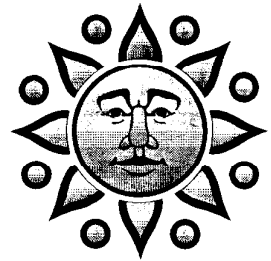

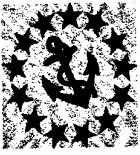

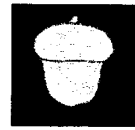

Tantallon Yacht Club Flag Raising, May 10, and we are invited

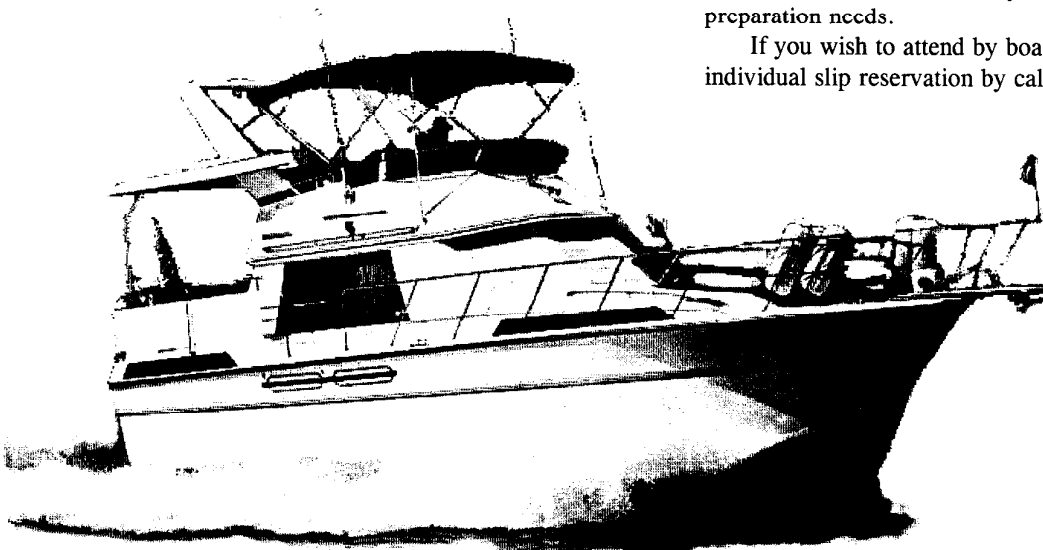

Lucky Ducks underway

Breathing Easier for Spring

Finally! Boating season is here and we are all scrubbing, polishing and starting up those engines—what a beautiful sound. Reminds me of that old tune “Nothing’s quite as pretty as the sound of inboards in the morning.” Anyway, I thought I’d note a few pointers about air conditioners that will make life aboard more pleasant this Spring.

The first suggestion is to look at your air conditioner to see if it has an air filter. Betcha’ it doesn’t. This means that all the dust inside your boat is being re-circulated into your lungs whenever you crank up the unit.

Simple solution. First, clean your heat exchanger by blowing compressed air through it or carefully (electrical power off) spraying it with water to wash it out and let it dry. Second, pick up a nominal size air conditioner filter at the store for less than 2 bucks, and cut it to fit your unit. Simply put it in front of the heat exchanger (the fan is normally on the back side), turn on the unit to see if the air is flowing through it before it gets to the heat exchanger, and you have solved the dust and pollen problem. Since I have two units aboard *Cheers*, I get one filter that is big enough to cut in two and use it on both of the units.

Secondly, as it was running all last summer, your air conditioning unit produced a constant drip of condensate (water) into a drip pan underneath it which drained somewhere (hopefully overboard and not into your bilge). Anyway, while that water sat around in the drip pan under the unit, it most likely supported the growth of those relatively unintelligent life forms which some of us refer to as mold. That forest of green stuff is likely still there, although it might not be green anymore. So, as soon as you crank up your A/C this season, you are going to be breathing air that is circulating alien species into your lungs. The simple solution: pour a bleach solution into the pan, let it sit a while, then flush it out with water when you clean the heat exchanger out as mentioned above. Keep the water out of the fan motor, and let everything dry before turning any electrical power back on.

A final note for safety, change the batteries in your on-board smoke detector in the cabin and test your CO monitor(s). You do have these installed, don’t you? Better yet, get a Coast Guard Auxiliary Courtesy Marine Exam. I’ll be glad to do it for you. Cheers!

Salad Dressing for Your Head

by Jim Ball

Here's a little maintenance tip to take care of that most troublesome of accessories afloat, the head.

Over time, "stuff" that goes through the plumbing connected to your head forms a scale on the inside of the lines which traps odors and causes your cabin atmosphere to become less than fresh.

A natural, non-polluting way to help break up the scale is to pour vinegar into the head and flush it only enough to get the vinegar into the lines. If you can close the Y-valve to trap the vinegar, do it. Let it sit in the line for about an hour, then open the Y-valve and flush it through. Follow that up with a little vegetable oil to lubricate your impeller and seals, and you have just salad-dressed your head in an environmentally friendly way. Cheers!

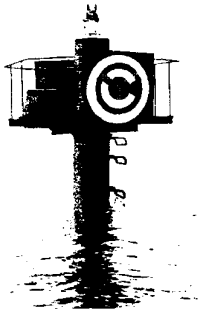

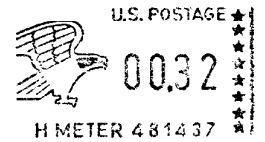
