#### Fall Cruising

In October and November, many boaters start to winterize their vessels, changing the oil, draining the water, and perhaps even wrapping the boat for the winter pause in cruising. DON'T DO IT! Not yet anyway.

Some of the best times we have had on the boat occur in the fall months. The night-time temperatures drop low enough that we don't have to run the generator for air conditioning while at anchor. Most of the jet-boat crowd is gone, so we don't constantly roll and pitch from them driving 50 MPH or more past us! And the beauty of the changing foliage colors is breathtaking. This is not Maine, where the temperatures are cold enough to make your teeth chatter. This is Virginia, where we often have beautiful, warm days well into December. Granted, you may have to wear a sweater and bundle up at night, but the weather is usually clear, with mild day-time temperatures and low humidity, quite a contrast to the weather of August.

We recently spent a night on the hook in Mattawoman Bay (see photo below). It's a short trip from the Occoquan River that burns little fuel, but provides big dividends. The only down side was the insect suicidehatch that left a bazillion dead critters all over the canvas. Luckily, they all washed off. Condensation was also another annoyance, but the sounds of geese flying overhead, the sight of bald eagles fishing, and a full moon provided memories to sustain us through the winter.

So instead of winterizing your boat next weekend, go out for a short trip, or maybe even stay overnight. The winterizing can wait, but the time you're not on the boat is lost forever.

## Santa Cruise to Occoquan 29 November 2008

#### Name that Hurricane!

Now that the hurricane season is fully upon us, have you ever wondered how tropical cyclones and hurricanes are named? The information is available on the World Meteorological Organization's website (<a href="www.wmo.int">www.wmo.int</a>). Naming storms, rather than numbering them, was initiated because people more easily remember names than numbers and technical terms. Also, naming storms may assist the media in publicizing these potentially dangerous threats to communities and in heightening public awareness of approaching danger.

Initially storm names were arbitrarily assigned with only women's names but later men's names were

included as well. In attempting to place order to chaos, forecasters decided to identify storms using names from an alphabetically arranged list. Thus, the first storm in a year would have a name beginning with an "A" such as "Andrew" or "Anne". Today, most storm centers use a rotating list of names that can be reused, as long as the name has not been retired from the list. A storm name is retired if it has caused extensive damage to lives and property. For example, infamous storms such as Camille (USA 1969) and Tracy (Darwin, 1974) are examples of retired names. To avoid name duplication, the name lists are prepared several years in advance and are well distributed to the storm warning centers.

With the start of the new century, a new set of names will be used that adjusts the storm naming process to address the regional and cultural differences around the world. By doing so, storms will have more regional identity and this will potentially improve storm warning procedures.




