



Did you know that . . .

rubbing down stainless steel rails with a rag containing Vaseline petroleum jelly helps to prevent rust and corrosion from developing. The Vaseline will embed into the pores of the steel. It does not need to be a thick coat. You can also wipe it down a second time with a dry cloth and maintain the protective coating.

SAFETY COMES FIRST !!!

I hope you all are taking advantage of the beautiful weather and getting ready for a wonderful summer season of boating. Let me share our first day at the boat. Cleaning is, of course, one of the worst parts except when it is 80 degrees and sunny. It renews the soul to be able to walk down the dock and start loading up the boat. We had great plans of finishing the job in one hour or less and then starting the engines and dodging the mess in the river from the Nor'easter Not so fast, cleaning is a lot harder than anyone anticipates and it doesn't help to be surrounded by friends who get you distracted. Bottom line, we did not aet out of the slip but we still had a wonderful day with lots of promise of a wonderful season to come.

On that note let me remind you that safety comes FIRST!!!

Every boater should take an American Red Cross or other approved first aid course. It is not only important for your own personal safety but for your passengers. Most medical "emergencies" are minor cuts, burns, sprains, stings and punctures. Make sure you are prepared with the appropriate bandage, ointment, cold-pack, medication, or tweezers. Extra medication is also good for your fellow boaters. They might not be as prepared as you. This kit should to sufficient to deal with common problems such as sunburn, scraped, bruises, minor burns, seasickness and bug bites. If you don't have these items, make sure a nurse is on the cruise with you.

To refresh your first aid kit, make sure you have this as a minimum:

- 1. First aid manual
- 2. Adhesive bandages in various sizes
- 3. 3-inch sterile pads
- 4. Triangular bandages
- 5. 1 and 3 inch rolled bandages
- 6. Tweezers and blunt scissors
- 7. Cotton balls and cotton tipped applicators
- 8. Antiseptic
- 9. Sun screen
- 10. Calamine lotion
- 11. Motion sickness pills or patches
- 12. Aspirin or Tylenol
- 13. Eyewash cup
- 14. Benadryl for allergic reactions
- 15. Ice to reduce swelling and minimize

orthopedic injures, of course we all have that! 16. Vanilla rum for pain if all else fails

SAFER BOATING THROUGH GOOD

COMMUNICATION

Boating is not a solitary activity. It's best done with at least two people on board. That's so the captain has someone to command. If the captain gives an order and there's no one there to shout "Ave!", is he still the captain?

Communication is an essential component of safe boating. That's why the Coast Guard has that cheatsheet sticker for your helm in case you can't remember how many horn blasts it takes to inform the captain of the oncoming vessel that you are about to ram him if he doesn't fade off to starboard, (his, not yours.) You can only hope the other guy has the code committed to memory, because there won't be time for him to consult his cheat-sheet in order to figure out what you were trying to tell him. This points out the most important aspect of good communication - actual understanding by both the sending and receiving parties must occur.

In the case of a captain and his first mate, actual, mutual understanding is a rare thing. First of all, mates don't always comprehend, or at least acknowledge, the magnitude of the authority the captain believes he wields. Typically, their response is not, "How high?" when he says "Jump!" They are usually more inclined to counter, "Not until you change the tone of that voice!"

Smart captains have learned to lower their expectations; instead of insisting on instant, accurate execution of their every command, they will settle for minimal attempts to complete the task at some point in time. There will still be occasion when fast action is critical, so for those times, it is especially important that the captain choose his words, and his tone, carefully. He must convey his message succinctly, and the mate must comprehend that direction precisely.

Ambiguous phrases like, 'over there' create confusion. Where, exactly, is 'over there'? And when the first mate requires clarification, it does not make for better understanding if the captain simply repeats the exact wording that wasn't clear the first time. Saying it louder doesn't necessarily help.

Most boating couples get these glitches in communication smoothed out over the years of working together to get the boat from point A to point B and back again without mishap, but at the beginning of every boating season, a little practice is required to bring those skills back up to par. Just as you need to get your 'sea legs' back after a long, land-locked winter, you may need to get your 'boat speak' back as well.

When the captain issues clear commands in neutral voice tones, the first mate might offer a few crisp salutes; and a little "Aye, Aye!" thrown in now and then can't hurt. But recitation of "O Captain, My Captain!" is absolutely not necessary.


