how much fun those members who are not present are missing. Indeed, most of the members who experience the fun of one or more of our cruises end up as regulars.

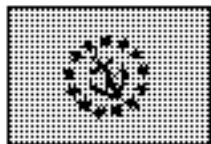

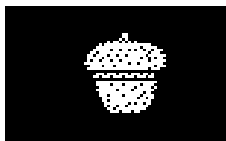
Kids—two of them.

Blessed by extraordinarily good weather, 17 OYC boats carrying more than 30 members and guests cruised on the long Columbus Day weekend to Aquia Bay Marina.

The marina is located just before the bridge on the port side of Aquia Creek, looking east to a beautiful, scenic view of the creek and its merge with the Potomac.

This facility was inactive for several years before coming under new ownership and management earlier this year. Extensive refurbishing has been underway. There are 82 slips, fuel is available, and there is an excellent repair facility (mechanics were on duty over the weekend and Monday holiday). Not yet fully completed are privacy enhancements in the rest rooms and power upgrading. As best we can tell, our resourceful club members viewed the latter as minor inconveniences offset clearly by management's eagerness to please, an abundance of nearby bushes, the great meal on Saturday night and the crabs on Sunday, all at a very reasonable price.

Except for an occasional voyeuristic opportunity, there is little titillating news to relate. About the Bumpy Bridge

Robert Martinez, Secretary of Transportation for the Commonwealth of Virginia, has replied to Commodore Sandy Leathers sharing in OYC's concerns about the southbound span of the I-95 bridge over the Occoquan. For several months, since the new span was completed, boaters could hear an unusually noisy rumbling of trucks, especially noticeable on the upstream side of the bridge.

In September, Commodore Sandy Leathers wrote to Secretary Martinez drawing attention to the obvious uneven surface of the bridge. "Our concern," said Sandy, "is whether, over time, the bouncing could weaken the bridge, leading to increased maintenance costs and lane closures or, worse yet, a catastrophic collapse similar to one on I-95 in Connecticut a few years ago."

The Commodore asked whether there is in fact a problem with the bridge and, if so, whether or when corrective action will be taken. "We raise this as a matter of safety and not as a complaint about noise." The letter included praise for the

work on the bridge by the Virginia Department of Transportation which has led to further alleviation of traffic congestion on I-95.

In his reply October 2, Secretary Martinez declared that VDOT shares OYC's concerns and has been exploring various options to correct the uneven riding surface. "VDOT staff," he said, "is in the process of developing corrective measures that should begin (in November) with the work taking approximately two weeks to complete."

Good going, Sandy, and let's hope it's goodbye to bridge rumbling.

Hardy Souls Cruise to Olde Towne Alexandria November 10, 11 and 12

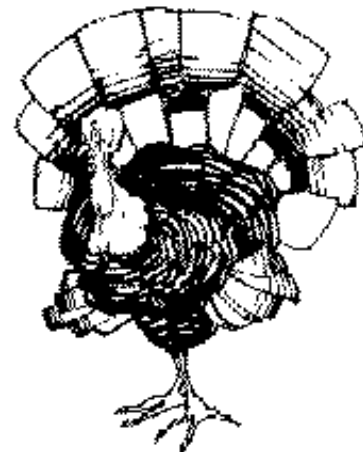

Since no one has done an article about the Chili Cookoff for this issue of the Daymarker, I thought I'd step in to let you know what a great afternoon you missed if you weren't

there, and if you were there I know you join me in thanking Dottie Jacobsen for the terrific job she did in organizing the event. (See? This is not just a self-serving article to let everyone know that I WON!)

It started off as a dark and stormy morning...but the afternoon cleared off nicely (you know, it NEVER rains for the Chili Cookoff) and turned out to be perfect chili-eating weather. There were a dozen or so chilies entered in the contest, and the competition was fierce. One contestant even tried to sway the male judges by putting in front of his chili entry a photo of a nubile young lady scantily clad in multi-color chili peppers—nice try, Commodore Tom! The winners: First prize: yours truly; Second prize: Lonnie Love; Third prize (and awarded Best Named, though all I can remember is the photo): Tom Egmore. I'm sure it was a tough job for the Zimpel family judges, and we thank you (by the way, was that \$20 each that Ned promised you?).

Since I actually followed a recipe this year for my chili entry, I thought I'd share with you my friend Elizabeth Parker's recipe.

Three Pepper Chili

- 5 slices bacon
- 1/2 lb. Italian sausage (remove casings)
- 1-1/2 lb. ground chuck
- 1 cup chopped onions
- 1/2 cup red bell pepper
- 1 clove garlic, crushed
- 2 red chili peppers, seeded & chopped
- 2 jalpeno peppers, seeded & chopped
- 1-1/2 T. chili powder (I think I doubled this)
- 1/2 t. salt
- 1/4 t. oregano
- 2-1/2 cups beef broth
- 1-12 oz. can tomato paste
- 1-16 oz. can pinto beans

Cook bacon until crisp. Remove from pan and crumble. Cook and crumble sausage in same pan. Remove from pan and drain, saving 2T fat. Set bacon and sausage aside.

In reserved fat, sauté ground chuck, onion, red pepper and garlic. Add bacon, sausage, chili peppers, jalapenos, chili powder, salt and oregano. Stir in beef broth and tomato paste and bring to a boil. Reduce heat and simmer 1-1/2 hours. Stir in beans and cook 1/2 hour more.

Serve with sour cream, lime wedges, grated cheese, guacamole and soft tortillas. Note: I squeezed half a lime into the chili pot.

The competition in the photo contest was also fierce, with many talented entries. Most notably, the name "Jacobesen" kept popping up in the awards—sure hope you liked those prizes you bought, Dottie!

I will leave it to others to report on the wonderful dessert competition—and perhaps give some recipes? Ned's Mom served as a dessert judge and had a great time, though she was puzzled by the outrageous tales people kept telling her about her son!

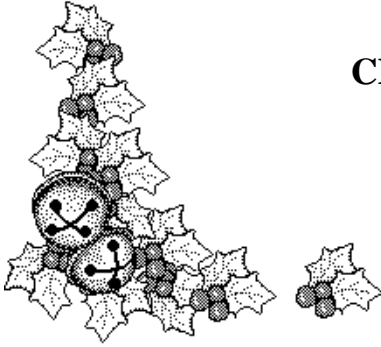

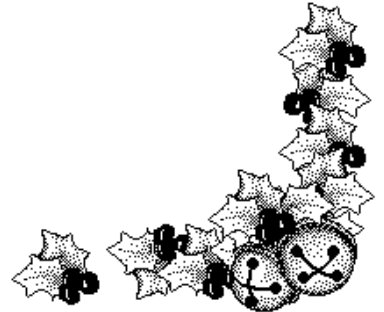
