
Commodore Opens Shelter

OYC By-Laws Update

Amendment to Article VII-Amendments to the By-Laws.

1. These By-Laws may be amended by anyone after imbibing at least two drinks at Gecko's. Amendment changes must be written on a cocktail napkin and witnessed by a bartender and a waiter/waitress. Notice of amendment changes shall be published in future issues of the <u>Windbreaker</u>.

Amendment to Article VI-Financial Policies.





raise the OYC burgee along with the American flag and the Virginia State flag which will remain on display throughout the boating season. Coast Guard Marine Safety inspections will be available from 10:00AM, the flag raising will be at 12:00 noon with the dock party to follow. The flag raising, including the National Anthem and firing of the OYC cannon, will open OYC's twelfth year of service to its members. OYC will provide hamburgers, hot dogs, condiments and liquid refreshments. Members should bring side dishes—a casserole, veggies, salads and desserts to share. If the weather becomes inclement, we will move to the back deck of Gecko's as we did last year. To all those who have signed up for the week-long: because of the predicted high level of boating activity this upcoming summer, all of the marinas are requiring a deposit. The total for all five of the marinas is \$85.00. I need a check made out to me in the amount of \$85.00 NOLATERTHAN APRIL 10, 1995. I will let you know which marina charged what portion of the \$85.00 so that you will know how much will be applied to your slip fee. Eighteen boats have signed up so far and I know others will want to go, so the first 18 deposits I get will be the only way to guarantee that you'll get to go.

Now, time for the details about the second leg of the trip, Somers Cove at Crisfield. When we leave Dennis Point we are just about at the mouth of the Potomac. From here it is a straight shot across the bay (45 minutes) to Smith Island. There is a cut right through the island. It is sort of the "Main Street." On the other side, it's a short run across Tangier Sound to Crisfield and Somers Cove. Somers Cove is owned and operated by the State of Maryland. The marina has 500 slips, nice bathhouses, swimming pool and barbeque. The marina is adjacent to the town of Crisfield, which was built on oyster shells during the boom years of the 1920's. Erma Miley, Assistant Manager at the marina, has assured me that we will have plenty to do and they will take good care of us. There is also lots to do in Crisfield. Main Street, with grocery stores, gift shops, a pharmacy and plenty of restaurants as well as a library and post office, are just a block or two away from the marina dock. Also close by is the J. Millard Tawes Historical Museum, which chronicles Eastern Shore life and local fisheries. Two years ago we had a Labor Day cruise to Somers Cove. Labor Day is when Crisfield and Somers Cove host the infamous Crab Derby and Festival. This was quite an experience and although it was a lot fun, there were huge crowds and probably 700 boats in the 500 slips. I am looking forward to a great time with what should be a normal level of activity on Sunday, July 30th, and we should have the place practically to ourselves Monday the 31st.

Next month I'll tell you about our next stop at Mears Yacht Haven in Oxford. Don't forget to send your deposits!





What is the CME?


The CME stands for Courtesy Marine Examination. This service is provided by the Coast Guard Auxiliary. The examination is free and is a courtesy check of safety equipment carried or installed in your vessel. The CME requirements parallel (and in some ways exceed) federal requirements for safety equipment and overall vessel condition.

What are the benefits of a CME? One of the biggest is to ensure that during the spring rush to get your vessel into operation, some small item was not overlooked. It also shows the rest of the boating public that you are a responsible boater.

Does having a CME decal on your boat mean you will never get boarded by the Coast Guard or Marine Police? No—but the Coast Guard and Marine Police do recognize the importance of the CME program. If they are out performing safety checks on boats, they recognize that you have taken the time to have your boat inspected voluntarily by a trained Auxiliarist. They will generally pass up your boat and look for a boat that does not have a decal on it.

If you fail the inspection, what happens? Nothing. The Coast Guard Auxiliary is not a law enforcement agency nor will they report any violations to any law enforcement activity. This is a service provided for the boating community.

We will be performing CME's on Flag Raising Day for OYC. Those of you who would like to have the inspection done before that can call me to schedule one (703-680-6048). If you have any questions concerning this or any of the Coast Guard Auxiliary programs, I'll be glad to help.



Wallops-Breaux Funds Zeroed Again

The Coast Guard budget request for FY 1996 contains no funds for Recreational Boating Safety.

Instead the Coast Guard budget request refers to The "Boating Safety Bill" or the 103rd Congressional bill HR 5577 both of which died in the closing minutes of the 103rd Congress as follows:

"Due to budgetary constraints and the increased role of the States in boating safety activities, no discretionary appropriation is requested in FY 1996 from the funds deposited in the Boat Safety account of the Aquatic Resources Trust Fund."..."Current law, under the authority of Title V of the Oceans Act of 1992 (P.L. 102-587) authorizes the transfer of \$10 million for 1996. However it is anticipated that Congress will enact legislation (originally considered in 1994) to increase the amount transferred in 1996 to \$30 million."

The full membership of the House Subcommittee on the Coast Guard are Republican Representatives: Chairman Howard Coble (NC); Tillie K. Fowler (AK); Susan Molinari (NY); Bill Baker (CA); Vernon J. Ehlers (MI) and Ex Officio Bud Shuster (PA); and the Democratic Representatives are Ranking Minority member James A. Traficant Jr. (OH); Walter R. Tucker III (CA); Bill K. Brewster (OK); James L. Oberstar (MN) and Ex Officio Norman Minetta (CA).

Boaters must again entreat their congressmen to see that

our Wallops-Breaux tax funds are appropriated for our benefit. The Wallops-Breaux Boating Safety Account is the perfect example of a user's fee being passed on to the States to successfully meet the need to reduce boating facilities.


