OYC captures the GOLD!

Forget the mundane articles, stop the presses, and pass out the champagne . . . OYC won the 2009 PRYCA Cup by such a wide margin as to be indisputable!

For those who have never been to a Potomac River Yacht Clubs Association Float-In, the PRYCA Cup is the highly prized trophy awarded to the club that accumulates the greatest number of points in a series of events designed to foster boating skills and safety awareness. As those who have attended in the past are well aware, the competition is keen!

Since 1992, OYC has won the Cup only three times; our last victory was in 1997. This year we started with a leg up on the points for vessel safety checks - all 9 boats arrived with current safety check stickers in place, (even our newest members, Tom and Liz Plewes on *Double Eagle*,) a tribute to our team spirit and our dedication to boating safety. After a planning session/happy hour aboard the Gail Lynn II, hosted by Joe and Gail Livingston on Friday night, the contestants for the four events scheduled for Saturday were chosen, and OYC was ready to compete. The first event was the Navigation/Skills Test. The format was changed this year, requiring separate tests from each team member, one male and one female, ending with the tying of five knots. Pat Croft and Tom Lensis represented OYC admirably; most notably, they were the only team in the competition to have both members demonstrate ability to tie all five knots! (I take some measure of credit for this, having tutored Pat personally in knot tying the night before the test.)

Jim and Judy Dooley arrived at Port Kinsale on Saturday morning with just minutes to spare before entering the Life Jacket Skills event. Standing on a small box, back-to-back, Judy and Jim demonstrated perfect balance as Judy first donned the life jacket, tied it securely, then removed it and passed it off to Jim, who managed to put it on and tie it securely, all without falling off the box. We knew they had done well, but the results were not yet announced.

Also still on the river Saturday morning were Eric and Carol Belcher, who were entered in the next event, the "Boson Skills with a Twist" contest. I called on the cell phone several times just to make sure they would make it. Eric poured the coal to the engines and made it to Kinsale in record time. They docked their boat and dashed up the hill to the contest site just in time to hear the contest instructions: contestants had to work in pairs to carry a ball on a tray, step up on a box, then go under a net, then step up on another box before hurrying across the finish line. Eric and Carol performed these tasks with great balance and alacrity. They then had to pick up a life ring and toss it to hit a target box; Eric flung the ring and hit the target on his first try, and Carol nailed it on only her second try, no small accomplishment. Other teams were still flinging the ring long after Eric and Carol finished. It was a wipeout, with OYC clearly the winner, even though results were not yet announced.

At this juncture, although official results had not yet been tallied, I could sense that OYC was really in the race for The Cup, and because of this great anticipation, I engaged in a bit of premature celebration. I soon succumbed to Smirnoff's virus, which required a little bed rest, but Team OYC forged on!

The last event was the Kayak Relay Race, which consisted of two elements: fastest time and least amount of water lost when carrying water in a bucket from point A to point B in the kayak. Again, pairs worked together, and each club entered two pairs. The twist to this event this year had the pairs sitting in two kayaks hooked side by side, facing in opposite directions, each person with one paddle, and each person having to pick up a bucket full of water, place it in their kayak, and then race to a finish line, whereupon the second pair for the club would begin the same maneuvers. Rick and Teresa Sorrenti, and Jim Hawley and Meimei Tidrow performed flawlessly for OYC, maintaining a steady combination of good speed and careful water handling. The results were not announced until later that night, but we all knew OYC was looking good.

After a rapid recovery from the aforementioned virus, I rejoined Team OYC on the lawn to await the much anticipated announcement of official results, which came after a wonderful buffet dinner at the Moorings restaurant. Tensions mounted as we listened to each result. We were given full credit for our 100% vessel safety checks. Pat and Tom took 2nd place in the Navigation Test, earning 4 points. Jim and Judy added 2 points with their 4th place finish in the Life Jacket event. Eric and Carol brought home 5 big points with their 1st place finish in the Boson Skills event. The combined teams of Rick and Teresa and Jim and Meimei earned two 'medals' – 3rd place for the timed event and 1st place for water handling. I held my breath for the final announcement –doubt no longer existed – it had to be an OYC victory!

Sure enough – when they announced us as the winning club, Team OYC burst into rousing cheers! It was a moment to cherish!! Later that evening, Team OYC assembled on *Copy Cat*, hosted by Tom and Donna Lensis, to celebrate, and celebrate we did! As Rick Sorrenti was oft quoted, "To the Cup!!!" was always followed by another round of good spirits. The last time OYC won the cup was twelve years ago. We now have twelve months to enjoy the victory and bragging rights, and to hone our skills in preparation for another victory next year. I am proud to be the Commodore of the winning club. To the Cup!!! To Team OYC!!!

Good to Know—Coast Guard's Notice to Mariners

We have been out on the Chesapeake Bay twice now this year. Most recently, we were at Annapolis for the 4th of July. We shopped, watched a very nice fireworks display, and enjoyed a great steak dinner at Lewne's Steakhouse (we still thank Pat Croft for that tip every time, although it's not our first time there!). I mention this trip specifically because the leg back from Annapolis to Pt. Lookout Marina was one of those absolutely great days on the bay that are the reason that we cruise. One other item to mention about cruising on the Potomac River below the 301 bridge. You can use this link to sign up:

For example, it might be nice to know when the U.S. Navy will be shooting into the river from their Dahlgren facility so you can work your schedule around this, because it appears to me that they shoot directly at the channel markers that we tend to follow.

This used to be very important to us before the *Mr. Wilson Bridge* was done. Check it out. It could come in handy one day.

River Recipes

Here are a couple of recipes that are easy to take along when you hit the river. One is a spin on chocolate chip cookies, and the other is easy to make on the go with few ingredients and no bother.

CONGO SQUARES (bake ahead and take in a sealable container to keep the bars soft)

2 ¾ c flour
½ t. salt
2 ½ t. baking powder
1 lb. brown sugar (box)
2/3 c. melted butter or oleo
3 eggs
1 c. chocolate chips
1 a abappad walauta (aptianal)

1 c. chopped walnuts (optional)

Sift together all dry ingredients. Mix together the butter, brown sugar, eggs, nuts, and chocolate chips, and add the flour mixture to this mixture. Pour onto a large cookie sheet which has been well greased. Bake for 25 to 30 minutes at 350 degrees. Remove from oven when golden brown. Cut into bars. The smaller the bars, the more you have.

CHERRY NUT SALAD

1 can of cherry pie filling (I use the light)

- 1 c. mini marshmallows
- 1 c. finely diced walnuts

1 container cool whip (I use Cool Whip free—no fat, no sugar)

Mix all ingredients in a large bowl and serve. No mess, no hassle. I love this recipe.

The Belchers also arrived with minutes to spare for their event. Both of these teams scored big for Club OYC and put us in a great position prior to the kayak race. Once again Commodore Croft picked the winning combination for the two teams with Rick and Teresa Sorrenti and Jim Hawley and Meimei Tidrow. Each team member had their own kayak, one facing front and one facing backwards. The teams had to maneuver around the course and each had to carry a bucket of water in a collapsible bucket. There were two ways to get points, one for fastest time, and one for having the most water leftover at the end of the race. Club OYC came through

once again and was 3rd in fastest time and 1st in having the most water. After another yummy buffet dinner at the Mooring Restaurant, the winners were announced and OYC won the cup! It had been a long dry spell for OYC since we'd last won the cup in 1997. Needless to say there was much celebrating going on long into the evening.
