Prince William Yacht Club Inducted



Exec. Rear Commodore Comments

The PRYCA Float-In at Aquia Harbour had a large turn out as expected, with an estimated 57 boats including 10 from OYC. Bill Sutherland, Commodore of Aquia Harbour Yacht Club, and its members are to be congratulated for their efforts in hosting this annual Potomac River event, and thanked for their hospitality, coordination of visiting boaters, dock assistance, planned activities, award dinner/dance, Sunday Bloodies/Mimosa Hospitality eye opener, and Aquia Cup presented to—yes—OYC! Thanks, Aquia, for a wonderful, fun-filled weekend.

You heard right, Congress is voting to repeal the "user fee" law. The law is in effect for 1992 and is being enforced only by the U.S. Coast Guard. A phase out, rather than a full immediate repeal, is expected. The earliest possible date a repeal could take effect is October 1. Every penny raised by this fee has gone into the general revenue fund, which means that it is spent on everything except services for boaters.

Reminder: Boat owners are required to license any item on their boat that transmits a signal such as a VHF radio, a radar, a single sideband or an EPIRB. The license required is called a Ship Station License and is good for five years. It can be obtained by filling out FCC Form 506 and Form 155 and sending them to the FCC with a \$35 processing fee. (BOAT/U.S. members can get FCC Form 506 free from BOAT/U.S. by calling 1-800-937-2628 and asking for item 711017.) The law now allows a maximum fine of \$10,000 for an unlicensed transmission. Check your license!

Welcome to all our new members of OYC. Join in our club activities and also ask your fellow boaters to join us too. There are many activities still to come this year. If you have any questions or would like me or a Board member to assist you, please call us. Any <u>new</u> members joining after August 1 will be credited with OYC membership for the 1993 season, so please ask your friends to come join us—the benefits are great! We welcome boaters from <u>any</u> marina to join our yacht club.



Treasurer's Comments

The recent efforts to remind old members to renew and to enlist new members, the renewed sales of ads in the Daymarker and the success of the Dinghy Regatta and Raffle have had a decidedly positive impact on the OYC treasury over the past month.

Cash balance is \$2,107.52; but we still owe Garland Dobbins for the dinghy and motor that were raffled off last weekend. Cash collections for the raffle thus far total 963.00 and there are still a few remissions to be had. The raffle turned out to be both fun and profit for the OYC—although the last-minute sales of nearly \$500 worth of tickets at Aquia the morning of the raffle had a decided impact on that result.

Renewals and new memberships since June 1 have added

\$705, to bring our membership fee income since October up to \$4,090.

We started the OYC fiscal year with \$900.70. We will have added nearly \$500 to that balance by the time the dust from the recent flurry of activity settles. Next month I will provide a detailed accounting of the Club cash flow during the year, to show you where your dues go. As a preview, the largest expenses are for printing and postage (including the <u>Daymarker</u> and membership materials). The total so far this year for reproduction, printing and postage is \$1,087.79, or about \$0.27 of each membership dollar.



Aquia Harbour YC Officer Wins Dinghy Drawing at Float-In Dinner-Dance, July 18

Randy Semper, a resident of Stafford, Virginia, and secretary of the Aquia Harbour Yacht Club, is the lucky winner of the OYC Benefit Dinghy Raffle. The drawing was held July 18, at the Potomac River Yacht Club Association Float-In Dinner Dance hosted by the AHYC.

The full count has not been completed, but ticket sales significantly exceeded the \$700 cost of the raffle prize of a "nearly new," 4-person dinghy and 2.5 h.p. motor, which the club purchased from OYC members Garland and Linda Dobbins before their transfer overseas.

Ticket sales began last January at the 1992 Season Planning Meeting at OHM and finished up on the night of the drawing. In fact, we completely sold out the supply of previously unissued and unsold tickets, which OYC board members took with them to Aquia.

The prize dinghy and motor were set up in the Float-In registration tent, and there was a steady flow of customers from the nine yacht clubs which participated in the Float-In.

Drawing the Winning Ticket

For the ticket drawing, Commodore Dave Yarnell, Vice Commodore Tom Coldwell and Executive Rear Commodore Sandy Leathers stepped up on stage in front of the anxious crowd. While Tom and Sandy deftly shook the large, clear plastic bag containing all the ticket stubs, Commodore Dave thanked everyone (including those back home) who supported the OYC Benefit Raffle.

Then, drawing on a carefully honed sense of mass psychology, Tom heightened the crowd's frenzy into a fever pitch by allowing the bag to open slightly while ever more vigorously shaking it. Skillfully, he allowed exactly 42 tickets, plus or minus three dozen, to spill out on to the stage.

The crowd erupted into a chorus of BOOs, further focusing their excitement and anticipation bordering on mass hysteria — as planned, of course. Feigning panic and utter embarrassment, Tom and Sandy quickly scooped up the tickets and put them back in the bag and finished shaking the bag.


Commodore Dave then called on AHYC's Commodore Bill Sutherland (who hadn't bought a ticket) to draw out the winning ticket.

Rules For Grounding Lt/C Al Johnson, The Ensign, May 1992

It's my good fortune to possess an uncanny ability to recognize problems which often go unnoticed. Although it's generally agreed in private conversation that most boaters have run aground, the unrecognized problem is we're lacking a compilation of rules on how to do it correctly.

Rule 1: Always run aground very slowly, or your stay may be longer than desired.

Rule 2: Always run aground in sand or mud. A rocky reef is too hard on your vessel.

Rule 3: Always run aground when the sun is high. This will ensure better visibility for the lookout person. Tropical waters with 60- to 100-foot visibility are ideal, giving you lots of time to get ready.

Rule 4: Always run aground on a rising tide. A falling tide is permitted only if you have no commitments away from the post in the post six to 12 hours.

your boat in the next six to 12 hours.

Rule 5: Always run aground in warm water locations. This gives you the option of proceeding on foot with little discomfort.


Rule 6: Always run aground in non-public places. If you run aground in front of a restaurant, you'll have to scrub the hull vigorously to pretend you grounded it on purpose.

Rule 7: Always run aground on a windward shore. This is opposite of a leeward shore, where the waves tend to drive you ashore more than you want to be.

Rule 8: Always run aground going upstream in a river. Running aground downstream allows the pressure of the current to keep you there longer than you want to be.

Rule 9: Finally, if you like to follow the crowd, remember that designated anchorages seem to be the most popular places for running aground. This gives you a chance to perform before the "dock committee."

Now, if you decide to run aground, you have a list of guidelines. While the list is short and probably incomplete, remember that no individual has time to try everything.



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
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
