Naming and Renaming a Boat

I'm sure most of you know that I have had a few different boats the last several years. And with each new boat (whether it is straight from the factory or from a used boat lot) comes the requirement to place a name on the boat.

You have probably gone through the hard part of picking out a name but now you have to confer that name to the boat. But boaters tend to be a superstitious lot so you want to do this right, lest a call or two go out to the local boat towing company.

After an intensive Internet search I have found the following two ceremonies, one for christening a new boat and one for de-naming and then renaming a used boat. Use them with the full knowledge of boating superstition.

Boat Christening Ceremony – new boats, written by Commander Bob (<u>www.commanderbob.com</u>). The ceremony goes like this:

(Master of Ceremony) For thousands of years, we have gone to sea. We have crafted vessels to carry us and we have called them by name. These ships will nurture and care for us through perilous seas, and so we affectionately call them "she." To them we toast, and ask to celebrate (name of boat).

(ALL in attendance) To the Sailors of Old ... to (*name of boat*). Followed by a sip of champagne.

(MC) The moods of the sea are many, from tranquil to violent. We ask that this ship be given the strength to carry on. The keel is strong and she keeps out the pressures of the sea.

(ALL) To the Sea ... to the Sailors of old ... to the Sea. Sip of champagne.

(MC) Today we come to name this lady (name of boat), and send her to sea to be cared for, and to care for the *(name of family)* family. We ask the sailors of old and the mood of God that is the sea to accept *(name of boat)* as her name, to help her through her passages, and allow her to return with her crew safely.

(ALL) To the Sea ... to the Sailors of old ... to (name of boat). Long sip of champagne.

Then pour champagne over the bow to appease King Neptune and lay a branch of green leaves on the deck to ensure safe returns.

Boat Christening Ceremony – used boats. First, remove all traces of the old name from the boat and anything on the boat, lest you tempt your fate with having two names for the same boat.

Vigor's De-naming Ceremony

(MC Only Speaker) In the name of all who have sailed aboard this ship in the past, and in the name of all

who may sail aboard her in the future, we invoke the

ancient gods of the wind and the sea to favor us with their blessing today.

Mighty Neptune, king of all that moves in or on the waves; and mighty Aeolus, guardian of the winds and all that blows before them:

We offer you our thanks for the protection you have afforded this vessel in the past. We voice our gratitude that she has always found shelter from tempest and storm and enjoyed safe passage to port.

Now, wherefore, we submit this supplication, that the name whereby this vessel has hitherto been known *(old boat name)*, be struck and removed from your records.

Further, we ask that when she is again presented for blessing with another name, she shall be recognized and shall be accorded once again the selfsame privileges she previously enjoyed.

In return for which, we rededicate this vessel to your domain in full knowledge that she shall be subject as always to the immutable laws of the gods of the wind and the sea.

In consequence whereof, and in good faith, we seal this pact with a libation offered according to the hallowed ritual of the sea.

Then pour champagne over the bow. You may immediately proceed to the Christening Ceremony.

Christening Ceremony

I name this ship *(boat's name)* and may she bring fair winds and good fortune to all who sail on her.

You then get to pour more champagne over the bow. Hey, nobody said this was going to be cheap.

Fourth of July Cruise Update by Maury Shumaker

It is very difficult to reserve slip space near the National Mall around the 4th of July. So difficult in fact, that no commitment has been received from either the Gangplank Marina or the newly remodeled Washington Marina. The result is our Gangplank cruise has been cancelled. The cruise to Alexandria has also been cancelled. OYC members are encouraged to sign up for the cruise to White Point set for the same weekend, July 2 through 4; the coordinator is Rick Sorrenti (703) 590-6724.

Members are also free to raft up on the far side of the Washington Channel across from the Capital Yacht Club if you wish to view the fireworks display Sunday evening. The channel fills up early so you should be at anchor by no later than 1:00PM. It is strongly recommended that you remain at anchor over night as the trip home can, and usually is, very hazardous because of the large number of vessels trying to use the same volume of water at the same time and because of celebratory drink that has probably been consumed.

LAUNCHING PRECAUTIONS

So your boat has been on blocks for the last four or five months and now's the time to get it back on the water. So you check to make sure the plug is in, if there is one, and have the boat splashed! Next morning you get a call from the marina that your pride and joy is resting on the bottom! What happened? I recently heard two true stories, as opposed to sailor scuttlebutt, that merit your attention! The first concerned a 43-footer that was put back in the water after winter storage. Fortunately a cursory and timely inspection discovered lots of water in the bilge. Turned out that the sea strainers had not been properly secured after the fall clean out. This could have been disastrous as in the second story. After putting a 38-footer back in and assuming all was well, the owner went home. Next day he received a call from the marina that his boat had sunk and that for \$2,000 they would refloat the boat. Turns out that the engine thru-hull had cracked from winter freezing and the rest is history.

It seems that strange things happen to boats during the winter. For no apparent reason things that worked when the boat was hauled out don't work when re-floated! The most important items that should be checked are those things that allow for water to get into the boat: thru-hull fittings, hoses, plugs, etc. I find the best way is to physically touch these critical items. If you can shake a hose or thru-hull loose then you can be assured it would have broken loose at a less convenient time.

The second thing to check are the intakes that provide water to the engines or air conditioning units. They should be clean and open. Make sure some insect or bird hasn't adopted the opening for its home. Last year I learned first hand the impacts of a clogged air conditioner intake from sea grasses.

The bottom line is that if your boat has been on shore for the winter, you should make a careful inspection of all openings, hoses, etc. Don't assume that because all was well before winter that all is well now.

Cicada-Licious, Cooking and Enjoying Periodical Cicadas

Borrowed from Jenna Jadin and the University of Maryland Cicadamaniacs

Cicadas contain a high protein content, and since they eat only vegetable matter, are a pure and wholesome food source. They are said to be tasty, having a delicate nutty flavor.

Who to cook: newly hatched cicadas are considered best for eating because their shells have not hardened. It is best to collect these in the very early hours of the morning, just after they have emerged. You can cook them immediately, or refrigerate them, or freeze them. Here's a couple recipes.

Shanghai Cicadas

<u>Ingredients</u>: 30 newly-emerged cicadas, 2 tbsp anise seeds, 1 tsp salt, 2 cups rice wine, additional water and rice wine, 8 cloves mashed garlic, celery to garnish, turnip greens to garnish

Directions:

1. Boil the cicadas and anise in salted rice wine for five minutes, then remove the cicadas.

Saute the mashed garlic, adding enough of equal parts water and rice wine to make a thick paste.
 Deep-fry the cicadas, then skewer them with bamboo picks. Arrange them on a plate with the turnip greens, celery, and garlic paste to look like cicadas climbing out of a mud pie into green foliage.

Maryland Cicadas

Ingredients: ½ cup Old Bay ® Seasoning, 2 tbsp salt, 4 quarts water, 1 (12 oz.) can beer (optl), 8 red potatoes, quartered, 2 large sweet onions, cut in wedges, 2 lbs lean smoked sausage, cut in 2-in lengths, 8 ears fresh corn, broken in half, 4 lbs large cicadas Directions:

1. In an 8-quart pot, bring Old Bay, salt, water, and beet to a boil. Add potatoes and onions; cook over high heat for 8 mins.

 Add smoked sausage; continue to cook for 5 mins.
 Drain cooking liquid. Pour contents into several large bowls, shallow pails, or mound on a papercovered picnic table. Sprinkle with Additional Old Bay if desired.
