

Commodore's Comments



THE LABOR DAY CRUISE THAT ALMOST WASN'T

It was a cold dark morning and there was the threat of rain in the air. The water level on the river was exceptionally high and there was all kinds of debris floating around. So what was I doing on my boat? Why preparing to get underway of course. After all, what kind of a holiday weekend would it be if my Captain and I weren't off to some far away port-of-call to enjoy a few days "away from it all" on the boat. Does it matter that less then 36 hours before there was a tropical depression overhead and storm surge was so high that boats on liftslips at the marina were slipping away? Heck no. Or at least that is what three hearty, or you could say crazy, crews thought that day.

Just the day before, we were notified that our reservations at Point Lookout were cancelled by the marina. Water was two feet over the docks, there was no electricity, and dock planks were starting to come loose and float away. So where to go ... how about White Point? It's just across the river from Point Lookout so they must have easily skirted the same fate, right? So after several calls to the marina, with no answers, we were off. But being the good First Mate that I was I suggested that we first top off the fuel tanks just in case we couldn't get any fuel down river. Others in the group didn't see the need.

So, after a lot of stop and go traffic on the river (boy, I never thought I'd ever hear myself saying that about boating) due to the limbs, whole trees, and even picnic table floating about we three crazy boat crews pulled in to White Point. One boat, that shall remain nameless, pulled up to the fuel dock to get enough fuel to make it to their next destination, and immediately discovered that without electricity you can't pump fuel. Imagine that! Well, at least the docks were now above the high tide level. So we tied up, found the marina owner, and were welcomed with open arms showing that there are some boaters out there that will go the distance. Some of the other crews with boats home ported there might have thought otherwise but what did we care. We made it!

Everyone easily got into a slip – there weren't any availability problems typically found during a holiday weekend. With no power we ran the generators for a couple hours every now and then just to ensure that the house batteries didn't discharge too much. The weather was cool so sleeping with hatches open was a viable and enjoyable option, the hum of landbased generators in the distance lulling us to sleep. There was also the need to have a little hot water, something that most folks in the area had gone without for a couple days now. But Wait! You need water in the tank in order to heat it. What's this? Someone didn't fill their tank before departing? There was no water at the marine. You can't pump water from a well without electricity. Well, with the generous offering of water at only \$2.50 a gallon from their fellow boaters (the negotiations were at times tense and heated) this forlorn crew who shall remain nameless, managed to enjoy the comforts of hot showers and the use of their head facilities.




Fall Membership Meeting (Annual Chili & Dessert Cook-Off)

3 oz's cranberry juice 2 oz's orange juice

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When Does a New Boat Become a Used Boat?

Some may say a boat becomes "used" the day you take delivery, others may say the day you start your first cruise or the day you put it up for sale. I say it's when you stop having fun with it; you know, when the hassles of keeping it working takes up more time then the time you spend enjoying it (that is unless you enjoy the trials and tribulations of performing your own maintenance and repairs). And this definition can be applied to previously owned boats as well as one straight from the factory.

This was the main reason I got rid of my second boat. The hassles of maintaining it usurped the pleasures of ownership. Here's my story.

My first boat, a 2001 Bayliner 2850, was new off

the lot. But after a one week cruise, there was a near mutiny by the crew. It seemed that a little more interior space was required. New became used. It was time to get something a little more



accommodating (read pleasing to the crew). Of course, as the Captain, I was just as happy to move up to something a little BIGGER, arrgh arrgh (author's poor Tim Allen imitation).

The second one, a 1997 Carver 360 Mariner, was about four years old when we got it. Granted it was a beautiful sight to see. But below the deck I seemed to



find myself always fixing this or that. One could say that it was a good "learning" boat, where

you can increase your understanding of maintaining it. And, after one episode of water entering the bilge at a faster rate then most would consider safe, I decided it was time to move up. New became used.

Boat number three, a 2004 Carver 366 Motor Yacht, was all I dreamed of in a boat. It was custom-made at the factory to add to our boating pleasure. Now being a new boat there were warranty issues but



the engines and electronics were spot on. I had two years of shear pleasure sitting in my custom helm seat. Unfortu-

nately, it didn't quite fit our style of boating. My wife (your Commodorable) and I like to invite guests on board and just anchor out on the water. I can count the number of times we did this in two years on one hand. We began to think of it as a second home, not a waterborn recreational vehicle. Thus new, unfortunately, became used.

This brings us to present day. Another brand new boat, Bigger, Better, and more Powerful. It, a 2006 Regal 3860, answers all the questions of past weaknesses; lots of room below deck, lots of room above deck, and no maintenance worries. Wait! Did someone say no maintenance worries? Well, two out of three ain't bad, right? Some may say yes, some may say no, and others may say the jury's still out. (It all



depends on the day you ask.) Sometimes manufacturers' way of thinking can really get to you. After all, if customers complain about the aft sump box always backing up it makes perfect sense to reroute the A/C condensate drain (which drains pure clean water not capable of clogging up anything except maybe your mind) into the engine compartment bilge where it sits waiting to accumulate to a sufficient height for the bilge pump to suck most, but not all, of it overboard. And the maintenance list goes on, slowly but eventually becoming shorter.

So, if I asked you if you thought my latest boat was new or used what would you say? Well, today I think it is still new. If you had asked me yesterday I would have told you I was looking at the Four Winns web site. And who knows, I may be looking again next week. All I can say is that this year's Annapolis Boat Show is going to be VERY interesting.
