

Commodore's Comments



Md. Announces Noise Regulations

Nov 1990, Soundings

It doesn't pay to be noisy on Maryland Waters under new regulations governing boat noise level limits.

Limits for vessels have been lowered from 82 decibels at 50 feet or more to 75 decibels on shore. The rules don't apply to commercial fisherman or to service people testing engines.

Violators are subject to fines of \$500 to \$1,000, plus up to 30 days in jail.

Winterizing Checklist

This was published back in 1987 but alot of you told us that it was valuable information, so here it is again. This is not to mean that it's time to winterize your boats now but keep this list handy for future use, say December, after Santa's Cruise to Occoquan?

DID YOU:

- * Close all thru-hulls, save the one for the cockpit drains?
- * Double clamp all thru-hulls, especially the ones for the cockpit drains?
- * Double up on all docklines (nylon only), with chafe guards at the chocks?
- * Winterize your engine's water cooling system with mixture of water and antifreeze (usually 50/50)?
- * "Fog" the carburetor with the engine running (gas engines only) using light lubricant to coat the internal surfaces to prevent rust? Cover the carburetor with a sandwich baggie to prevent damp air getting into the manifold?
- * Outboards and I/O's drain the water from your lower unit?
- * Outboards Make sure all gear housing drain holes are open and flush system with fresh water?
- * Top off the fuel tank(s) to minimize condensation that could corrode the tank and get into the engine?
 - * Remove all flammables from down below thinner,

paints, cooking fuels, varnish, etc.?

- * Leave a fully charged fire extinguisher in clear sight and take the rest home for recharging?
- * Drain the potable freshwater system and flush with non-toxic antifreeze?
- * Winterize the head and holding tank (after emptying, please)?
- * Take all removable equipment stereos, VHF radios, tools, anchors, etc. home for safekeeping and lock all hatches, outdrives, trailers, outboard motors, and propellers?
 - * Remove all CD's or tapes?
- * Those people with diesel engines, if you are leaving fuel in the tanks did you remember to add inhibitor to prevent the growth of fungus in the fuel tank?
- *Take all containers of foods, spices, and anything that is in liquid form home? (This includes toothpaste tubes)





A Jewel Unveiled

Boating Magazine, September 1990

Here is a preview of the types of recipes that will be appearing at the chili cookoff this weekend.

Find yourself a dutch oven and a stove (landlubber-type or marine, it doesn't matter.)
Ingredients:

- 1 tablespoons peanut oil
- 2 pounds lean beef, coarse chili grind
- 1 tablespoon ground cumin
- 2 tablespoons Louisiana Hotsauce
- 1 tablespoon paprika (preferably straight from Budapest)
- 1 tablespoon oregano (don't count unless it's Mexican)
- 1 medium onion, diced
- 2 medium cloves of garlic
- 1 (and only one) exotic Serrano chili, minus seeds and stem
- 1/2 cup chili powder
- 1 small can of green chilis
- 2 fresh tomatoes
- 1 large can of V-8 juice
- 2 cups or more of water

Heat oil in dutch oven, add meat and cook until evenly browned. Drain off fat and stir in ingredients. Bring to a boil, then simmer (uncovered) for a couple of hours, adding water to get preferred consistency. Taste and adjust spices. Remember — If you're cooking Texas-style chili: **no** beans. I repeat: **no** beans. No celery either.



MORE HURRICANE STUFF

At the risk of repeating myself, I have more hurricane information that came to me from the Boating Administration of the Maryland Department of Natural Resources; and since I have been reading constantly about the increasing risk of being visited by a hurricane, I thought I'd pass it along. Interestingly enough, hurricanes are bred off the east coast of Africa. The conditions for the formation of the storm originate from the plains of east and central Africa. When the amount of rainfall on these plains increases, the number and intensity of storm centers generated also increase. The rainfall is cyclic in nature running over a twenty year span. We are in the second or third year of the upward swing in rainfall. Scientists expect the upswing to continue and peak in the next seven to eight years and correspondingly the threat to the eastern seaboard of the United States increases. This theory is statistical and doesn't really fall in with popular theories about global warming and greenhouse effect. We saw several major hurricanes during the late 50's and early 60's and as Africa suffered through a drought our hurricane activity was less intense. Anyway, the rain is mainly falling on the plain and we should be prepared.

The Department of Natural Resources' bulletin is so timely and well done, I will touch on its highlights:

- 1. Have a written storm preparation plan. It would take about 15 minutes to write one up. Who has time to think when a storm is threatening?
- 2. Purchase and stow line out of the sunlight specifically for use in case of hurricanes. These storm lines should be twice the diameter of everyday docklines. Marine stores and hardware stores will run out of line, as proven during Hugo, when a major storm threatens.
- 3. Monitor National Weather Service marine broadcasts and begin preparation at the earliest hurricane alert stage. ALERT = storm within 72 hours. WATCH = storm within 36 hours, and WARNING = storm within 24 hours of striking. When emergency management advises evacuation DO SO.


General preparations:

- 1. All preparation should be completed 48 hours in advance of storm to allow you to concentrate on your family and home.
- 2. Secure all hatches and doors, tape windows from inside.
- 3. Check battery for charge and insure that bilge pumps are working properly. Make sure deck scuppers are unobstructed and fully open.
- 4. Shut off fuel lines at the tank, and close thru hull fittings, except scuppers.
- 5. Remove all electronics and valuables to prevent destruction or thefts.
- 6. DO NOT STAY ON BOARD YOUR BOAT. You will notice that Georgetown Yacht Basin, Inc. and the Granary Marina are completely encircled, all points of the compass, by high stable land. There is no better place for your boat to be

in the event of a hurricane, there is no worse place for you to be. Stay home; your family needs you there. I never knew I had so many friends until a hurricane threatens, then everyone wants to bring their boat to good ole Georgetown Yacht Basic, Inc. or the Granary Marina. "Remember me Dave, we stayed with you on July 19, 1979, we had a wonderful time — can we come back today?!!"

- 7. Trailerable boats should be removed from the water and secured to a trailer which should in turn be anchored to the ground.
- 8. The rest is common sense stuff loose gear, bimini tops, unsecured dock boxes should be stored. Double up lines, center the boat in the slip, chafing gear on the docklines, particularly on the docks facing down river. Disconnect electric, water, and other connections, i.e., phone from the dock.

I think the best advice in the whole bulletin is don't stay on your boat. If the worst happens and your boat is lost, at least you'll be around to collect the insurance check, if you stay aboard you may not be! There are other dangers as well that are not mentioned in the bulletin — when the dock is underwater and the power is out even we have difficulty walking the docks and we live here! Enough, enough we are safe now. Since I have gone to the trouble of boring you with all this preaching I have guaranteed no storm for this year.



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
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


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
