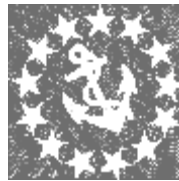

So in keeping with the chili theme, here is a great entry for Chesapeake Bay Chili:

2 tbsps. Butter	¼ cup chopped scallions
1 cup chopped celery	1 lb. medium shrimp, peeled
1 cup heavy cream	½ cup whole milk
1 ½ tbsps all purpose flour	1 teaspoon salt
1 tsp ground white pepper	½ tsp chili powder
1 tsp celery salt	1 lb. fresh crabmeat (picked over)
2 eggs, hard cooked and sliced	cooked rice

Melt butter in heavy saucepan and sauté scallions and celery until soft. Add shrimp and sauté until pink. In small bowl, combine cream and mild and stir in the flour until smooth. Add the cream mixture to the skillet along with the salt, pepper, celery salt, and chile powder. Stir and cook over low heat until the mixture thickens. Gently stir in the crabmeat and eggs. Serve at once on white rice.
