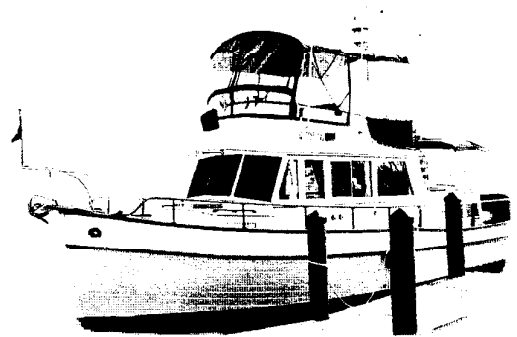
### Commodore's Comments

NOT first prize for solving Dave Moore's puzzle

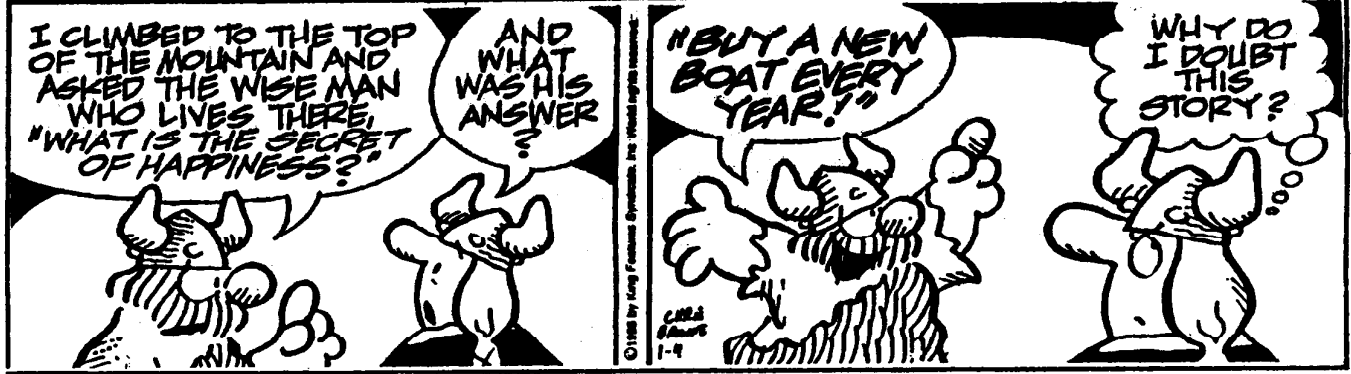
problem—he handed out additional copies and demanded your response.

### Results of the 1996 Membership Survey

Six people responded by mail, and 10 more responded at the January Planfest at Gecko's. 16/84=19% response. Good news: I have some data. Bad news: it is probably biased towards the most active people in the club. If you did not submit a response, but want the board to hear your thoughts, do not be deterred by my unilateral decision to end the survey. Send in your survey, and/or send any board member a note FULL OF IDEAS, SUGGESTIONS and complaints.

#### And the results are:

**1. PARTICIPATION** during 1996 events. First is the *number of respondents who participated* in the event, second is that number's rounded *percentage of the 16 total respondents*—a figure that probably does not mirror overall club statistics due to the bias mentioned above, but does give an indication as to event popularity.

- b. 13 - 81%—Jan Planfest, Mar Membership/St Patrick's Party, Sept General Membership/Election.

- e. 10 - 63 %—Summer Cruise to Colonial Beach, PYRCA Summer End at Tantallon.
- f. 9 - 56%—Breakfast Cookout/Yard Sale, Mem'l Day Cruise to Yeocomico, Tantallon YC Luau, Columbus Day Cruise to Gangplank.
- g. 8 - 50%—PRYCA Change of Command, DC Boat Show, Flagraising, Labor Day Cruise to Coles Pt.
- h. 7 - 44%—July 4th Cruise to Coles Point, Weeklong Cruise, Hearty Souls Cruise to Alexandria.
- i. 6 - 38%—DC Blessing of the Fleet, Dinghy Regatta at Mattawoman.
- j. 5 - 31%—Shrimpfest/Bonfire at the Dunes, Santa Cruise at Occoquan.
- k. 4 - 25%—Feb Land Cruise to Alexandria.
- l. 3 - 19%—PYRCA Safety Day at Mt Vernon.

**2. DESIRED ACTIVITIES** (They do not add to 100% since some people skipped some)

- a. **Cruise Distance:** Short 44%, Long 25%, Both 25%
- b. **Cruise Duration:** Day 0%, O'night 75%, Both 19%
- c. **Destination:** Marinas 69%, Raft-ups 0%, Both 19%

- e. **Ashore Frequency:** More 31%, Fewer 0%, OK now 31%
- f. **Raftups:** More 31%, Fewer 25%, OK now 13%
- g. **Prefer Bay N or S:** North 13%, South 6%, Either 19%

### 3. MISCELLANEOUS

- a. **Optimum Distance for 1 night O'nite**—44%: Colonial Beach; 31%: Alexandria; 25%: Coles Pt; 6%: Cobb I and Tantallon.

## The Bonding Box—A Winter Project

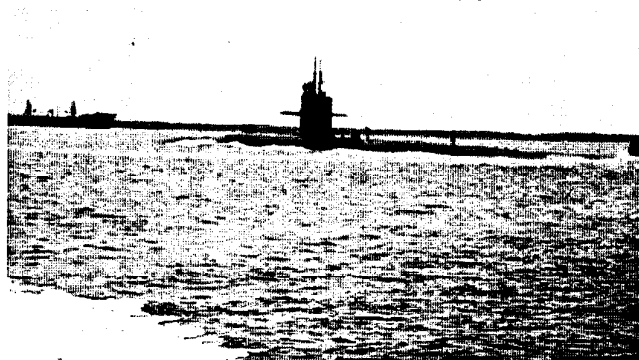

Among us OYC'ers are many Captains that regularly need to get "up close and personal" with their engines to either work on them or get at components and systems in close proximity to them. Those of us with close spaces in our engine compartments (not you, Zimpe!—read no further and go play ping-pong in your engine room) are regularly challenged with having to perform contortions and "become one" with our engines in order to change those plugs on the outboard side, change the oil filter, or other crowded tasks. How many times have we wished we could just levitate above the engine instead of resting on the backfire flame arrestor (BFA) and carburetor. Worse yet, having done so, we may find that we have bent the throttle linkage, pulled wires loose, or disconnected hoses; not to mention poked a hole in our hide or ripped our jeans.

In order to make the "bonding" experience much more comfortable and efficient, I have devised a nautical aid which I call the "bonding box". It is simply a wooden box designed to fit around the carburetor & BFA which allows you to put your weight comfortably on the box instead of all of those delicate engine parts and connections on top of the engine. The box should be sized to rest upon the head/block outside the carburetor/BFA envelope, and have slots cut into the sides that clear the hoses, linkages, and any electrical connections and protuberances. Once you measure and build your Bonding Box for one engine, it will normally also fit the other, but you may have to make some additional slots to accommodate both sides.

Now that you have designed, built, and custom fitted your Bonding Box, give it a nice coat of paint and find a place in the engine spaces to stow it, if possible. Now when you have to bond with your engine, it will be much more pleasurable experience, and result in less damage and frustration. You can put a blanket or other padding on the box and comfortably work in and around all sides of your engines henceforth. Just remember, after you are finished, please don't light up a cigarette and ask the boat "was it good for you?" Cheers!

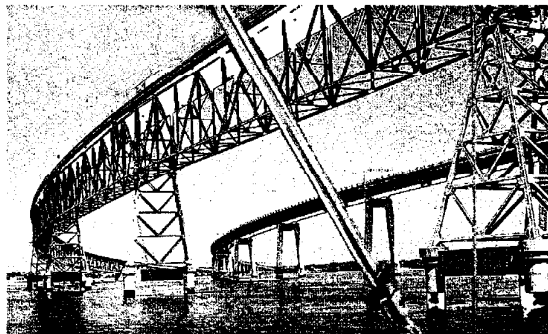

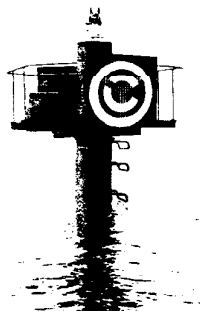
