Rear Commodore's Comments

It's really cold out. It's high noon and the temperature is somewhere well south of the freezing point. The wind is kicking up pretty well, too. If I try walking into it with my head up, it stings across my cheeks, and my eyes start watering to the point where I can't see where I'm going. I'm really learning to dislike the short, cold days and long, cold nights offered up by nature during the winter months.

Winter. It's really winter this year. After mild weather for the last three years, we are having to deal with some really cold days this year; as in, "The wind chill is *how many* degrees *below* zero?" Since we started boating 3 seasons ago, this is the first time that I have seen the Potomac River frozen as far south as Quantico. Ah, to be eating crabs *outdoors* at Tim's on a sunny day in December with the temperature in the low 70's. How quickly we can get spoiled by a few mild years, not noticing the leaves falling, or the wind becoming a little more northerly, or the days getting really short, all because the air stays warm.

This is the saddest part of boating. *Lizzie Bitz* is all winterized, serviced and tucked away for the next few months, looking rather inglorious protected from the elements by a huge black tarp as she waits patiently for warmer days to return. The bungee cords securing the covering under her keel make it look almost as if she's lifting her skirt to keep it from getting dragged through the little bit of snow lying on the ground around her.

Everywhere I look, I see naught but varying shades of grey. The leaden sky, the barren branches of the leafless trees, the gravel underfoot as I walk across the lot where *Lizzie Bitz* is in hibernation. Looking back across Neabsco Creek, I see geese and gulls coming in for comical, skidding landings on the ice, screeching their surprise at the fact that they can't stop on this hard water. The cold wind ripples across the few areas that are kept ice-free by the bubblers churning away near the boats whose owners are brave enough to keep them in the water year-round. Some of the pilings have ice "skirts" on them, where the tide has fallen away from the ice clinging to the piling.

It's very quiet in the creek now. No music playing, no laughter, no engines being revved as they warm up. It actually gets eerily quiet when the wind stops blowing. It's almost as if all the memories of last summer at the marina—the potato cannons, the tropical drink experiments, the clusters of people enjoying time with their dock neighbors—happened in a former life.

I've heard it said that winter really isn't all that long, but it seems like forever when you're not on the water.

ORMA Update for the New Year

On the dredging issue, thanks to Congressman Tom Davis, we have a \$1-million appropriation to cover the problem, and Jim Henry will stay in touch with the Congressman's office to monitor the Corps of Engineers plans. By the way, there was a false rumor that the Corps had taken a position that no dredging was needed. That is not the case. The Corps position is that the entire river does not need dredging, just trouble spots. We agree.

Meanwhile, we met with Town of Occoquan officials on Jan 22 to obtain their input on dredging needs so that we can present a full list of troubled areas. Thanks to Councilman Leo Smith, a preliminary list has already been provided. The Town Council, with ORMA's input, also passed a resolution on January 23d recognizing the Congressman's help in obtaining the appropriation. A presentation is scheduled to recognize Congressman Davis' efforts at 9:00 a.m., Friday, February 9th at the Occoquan Town Hall.

Regarding the No Wake zone, ORMA is circulating a draft request to the Prince William County Supervisors recommending that the no-wake zone be extended approximately one third of the distance between where it is now and Conrad Island. After receipt and consideration of any comments, a final version will be sent to the Supervisors. The PWC Board of Supervisors is required by Virginia law to clear the change with the Board of Game and Inland Fisheries after a public notice.

ORMA will also continue to consider some member's concerns regarding safety of wakes in the narrow channel and invites any who wish to voice an opinion on this issue or other safety matters to send us an e-mail.

Belmont Bay Marina has about 20% of its slips filled to date, and will open in early Spring. It will have a gas dock and boats can refuel on the outside of the long dock parallel to the channel. Because of the high traffic in the area, the No Wake issue needs to be addressed soon.

The Occoquan Blessing of the Fleet is scheduled for Sunday, May 6th, and we need volunteers from all ORMA members to bring it together. ORMA has also been coordinating with Tim Newell (yes, of Fort Washington Marina) who will also be managing the Belmont Bay Marina. We asked Tim about transient slips, especially for the Blessing of the Fleet, and he will be able to support quite a few boats on the Saturday before the Blessing. Belmont Bay still has slips, and will also have transient slips for a while, so boaters looking for a home should call Tim Newell at 301-292-7700 or send him and e-mail at timnewell1@excite.com.

The Port of Occoquan is moving along, with the Town's receipt of an initial grant of \$100,000 which should result in a first phase small town dock that recreational boaters can tie up to. The town is seeking additional grant money to build more dock facility, and all are asked to send a letter of support to Mayor Conway. See the ORMA Web page for details.

Thanks to all who have supported ORMA efforts in the past. We have made tremendous progress and look forward to the fruits of it in the coming year. Please get involved and ask your other Occoquan friends, neighbors, and dockmates to join in also.
