#### **Touring Knoxville**

As noted in last month's article, we went to Knoxville to visit our "new baby." What I remember of the Sea Ray factory tour was very interesting. We arrived a half-hour early, thanks to Boat Boy who got me up at zero-dark thirty! We sat in the reception area reading boating magazines for an eternity until the other tour members arrived. They probably stopped to have breakfast. Imagine that! Once everyone was assembled, our guide led us through a hallway lined with cubicles until we reached a door at the end. When we went through the door everything changed. Suddenly we were in this strange warehouse with disassembled boat hulls, tops, windows, cabinets and seat cushions floating through the air!

Final Update: The news is better than we expected! State law did not allow the Board of County Supervisors to totally eliminate the boat tax, but they reduced the rate below the threshold that is counter-productive to administer and collect. The rate has been set at \$.00001 to accommodate the Board's decision to discontinue tax collection.

## **Update on Bottom Paint Law Enforcement**

The following article, prepared by an OYC member who is a recognized authority in every field, was intended for publication in the April First edition to assist OYCers contemplating painting their bottoms before spring launching. We regret the inconvenience this delay may have caused and hope that there are still a few of you thinking about what to do with your bottoms.—Ed.

We boaters all know the importance of keeping our hull bottoms clean and looking good. Now apparently the government has a keen interest in the condition of the coatings we apply to these hull surfaces also. The anti-fouling paints used to prevent algae growth, barnacles and other marine growth hitchhikers have suddenly caught the attention of environmentalists to the extent that a large grant (actual amount unknown at this printing) has been given to *Evermoore* Enterprises to set up checkpoints in our local waters this spring-summer boating season.

One of the known sights will be in the Occoquan River channel at a location somewhere near Sandy Point. Highly technical and specialized equipment will be placed underwater in a safe location and will be able to detect the amount of copper ablative particles released from the passing vessels. These readings will be in *ppm* and will be used to calculate the polluting affects to our waters. This equipment will also be able to identify the passing vessel by size, shape and power.

If an abundant number of vessels are found to pass these checkpoints with violations of inadequate bottom paint or the wrong kind of applications, then the EPA will set up enforcement boats to stop the subject vessels and write citations

Why the Occoquan site has been selected is unknown, but boaters are urged to be on the alert and make sure your spring commissioning includes proper materials and procedures in treating your bottoms.

Updates will follow when more information is received.
