Lots of information was reviewed during the course but it was fundamentally an in-depth review of safety, firefighting, and overall large (read commercial) vessels. I believe we three agree that we have completed enough boating education to last for quite some time. If you have any questions or need information on the school or what is involved in getting a license, give me a call. I know you will find the effort very challenging but extremely worthwhile as you hone your boating skills. We are also told that discounts are available on your

insurance for completion of these courses.

#### WHEN BOATING IS NO LONGER FUN

When do you think it would no longer be fun to go boating? Give yourself a couple seconds to think about that. My Captain has a good answer. Boating no longer would be fun when the Potomac River turns into I95. And the last weekend in May was the closest we have come to drawing the connection between the two.

We had a great time with the OYC group at Colonial Beach and were heading back upriver. It was getting a little busy (boat traffic wise) after making the turn around Maryland Point and the amount of debris in the river was mounting. Based on the courtesies being displayed by other boaters the Captain was thinking that everyone was having fun. Then, all of a sudden, while I was down below, the boat suddenly came to an almost complete stop. I was saying to myself that we must have hit something and the next thing I would hear was the cursing of the Captain. But I never heard the customary "Thud" against the hull. However, upon reaching the bridge I did hear the expected cursing. It appears that a smaller boat, 24 - 26 feet, was overtaking us to starboard. The Captain said they were only 50 feet off the beam. Then, when less then 100 feet ahead of us they cut across our bow heading for Aquia Creek. Now it's possible that we could have just jumped the wake but the Captain was so shocked at the other boat's actions he pulled the throttles way back to make sure our boat would stay out of harms way.

To make matters worse, further up river at Occoquan Bay and starting a slow turn to port to enter the channel the same thing happened again. This time the other boat, a 22foot open bow, was further off but still overtaking us. When he got closer and finally saw that we were turning, instead of slowing down and attempting to cross behind us he gunned his engine and sped by, passing about 120 feet off the bow. Fortunately required evasive maneuvers were not as drastic as the Captain was more prepared.

In both cases the drivers of the other boats were not following the basic principle that the boat being overtaken has the right-of-way. Perhaps the smaller boats did not want to pass over the wake of a larger boat. However,

They would also know that the one overriding rule is that all boats must take action to prevent accidents no matter who has the right-of-way. So on both occasions the Captain took evasive action, possibly provided a hand jester or two, grumbled a little (okay maybe it was more then a little), and got boat and crew back to port safely. His final comment on the issue was, "There's a couple of good candidates for the Darwin Awards."

With the rise in the number of boats on the river there are bound to be some operators that are clueless. With detailed reporting of incidents to local authorities perhaps we can increase the safety of boating for our friends and ourselves. Think of the alternative, increased governmental regulation responding to increased accident and fatalities. Have fun out there and don't line up to compete for the Darwin awards.

#### **GREMLINS AND MAINTENANCE**

Now the boating season is fully underway, and everyone has had at least one or two engine malfunctions, there are some routines that you should practice no matter how well the boat is running. I have yet to hear a good explanation as to why an engine will somehow break in between cruises. You shut the engine off, (it had been purring) and when you start it back up it sounds more like a cat gagging up a hairball! The answer is simple, gremlins. They are everywhere. They hide in the dark recesses of the bilge. They do their dirty work when no one is around. Most importantly, I think they are in cahoots with boat yard mechanics.

Recently, a friend had an engine overheat and had to be towed back to the dock. It was his maiden voyage after having some minor engine work completed. Apparently after the mechanic finished his work, the gremlins snuck in and closed the seacock on the engine intake! A proven routine that you should practice is that before every trip, check out the dark recesses of the engine compartment. Check those seacocks, fan belts, oil levels, etc. This is especially true if a mechanic has been on the boat. Do not ASS\_U\_ME that everything is copasetic.

Another routine I have is to check the engine compartment after a cruise. I have placed white oilabsorbent mats under the engines; that way, if anything is leaking, grinding, or leaving debris behind I can readily spot it. It will also show gremlin droppings, a sure indication that they were there and you'd better check further. If you have ever noticed that the Coast Guard safety inspectors carry a flashlight with them? They know that gremlins may be hiding in the engine compartment or bilge and the only way to spot them is with a thorough inspection. A routine inspection of engines before and after every cruise will help to keep the gremlins away. They don't like to be disturbed!




