I had forgotten about the first boating month of the season. I had forgotten how



Or it can look like a tee-shirt day that actually requires 2 or 3 shirts to stay warm

I think "temperature swing" is far too modest a term to describe the weather of April. I can remember sitting on the foredeck of *Lizzie Bitz* in nothing but a swimsuit on Sunday, working up a sweat as I waxed and polished, then by Tuesday I was wearing a down coat and gloves just to walk the dog (a very short walk, by the way).

Spring can sometimes drive one crazy. It sometimes seems that we only get "beneficial" rains on the weekends, some of which could be likened more to monsoons. The yard seems to be growing at a pace even a goat couldn't keep up with, the mildew bags in the boat are working overtime, and the bilge has rainwater in it(again!). At least I know that having the top restitched with seam tape was a good idea. We don't seem to have any raindrops falling on our heads as we sit in the cockpit and watch it raining.

But I know that, as in years past, when May arrives it brings with it a bit more stability in the weather. The sun climbs a bit higher, it feels even warmer, and we might even leave the house without an umbrella. I can turn my face to the sky to feel the warmth of the sun without as much fear of it getting wet. Helpful Hints from Chapman's... and Nabil.

With the coming of a new and exciting boating season, it serves us well to review some basic nautical knowledge. Being both cheap and a sometime blowboater, I still use my 1944 edition of Chapman's *Piloting, Seamanship, and Small Boat Handling* which I keep next to my world-cruising \$1.00 gas fund and change of underwear. The following quotes are from an extensive helpful hints section (pages 368-377).

"A small amount of canvas on a motor boat will steady her a lot offshore in a beam sea." Eat that, stinkpotters!

"In a pinch, ordinary soap will seal a gas line leak." Also provides the potential for a great nautical bonfire.

"A strainer in the gas line will trap more dirt than a carbureter will swallow." Great line for a fortune cookie.

"River sailing is intriguing. One always wonders what lies just around the bend ahead." Would you believe Conrad Island Shoals, the Graveyard of the Occoquan?

"Thin ice will often damage a hull more than a thick coating. 'Window pane' ice, an eighth of an inch thick, cuts cedar like a sharp chisel. Sheet copper at the waterline will protect the hull." Every well-dressed boat this season will sport a copper skirt. Hubba hubba.

"New lines have a mean habit of twisting themselves into hard kinks. They can be worked out by towing the line astern, one end made fast to the after bit." Spring on the Potomac becomes reminiscent of a Palermo spaghetti factory.

! August 24-26—Dog Days of August Party at Colonial Beach, including a wine tour of Ingleside Plantation Vineyard.



Saint 'n Sinner Slithers Soothingly South

First, the disclaimer. Ned Rhodes was part of my crew helping to sail Saint 'n Sinner to Wilmington, NC. So, no matter what he writes about, the key thing to remember is that it didn't happen! For any of you readers who have been around Ned for very long, you know that his veracity is inversely proportional to his girth.

We left OHM at 7:50 AM on a dark and foggy Thursday morning. Temperature was about 55 degrees with drizzle. Visibility varied at times between 100 yards to one half mile. Fortunately the wind was non-existent and we had flat water all the way to Smith Point. My crew consisted of Ned (part time navigator/cook), Ron Tilmon (general dogsbody and famed Carolina boat mooch), and Bruce Sherer (brother-inlaw). Now I know what the Captain of the Minnow felt like.

We had to cover nearly 500 miles and I had estimated three to five days for the trip, depending on weather and mechanicals. We made it in three. Again, luck was with us because the weather was fair to good and the boat ran smoothly. In retrospect, I probably pushed harder than was necessary but in view of the rare skill of my crew, I felt that the shorter the trip, the better.

We passed through Great Bridge lock and bridge Thursday evening and watched the sunset from the fuel dock at Atlantic Yacht Basin at milepost 12. We'd covered about 190 miles. On Friday the 13th, we passed through Coinjock, crossed the Albemarle Sound, and reached Oriental, NC, where we overnighted at the town marina. This is a very friendly little marina with a very decent restaurant. Although Oriental's reputation is the sailing capital of North Carolina, we power boaters were warmly welcomed until they found out we had Yankees aboard. This leg of the trip covered approximately 170 miles.

Happy Day at Dave's, June 2

Come one, come all but let me know your intentions so I can plan for a fun time. It's a picnic, play day, lazy day, short boat ride day or an excuse to not work day on June 2, 2001. Come by boat preferably or by land barge too. The place...Dave Moore's on the Occoquan Bay shoreline. The plan is to arrive early afternoon and relax, visit, chat, play volleyball, horseshoes, croquet or games of choice and of course eat, drink and be OYC partyers! Eats around 4:00 pm but snacks all the time. The dock will hold a few boats but mainly anchor off shore and Dave will pick you up in the pontoon boat (just like at Tim's). Tide on June 2 is as follows: Low at about 11:00 a.m. and High about 4:30 p.m., so the afternoon will be great for any of those that have that fear of the Occoquan Bay because the charts show it to be on the shallow side. There is three and a half feet of water at the dock at normal low tide. Rarely a problem for most boaters. The bay on approach, 5-6 feet.

Burgers and 'dogs' will be provided as well as drinks (hard liquor BYOB) and everyone *bring a side dish to share*. The weather will be perfect (I just know it).

Directions for those of you coming for the first time...at about daymarker 2 on the Occoquan channel, head west for the Virginia shoreline. You will see Tyme and Tyde Marina buildings a bit north of my dock. As you look at the shoreline, the homes to the left are new and enormous! I am the house just to the right of the new development and the 'little' house. The OYC banner will be flying on the dock and you can radio me on channel 16 for pickup from your boat after anchoring.

By land, it's **14813 Bayview Drive, Woodbridge, VA 22194**. Take Featherstone Road east off of US 1 and go about a mile and cross the RR tracks, turn an immediate left, then immediate right on Seaview Ave. Go one block to Bayview. At that corner is my hidden drive but marked with a sign and OYC marker will be there. Easy as 1-2-3.

Off to Cobb Island, June 15-17

by Walt Cheatham, PRYCA Member-at-Large Cobb Island, MD entertains Potomac and nearby Chesapeake Bay boaters this year again in June with Cobb Island Days—a total community effort put on by the Cobb Island (CI) Citizens Association, the CI Fire Department, and the Charles County Watermen's Association.

Four local restaurants are available Friday evening (pay as you go), and Saturday has free family entertainment including a flag raising, craft fair from 10 to 4, horse drawn wagon rides, fire engine rides, live crab races, and a corn shucking contest for kids up to age 13 (with the shucked corn being cooked later for the pig/chicken roast)—all on the community green right next to the marinas.

All this will be followed by a happy hour, dinner, dancing, and Sunday morning buffet covered by the admission fee (see below). There is no pool available, but the island is flat and great for walking or bicycling.

The January Planfest resulted in signups by 14 boaters, and I have contacted each of you individually to remind you of the event. Potomac River Yacht Clubs Association Annual Float-In



This "study" activity could last until they expend all the appropriated funds and have none left for dredging. One might ask "move the markers where?" Good question, because unless you dredge, there isn't any place to move them. The staffers will meet with a Corps representative on the 27th to discuss this issue.

A Quest for Lost Ground

Someone genius said that boating is an obnoxious way to display wealth and a foolproof means of disposing of it. I make no claim for wealth but I can attest to the disposing part, in which I have become an expert.

A few weeks ago the Raritan Crown heads in Shalimar decided not to flush unless the battery charger was on; without the charger, not even a click at the switch. Which meant we could only flush while on shore power or genset, which intervals do not always coincide with the need. Each head requires 32 amps to flush, and the battery charger could give it only 22 amps at best; so it would flush, but without much gusto. I called Raritan and they were perplexed.

I agreed with my dock neighbors who suggested I had a bad battery. So even though both main batteries checked out "good" with a load tester (which I bought), I replaced the two batteries and upped the series from 24 to 27 just for good measure. Now let's flush without the charger. Nothing.

Next suspect, the battery charger. I hired an electrician to accomplish some unrelated work and asked him to check the charger. It's erratic, he says. I called the manufacturer, who said they no longer make that type of charger and had no suggestions to offer. So I bought a snazzy new charger and let it work on the new batteries overnight. Next day I turned it off for the crucial test. Press the flush button. Not a sound, not a gurgle.

Enter the saintly Ned Rhodes. Electronics engineer, seasoned boater, dogmaster, plus he owns meters and things. He helped me trace the circuits between heads, batteries.... and, oh yes, ground.

Ground? Well, gee whiz, ground is important, even I know that.

Tracing the wiring for the heads was a chore, but soon enough I followed the ground wires to a single, solitary, outof-the-way, sneaking-under-the-starboard-engine ground lug, Fairfax Yacht Club. The procession will be managed by Past PRYCA Commodore John Robey and the Occoquan Flotilla of the Coast Guard Auxiliary with participation of Fairfax County police and fireboats, Potomac Marine, and other public safety vessels.
