#### **Cruising Through the Lily Pads**

If you have never been up Aquia Creek, you are missing a boating adventure. There are three parts to Aquia Creek and all three demand your attention. The entrance to Aquia Creek is well defined in the sense that if you miss the red number "2" buoy at the entrance, you could go aground. Then there is the large open bay feature that has a nearly flat bottom. Unfortunately, if there is west wind, your depth gauge will read less than three feet in spots, but don't despair as the bottom is soft and mud will pass through your water pump! The third part is the best and the most scenic. Just when you think you've come to the end, you spot an opening in the lily pads. The depth actually increases a bit, but the channel narrows and vou must follow the landform to maintain depth. For the larger boats such as Darn' Tootin, there is little room to maneuver especially on the creek bends. Our travel time down to Aquia Creek was one hour, but it took another hour from the time we entered Aquia Creek until we arrived at Aguia Harbor Marina. There are submerged trees in the narrowest part of the creek, as well as fishermen who do not want to give way even for the larger boats.

In spite of the tricky navigation, the PRYCA event was well worth it. OYC had five boats on this cruise, *Gail Lynn II* with Joe and Gail Livingston; *Bay Dreamer* with my first wife, Pat, and myself; Al and Lynanne Jorsey on *Plane to Sea II*; Kenny and Sharman Harris on *Darn Tootin*, and Goodwyn and Jan Morgan on *Golden Opportunities*.

The Aquia Harbor Yacht Club members were attentive hosts, making sure everyone had a great time. ## Winterizing Choices – OR—Why I like White Point Marina

It's getting that dreary time of year when the boating season starts to wind down and we have to plan for the winter season. I really admire Harry Croft and other members of the club who don't let winter force them into doing anything more than installing engine room and space heaters. That way then can enjoy the boat all winter long and even take the boat out on mild sunny days. What fun!

I'm more comfortable winterizing the boat and leaving it in the slip at Fairfax Yacht Club. But this year with the dock rebuilding, FYC is encouraging everyone to make arrangements to store their boats for the winter outside the marina. If you don't know what to do, or are looking for more options than what you have done in the past, ask around as many of our members are very knowledgeable about the options.

My preferred option, if I have to move the boat, or have any work done on it, is White Point Marina on the Yeocomico River in Virginia, about 75 nautical miles south of FYC. A disadvantage of White Point is that there are no facilities to store on land, something that other marinas in the area do offer. The advantage that White Point offers is outstanding service. Time and time again, marina owner Rob Redfearn and his crew have taken excellent care of *Great Escape*. It seems that everyone who has taken their boat there has been pleased with the expert repair and maintenance services they provide. And, as a nearly 20-year old boat, *Great Escape* needs all the help she can get.

So if you want to have any more work done on your boat over the winter, and you ask my opinion, I'll say White Point Marina every time.

The most Awesome Appetizer was judged to be Arleen Rhodes' sausage dip, while Dave Moore's chilicheese spread came in second, and Nancy Henry's spicy hot crab dip took third prize. Yum!

The most Dazzling Dessert title went to **Kathie McCormally's** Warm Apple Crisp. Talk about
homemade – the apples came from the McCormally's
own tree! Second place honors went to **Rebecca Heinze'** Crème Brule Pie, and **Steve Thompson's** firstever attempt at making Chocolate Fudge Pie netted him






