#### THE PRICE OF A LUXURY

I was on the fuel dock at OHM and a couple of folks were complaining about the price of fuel. Over the past several months we have witnessed an increase in fuel prices and have seen even fewer boaters out on the water. Some owners say it is directly related to the cost of fuel. Not sure why this is happening, I felt it was time to put all of this into perspective.

Boating, like many activities, is considered in some circles as a luxury and a needless expense or waste of our natural resources ... it's the fossil fuel thing. Lets put things into perspective and first consider chocolate. I haven't met a member of OYC yet that can turn down chocolate. Right? A pound of good chocolate costs \$7.50. A gallon of fuel cost \$2.50 and it weighs approximately 8 pounds. That would have us

spending \$60.00 on an equivalent amount of chocolate or 31 cents on a pound of fuel. We can no longer drink tap water, it has to be bottled. You will pay \$1.50 for an 8 oz bottle of water in a minute, but would you pay \$12.00 for a gallon?

Now for a weekend get away analysis. We'll hop in the car and take off for a weekend and easily spend \$150 a night for a hotel room. Add other expenses and that could easily total \$500 for the weekend.

Lets look at an OYC weekend on-board your boat. An average gallon per hour figure for most of the boats in OYC would be

roughly 14 gallons per hour. At \$500 that equates to 12 or so hours of cruising with no set destination or

itinerary to worry about. It's pure relaxation. It's obvious that boating makes economic sense, when we put it in the context of the things we do; it's more fun with the club and you can enjoy all those great stories we share. The bottom line is; let's go boating; it's better for your health and don't worry about the price of fuel!

With this in mind, the Hardy Souls Cruise and the Santa Cruise are the last official OYC cruising events for the boating season. Cruise coordinators need to hear from you.

Our club has the largest membership ever and thanks go to each of you for talking about the OYC to your boating friends. The coming winter months are also the time for us to continue to enjoy the club. Over the four or so winter months we will be hosting several shore-based activities that we feel you will find enjoyable. Please read your Daymarker carefully as some require advance reservations. Our holiday party, that you and your

#### IS IT TIME TO WINTERIZING YET?

Can you believe it's November already? The leaves are changing, the boat show is over (No, we did not buy a new boat), and the holidays are fast approaching so now is the time to think about winterizing your boat. When I mention the word "winterize" all you Captains may pay closer attention, while the First Mates tune out. But this article is for the First Mate because these are some of those things the Captain probably doesn't know, or care, about when it comes time to *Winterize*.

First, it gets cold in the winter so lets make sure you remove anything that might freeze from those hidden storage areas, i.e. extra bottles of wine, beer, soda, etc. Don't forget to check the medicine cabinet; although I believe frozen toothpaste won't burst its tube you may have some other liquids in there.

Empty your refrigerator and freezer, give it a good cleaning, turn off the power to it, and leave the door open a bit for ventilation. Although the cold of winter would help preserve your frozen goodies you wouldn't want to eat anything after it has sat all winter.

Remove all your clothing, linens, towels, and the like. Take them home and give them a good washing. After all, when WAS the last time you washed those sheets. Leaving them on board could promote strange smells come spring time with the boat all closed up. And the fresh smell in the spring will start you off on the right foot.

While you are at it, clean out the dish cabinets and silverware drawer. A trip to the dishwasher at home won't do them any harm and may just get rid of something that could fester over the winter months.

Batteries, no not the ones that power the engines and boat, but those that you find in flash lights, radios, and other portable electronic devices. It would be a good idea to remove the batteries from these items.

Finally, don't forget to put out the mildew prevention crystals. They might not be necessary but in the off chance that some moisture seeps in imagine opening your boat for the first time in 2005 only to be hit by a musty odor.

Start out your 2005 season on the right foot, winterize properly in 2004.

# Drownings and the Wearing of Personal Flotation Devices

This past August 25th, PC Ned Rhodes and I represented the PRYCA at a public forum on "Personal Floatation Devices in recreational Boating". It was an all day activity and was hosted by the National Transportation and Safety Board (NTSB) at their new Academy in Ashburn, VA. Although the NTSB hosted the forum, they emphasized they had no position on the subject and they did not participate in the discussions.

As stated in the agenda, "The purpose of the forum is to gather all available data, and to promote an open and informative discussion of policy issues related to mandatory use of personal flotation devices (PFD) on recreational boats". The forum was divided into four Panels:

Panel I, presented the data and statistics describing the circumstances surrounding fatal accidents in recreational boating with particular emphasis on PFD use, policy and certification. There were five on the Panel representing the USCG, USCG contractors, and a representative from the Canadian Safe Boating Council. The primary emphasis of the Panel was to provide statistics showing how many drownings could have been prevented if all boaters had been wearing a PFD.

There were 703 boating fatalities in 2003, with 481 from drowning. Of the drowning victims, 416 were not wearing a PFD, and 470 were on boats less than 22 feet in length.

Over all, the PFD wear rate by adults is only slightly more than 22%. There are exceptions. PWC user wear rate is over 96%, Paddlers over 71%, and Daysailors over 54%. The wear rate by children under 6 is 88.8% and for children 6 to 12 is 75.6%. It was noted that these higher percentages for children were most likely a result of state mandates.

There was lengthy discussion regarding mandatory wearing by both adults and children on all recreational boats, no matter what size. The general consensus of the Panel I members was that mandatory wearing of PFD's by all persons (adult and children) on open boats under 22 feet in length should be the logical conclusion.

Panel II, presented the State-level perspective on mandatory PFD requirements. There were four individuals on the Panel representing the National Association of State Boating Law Administrators (NASBLA), the National Boating Safety Advisory Council (NBSAC), and the National Safe Boating Council (NSBC). It was interesting to note that the NASBLA representatives, both law enforcement officers, one from Nevada and one from Tennessee, were against Federal regulations that would require adults to wear PFD's. They felt states should have the flexibility to legislate. The general consensus of the Panel II members was that boater education, mandatory



PFD wear for children, and advances in technology/design of PFD's has not, thus far, resulted in higher wear rates. They had no suggestions other than continuing to promote child PFD wearing, encouraging industry to expand PFD options at an affordable cost, and working with states to develop mandatory education for the boating public.

Panel III, presented the recreational boaters' perspective on PFD use. There were three Panel members representing Boat/US, the American Canoe Association, and the Personal Watercraft Industry Association. Jim Ellis, President of Boats/US, placed the fatality percentages provided by the Government into perspective. There has been a steady decline in fatalities over the past 10 years with 2001 having the all-time 30-year low. This was during a time when boating use has grown at an enormous rate. The statistics shown by the Government need to be put in perspective. They are misleading. A point of

> interest is that 37% of the drownings with no PFD were persons who were swimming around a boat and would not have been wearing a PFD anyway. The general conclusion of the Panel III members was there should be a combined effort by the industry, associations, media, and the USCG to find solutions that encourage the wearing of PFD's that are wearable and inexpensive rather than issuing mandatory Federal regulations.

Panel IV, presented the boating manufacturer perspective. The four Panel members represented the Personal Flotation Device Manufacturers Association (PFDMA), the Marine Retailers Association of America (MRAA), the National Marine Manufacturers Association (NMMA), and OWA, Inc. All

representatives emphasized there have been a number of advancements in PFD technology in the past few years. All Panel IV members were against Federal mandates for adult wear of PFD's. The best summary drawn for Panel IV was the conclusion presented by NMMA. They recommend, mandatory boater education, reducing alcohol consumption while boating, increasing boater awareness of risks, promotion of new technology PFD's, continued research and development of "wearable" PFD's, strong effective law enforcement of existing laws, and "Learn to Swim" programs for children.

All in all, the forum was very informative. Presentations were well done. Everyone was given an adequate chance to ask questions of the panelists. I left at the end of the day with the feeling there is considerable opposition to a Federal mandate requiring adult boaters to wear a PFD while under way in "all" boats but that there is wide support for a requirement for boaters to wear PFD's in small boats. Also, the Government is a long way from drawing any conclusion or recommending any legislation at this time. It looks like their initial focus will most likely be on open boats of less than 22 feet where there are the most accidents. There will be more meetings in the future and, if required, time to develop more comments.

# The Legend of Suicide Bridge Secretary, Maryland

The **first** victim of Suicide Bridge was a postmaster from Hurlock, who shot himself and then fell into the water of Cabin Creek.

The **second** victim was a farmer who also shot himself and fell into the swirling waters of the Dorchester County Creek.

**Next** was a man who some say willfully dove off the bridge, while others say he met with foul play. Pete Moxey, a lifelong resident of the area, was eight or nine years old when it happened.

"It's the first one I remember. A

fellow they called "Frog". He was black, short and stocky. They claimed he jumped off the bridge and hit his head on the piling. But the word was going around there was foul play in it. I don't know," the 60 year-old Mr. Moxey said.

He remembers that once the body was found, "they put him on a table over there in a picnic area and did an autopsy, right out in the open." Mr. Moxey, however, was sent home before the autopsy was performed.

The original bridge was a wooden structure built around 1888. The **second** bridge, also wooden and only one lane, was built around 1910. The **third** and current bridge, which is also wooden but covered with asphalt, was built in 1967 and dedicated in January 1968. Local residents apparently have always called it Suicide Bridge.

Mr. Moxey said he was surprised at how quickly another suicide occurred after the third bridge was built.

"It was up for six months, then bingo, somebody went off," he said.



"I helped pull that guy out of the water... He had been a long-time employee at Continental Can in Hurlock and was just coming off a long vacation," Mr. Moxey said.

> "Instead of going back to work, he drove here, parked his car and jumped off the bridge."

After rescuers located the body, Mr. Moxey said, the ropes got tangled and he got in his boat to help bring the body out. The body was placed on the dock.

"The blood soaked into the wood on the dock and it never washed away," said Mr. Moxey. "It was there for

about five years. I tore it down and built another."

Another man, born and raised within a half of a mile of the bridge, moved away for many years, came back, parked his car by the foot of the bridge and shot himself.

"I don't think the bridge is jinxed. Maybe it's just the name that brings them here." Mr. Moxey said of the suicides.

In a more recent incident, Dave Nickerson, who lives across the creek next to the bridge, was awakened one morning by calls of "Help... help." Seeing a car parked on the bridge, he immediately jumped into his skiff and zoomed to where calls were coming from. He pulled a woman from the icy water where she had apparently changed her mind about committing suicide. Nickerson immediately took her ashore, ran to her car, which was running and parked on the bridge and drove to the skiff. When he tried to get the women into the warm car she replied, "I don't want to get the seats wets -- it's a new car!"

# City of Alexandria Wants Old Dominion Boat Club's Property

At its June 22, 2004 meeting, the Alexandria City Council adopted a list of "priority properties" that its Open Space Steering Committee had identified as the most significant open space sites in the City. The Steering Committee plan recommended short term action be taken to acquire, among other sites, the Old Dominion Boat Club clubhouse building at 1 King St. and its parking/boat lot/launch ramp at 2 King St. These properties were identified as being "the" highest priority for acquisition.

At that same meeting, the Council directed the City Manager to prepare an "Open Space Priority List (OSPL) Action Plan." This plan was to address actions that could be taken to "protect" these properties, timing, anticipated cost, and financing the acquisitions.



On September 28, 2004, the City Manager presented his Action Plan to the Council saying "...that it is time to take the Boat Club's parking lot." His plan recommended as the first step: obtaining an appraisal for the lot; discussing its sale with the ODBC; and either reaching a voluntary sale of the lot or initiating condemnation proceedings.

At that time, the Manager's plan called for future discussions with the ODBC concerning its clubhouse.

To put all this before the public the Council scheduled a Saturday, October 16, 2004, public hearing on the proposed action plan "to protect properties identified in the OSPL" and an October 26 legislative meeting to adopt and implement the plan.

Proudly wearing ODBC attire to the October 16 Council meeting, 14 speakers from ODBC and a number of others rose to provide compelling reasons why ODBC is a good citizen and not deserving of this action. The speakers' themes touched on the Boat Club's history in Alexandria since 1880, the fact that the ODBC clubhouse is the last remaining visage of Alexandria's original waterfront, its 80 year long support for the City's public and private rowing programs, its numerous philanthropic and volunteer activities, its ongoing cooperation with public safety officials from both sides of the river needing a boat launch site, its prompt rebuilding of its docks following *Isabel*, and the down sides of not having any boat club in the City.

Clearly the basis for an elongated fight about which we will be hearing a lot more (especially because a similar case is before the US Supreme Court), to the club's 700 members—a great many of whom crowded Council chambers for the hearing—it seems that the City's only reason for wanting to take the ODBC property is to create an uninterrupted open space/park along the Alexandria waterfront.
