to review the proper etiquette in this situation.

The flagpole or mast of a yacht club is considered to represent the mast of a vessel with the "bow" of the vessel toward the sea. Thus, if you are standing on the shore looking out to sea, the right hand spreader would be considered the starboard spreader. The Occoquan Harbour Marina has a mast with spreaders and the OYC burgee is flown from the starboard spreader which is the position of higher rank than the port spreader.

The confusion comes in when a gaff is added to the pole. Again, remember that the pole represents the mast of a vessel. On a gaff rigged vessel, the position of honor is at the peak of the gaff and this same holds true for the yacht club flagpole. Proper etiquette requires that no other flag be flown *above* the

US Ensign, and a burgee at the mast head will obviously be *higher than* the US Ensign when the latter is flown at the gaff. This is entirely proper since "above" in flag etiquette means "directly on top of" as would be the case if the burgee were above the US Ensign on the same hoist.*

As an interesting side note, if we were being visited by some foreign dignitary such as the Commodore of the Kiel Yacht Club, it is perfectly proper to display the United States flag from the starboard spreader and the German flag from the port spreader with the Club burgee at the masthead.

With all this concern over proper flag etiquette, it still amazes me as to the number of people who fly the US Ensign on their boat 24 hours a day. To be proper, the US Ensign should be flown only from 0800 until sunset. If you will be going out to a restaurant and do not expect to return until after sunset, please take down the Ensign before you leave.

* There is <u>one</u> circumstance in which it is proper to fly another flag directly on top of the United States flag on the same hoist. And no, it is not an emergency situation. I'll answer that one next month and give credit to anyone with the correct answer who calls me before the publishing deadline.

Dear Harry - I am brand new to boating and I just can't wait for the OYC Cookbook to be printed. Can you tell me how to boil water on my boat? F.F.

Boiling water can be very useful. It can be used to make a cup of tea or a bowl of instant soup. Boiling water on your boat is very simple.

Ingredients:

Two (2) saucepans filled with water.

Two (2) beers, chilled to 38°.

One (1) large box of wooden kitchen matches.

One (1) pair of pliers.

Prime your alcohol stove and light it with one of the wooden matches. After it flares up, use the first pan of water to extinguish the flames. After everything has cooled down, relight the alcohol stove. Adjust it for the hottest flame possible. Place the second pan of water on the stove. Do not watch the pan! Everyone knows that a watched pot will not boil

Consume the two (2) beers while you are waiting for the water to heat. After the second beer has been consumed check on the pan of water. When you discover that the stove has gone out, pour a small amount of the water into one of the empty beer cans. Hold the beer can with the pair of pliers and use the remaining wooden matches to heat the beer can.

When you have used that last of the matches, your water is as close to boiling as it will ever get. Use it for that cup of tea.

Dear Harry - In which direction should I look to see heavenly bodies? S.W.

It depends on the time of day. This month, March, look high in the Southwestern sky on the evening of the 12th. There will be a beautiful gathering of the moon near Mars, Jupiter, Pleiades and Aldebaran. Venus will be visible after sunset beginning in mid May very low to the WNW, and will remain visible through the end of the year, slowly moving to the West and finally to the SW.

On the other hand, if you look to the South during the summer, Miss B.B. on C-Dock is not bad either.

Dear Harry - What is the difference between a Lieutenant in the Navy and a Lieutenant in the Army? D.K.

Galley Gourmet Ned W. Rhodes

(Confidential to Jean – The cookie recipe in the January issue wasn't the one for the cookies that we took on the Hardy Souls Cruise. Here is the real recipe. Let's just keep this to ourselves.)

Quakers Best Oatmeal Cookies

1 1/4 cup Margarine 3/4 cup firmly packed

brown sugar

1/2 cup gran. sugar 1 egg

1 tsp. vanilla 11/2 cup all purpose

1 tsp. cinnamon flour

1 tsp. baking soda 1 tsp. salt (optional) 3 cups oatmeal 1/4 tsp. nutmeg

Beat together margarine and sugars until light and fluffy. Add egg and vanilla. Combine flour, soda, salt and spices. Add to margarine mixture and mix well. Mix in oatmeal. Drop by rounded tablespoonfuls onto ungreased cookie sheet. Bake 375 8-9 minutes for chewy cookie. Bake 10-11 minutes for crisp cookies. Cool 1 minute and remove from sheet to plate to cool. Store in tightly covered container. You

can add 1 cup raisins, chopped nuts or 1 cup Nestle chocolate chips, butterscotch or peanut butter chips. You can also use Sugar Twin artificial brown sugar and Sprinkle Sweet for white sugar if you don't use regular sugar. It is also fun to add M&M chocolates.


