Of course, I remind myself quite often how lovely Washington's spring time weather is and how quickly we can move from such abysmal weather to those beautiful days when the crocuses, daffodils and then the cherry blossoms are

all showing their March and April color. I do know that Springtime springs eternal.

One other trick that we also use to anticipate the nice days and wonderful OYC events that are just around the corner is to look at the OYC Schedule of Activities. It is never too early to begin making some plans for 2003. As your Rear Commodore I know that many of you have not yet taken full advantage of the wonderful opportunities for having a boating excursion with your OYC friends. Try it this year. As you plan for a weekend outing with other boaters that are anxious to share a safe and fun weekend with you, we offer these few comments on the various marinas that we will be boating to this year:

Olverson's Lodge Creek Marina

For a quiet and delightful weekend from August 1 to 3 join us as we boat to the West Yecomico. Only 3½ hours

away Olverson's offers a lovely heated pool that never closes, free courtesy cars (no need to buy gas, just take the key and don't forget to come back) to drive into Callao and explore and an afternoon ice cream social. A dinner at a four star manor inn and a breakfast buffet on the covered walkway are a few of the fun activities of being together. Most important the owner will make you feel so welcome you won't want to leave.

Coles Point Plantation

A resort on the Potomac just 2½ hours (approximately 60 miles) away. This marina has just about everything you might like for a weekend away. A large pool, a 500 foot fishing pier, sandy beach, playground equipment, walking trails, a pleasant restaurant with a sea food buffet and covered slips. Coles Point – a full service marina that will, rain or shine, promise a fun weekend with other OYC'ers over the Labor Day Weekend – August 29 to September 1.

Fort Washington Marina

A short 25 minute boat ride from the Occoquan to this marina with 100 other Potomac River boaters makes for a fun weekend close to home. A cozy restaurant serves breakfast and lunch and for dinner an evening of music, dance and good times are planned. Day time activities for watching or partaking in many activities makes for an interesting day of play. Most importantly, meet boaters from other yacht clubs, develop new friendships and share your stories. This PRYCA Dog Days of Summer weekend is planned for August 15 to 17.

The Tides Inn

This is the five star resort on the Chesapeake about an hour from the mouth of the Potomac. This marina has it all. Nightly entertainment, tennis, a full service spa, complimentary bicycles, freshwater fishing ponds, four restaurants (including one where jackets for men are required), two swimming pools, etc., etc. A well known year round resort that has a first class marina and top notch facilities. And as a boater renting a slip (\$1.50 per foot, \$50 minimum) all facilities are available for your use. For those of you with an adventuresome spirit and time to spare, you are promised a great week at the Tides Inn from August 17 to 24. And, if you wish just come for the weekend.

Cobb Island

Another fun weekend with the PRYCA and lots of other boaters. Cobb Island is at the corner of the Wicomico and Potomac rivers only two hours away. A ten year old tradition in Cobb Island is a pig roast, parade and river-related fare. In addition, there are a number of restaurants and things to see just a few miles away. St. Clements Island has been described as the birthplace of Maryland and an historical site during the Revolutionary and Civil Wars. Much more to be said about the weekend. Gangplank Marina

Spend a weekend in the city on your boat and see the fireworks at the Washington Monument, enjoy dinner and a show or just enjoy a weekend along Maine Avenue. Three different weekends of activities are planned at this hospitable marina on the Washington shoreline. Early Bird Cruise to D.C. is planned for April 25 to 27. Fireworks on the weekend of July 4 to July 6. And take in a dinner and show at the Arena Stage October 10 to 12. Close in but fun! P.S.: Many, many more exciting events are planned. OYC Protests Marine Patrol Cuts

The OYC Board has written to Fairfax County's police chief, Colonel Thomas Manger, registering "our strongest objection" to any plans to eliminate the Fairfax Marine Patrol unit which regularly patrols the Occoquan area during the boating season.

Commodore Mary Lynn Snowman declared, "With over 1,000 recreational and commercial vessels slipped on the Occoquan River and the surrounding Potomac River tributaries, this action would be detrimental to the recreational boating community of Fairfax and Prince William Counties."

Responding to a similar appeal from OYC member Tom Coldwell, Chief Manger expressed appreciation for our concerns, enumerated the budgetary pressures he faces, and said that the Board of Supervisors has the final say on the 2004 budget, which was to have been presented to the Board of Supervisors on February 24. Manger said that public hearings on the budget are scheduled for April 7, 8, and 9.

How Dry Is Your Harbor?

Did you know that Washington Harbor, the upscale conglomeration of pricey restaurants, offices and condos in Georgetown, is so low to the Potomac that it would be inundated during especially high spring floods were it not for special barriers that have been installed to keep the errant water out?

I first learned about this a few springs ago when I noticed a helicopter picture of the area in the Post, and it seemed flags were coming directly out of the water—very high river water, because the article was about a flood situation. The more I looked at the picture, the more I realized those were the normal American flags that are on top of the light poles, and that the water was almost to the top of the poles. The picture didn't do a good job of showing the barriers, but the article went on to describe how high the water was and the fact that Washington Harbor was dry because the special barriers had been raised.

When we finally got our "spring rains" here around New Years this year, a flood must have been predicted, because as I walked from our new downtown condo across Key Bridge to shop for Susan (no, not from one of the designer stores, from Staples), I noticed the barriers were raised. I pulled a U turn,

scurried home to get the camera, and took the accompanying pictures—one on the dock looking towards the buildings and one at the top of the stairs inside looking over the fountains towards the TR bridge in the distance. The barrier easy to see behind the blue Tony and Joe's awning; one panel is especially rusty. [The colors will show up when the Daymarker is posted on our website.—Ed.]

The metal panels slide below ground when not in use, and are raised by cranes when needed. (The Post article explained the decision to go with this simple but time consuming mechanical system instead of investing in motors and pulleys and devices that would require maintenance over the years.) The panels slide in metal tracks built into the sides of those decorative concrete posts placed equidistant all along the perimeter of the concrete part of the promenade. Not sure what locks them in the up position, but next time you are there look at the top of each in its lowered state between the posts. You can see the two eyelets in the top of each used in raising them.

Well, this wasn't exactly the typical article providing useful boating information, but hopefully you enjoyed seeing something interesting about the river we use so much.

Possible Tax Refund

Anne and I proudly announce that we have completed our tax returns and will be getting a tax refund! Wow, what did we do before Turbo Tax came along and made it so simple that I couldn't even make any mistakes. On a more serious note, as we finalized our taxes we remembered to send to Virginia their Form FT-216 to obtain a refund of fuel taxes paid in 2002. With Virginia assessing 17.5 cents for each gallon of gas (16 cents for diesel) the purchase of 900 gallons (for me about 15 fill-ups for the season) brings a refund of \$157.50.

The refund request must be accompanied by the original receipt for the fuel purchase which must show the date of purchase, gallons and amount paid. Please also keep in mind

that the refund request can still be sent in for 2002. But, not more than 12 months from the date of purchase. For those of you that need the form go to:
