OYC Commodore Reports Theft of PRYCA Cup

Fairfax County Police have been called in to investigate the disappearance of a large trophy known as the PRYCA Cup. Officials of Occoquan Yacht Club, whose members won the trophy at last summer's Float-In, believe it may have been stolen by a rival vacht club.

Investigators asked club officers if they knew of anyone who might have wanted The Cup badly enough to resort to robbery. "There have been several attempts to take it from us during the past year," reported Commodore Pat Croft. "One club tried to bribe us to let them hold it, planning to simply run off with it once they had it in their hands, and another tried to ply members with tequila shots, hoping to get them inebriated, whereupon the rivals intended to grab the trophy and claim ownership." Vice-Commodore Tom Lensis told detectives he had thwarted one robbery attempt a few months ago, when The Cup had been on display at a PRYCA dinner dance. OYC members left the trophy unattended for a moment when all at the table were enticed onto the dance floor by a particularly rousing band number, and someone from another yacht club was seen whisking it away to another table. "We gave them a chance to come clean, but they denied knowing anything about it. So I went with my gut instinct and looked under their table - sure enough, there it was!" said Lensis. Someone in the rival group claimed that amounted to illegal search and seizure, so now OYC officers speculate that the same group may be responsible for this latest disappearance of The Cup. The Cup was last seen at Fairfax Yacht Club during the Occoquan Yacht Club March membership meeting on March 20. Commodore Croft acknowledges that she and other officers of the Board may have let their guard down a bit, as they revelled in the camaraderie of fellow OYC members. "It was a spectacular day, a time to enjoy being with friends and plan future good times. We may have become a little too relaxed and at ease, thinking we were at a private OYC event," said Croft. But apparently there were others on the premises who were not OYC members, and when it came time to

pack up. The Cup was nowhere to be found.

display, that FYC had never won it. Perhaps

Fairfax Yacht Club Commodore Harry Croft denied the accusation. "That's nonsense!" he claimed. "Many of our FYC members are OYC members as well, so we all take pride in the fact that OYC won that trophy. FYC has no need to steal it to share in the glory. There is no rivalry between FYC and OYC!" Investigators are checking out the guest list for any uninvited gate crashers who may have had access to The Cup, but Secretary Myndi Harbin noted that the invitation list, as is typical with all OYC events, included members and their friends and family, so it will be difficult to determine if any intruders were among those present. "We don't usually have to worry about security," said

Meanwhile, Treasurer Arleen Rhodes noted that the cost of replacing The Cup would be devastating to the club's treasury. "We're low on funds as it is," she said, "and without any government stimulus coming to bail us out, it will be tragic if that trophy is not recovered."

Joe Livingston, the club's delegate to PRYCA, the organization which sponsored the trophy, said the dollar cost of replacing the trophy would be minor in comparison to the loss of reputation the club will suffer if The Cup is not recovered. "No club has ever won the esteemed trophy and then lost it to theft or negligence," claimed Livingston, "and that is not a distinction OYC wants to earn."

While the authorities continue to investigate the disappearance of The Cup, Tom Plewes, coordinator for the 2010 Float–In, made a plea to all OYC members to sign up for this year's event, and to brush up on their boating safety skills in anticipation of another victory for the club. "We'll recover that trophy in time for the Float-In," vowed Plewes, "and then we'll earn enough points in the competition to win for a second year in a row. Whoever took it from us will be looking at the OYC name engraved on it even bigger this time! Captains – get your vessel safety-checks!"

MayDarker Special Investigative Report: Boating Safety Tips from Dog the Boat Repo Man

In last year's MayDarker, Rear Commodore and undercover operative-extraordinaire John Heinze exposed the existence of an alarming new business operating in our area - Dog the Boat Repo Man, who's business focuses on repossessing boats over 100 feet in length. Due to the groundbreaking nature of this news report – and because parts of the initial interview seemed to have been garbled due to the amount of alcohol being consumed - we sent John back for a follow-up interview. Unfortunately, alcohol consumption appears to have affected the quality of this interview as well. Nonetheless, here is what we were able to salvage from the interview, conducted at the same local bar as last year:

John Heinze (JH): How is the boat repo business?

For instance, everybody knows about checking for gas fumes in the engine compartment before you start an inboard engine, but I ask you, what boating safety class tells you to put out your cigarette before you stick your head into the engine compartment?

JH: Is that how you got the eye patch?

Dog: Yep and how I lost the *Never Again II.* Another thing I've learned from trial and error is the importance of untying all the docking lines before departing the marina. Even one line can really hold you back!

Plus a tangled docking line can be really dangerous when you are trying to depart at full throttle.

JH: Let me guess, is that how you got the peg leg? [Editor: sound of drinks being consumed]

Dog: Yep. And you wouldn't believe the expense of dock repair when you don't remember to disconnect the electrical lines. Electrical pedestals are expensive!

JH: I don't even want to think about it. Bartender, another round!

Dog: Another thing I've had to learn from trial and error is the important of not leaving anybody or anything behind. Like your crew – it's never a good idea to leave any of your crew behind. Of course if someone is really

not essential, or you really didn't want to take them along, that is OK, but you probably should tell them that before you leave them there. Otherwise, you're probably headed for a messy divorce, personal bankruptcy and living on the streets for five years, but that's a story for another day.

And you should never forget about your pets. Our guard tarantula was so upset at being left alone in the car for those few hours that she bit me. That's how I lost the use of my left hand.

JH: Seems you have learned a lot of useful lessons. [More sounds of drinking] Any other safety lesions you would care to share?

Dog: Well, we always take up-to-date charts and our own VHS radios with us, even when we repo boats. You would think that 100 foot boats with have up-to-date charts and functioning radios, but <u>no</u> – you just can't count on anything anymore.

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This simple ceremony harkens back in history to times when fishermen and seafarers yearned for good fortune and safety at sea—which was nearly always perilous. As the fleet departed seaward, clergymen invoked a blessing on each vessel as it departed. The Occoquan community re-invigorated the Blessing of the Fleet in 1999 when the tradition was embraced by the yacht clubs of the Occoquan vicinity and the Occoquan River Maritime Association as a fun way to highlight safety afloat.

How does it work?

Fairfax and Prince William County First Responders, Coast Guard, and Law Enforcement will lead a procession of boats outbound from Prince William Marina passing the Blessing Boat moored at the Belmont Bay Harbor Marina. Participating boats will form-up proceeding outbound passing the Blessing Boat and, once "blessed", proceed outbound. The procession will include a host vessel with local dignitaries and media representatives embarked. The event is marked by recognition for our First Responders, for safety afloat, and for fun boating!

A detailed float plan and Notice to Mariners will be posted at local marinas and will be distributed through yacht club newsletters and Internet websites.

Marina Building 101

If anyone ever asks you to oversee a dock rebuild project, tell them to plant a kiss on a place where the sun doesn't shine! More than three years ago, I started the odyssey that is now nearly over: the replacement of 138 slips, 4 docks, more than one thousand feet of walkways, 80 finger piers, and 4,500 cubic yards of dredged-up muck, and more than \$1 million in costs.

Ever since Hurricane Isabel in 2004, Fairfax Yacht Club wanted to rebuild the docks. Politics, concerns over costs, and just plain fear prevented the project until 2008 when the Board of FYC finally gave the go ahead to start the project. So where is the dock catalogue when you need one? There was a steep learning curve and thanks to a lot of volunteer help we were able to put together a budget and plan of attack. The budget was almost a show stopper since no funds of any kind had been set aside to replace the docks. (Note: this is a good way to hold down annual dues, but a lousy way to plan for the future.) Prudence prevailed and a three year special assessment was approved and once again we were moving forward.

If you think used car salesmen can be bothersome, you should listen to dock manufacturers. There is nothing comparable between brands or builders. We were able to decide on deck surfacing early on and predictably we are very happy about that. We chose IPE, a Brazilian hardwood that sinks in water, but has no knots or splinters. It's very dense, easy to clean and lasts 40-50 years. As for the other features of a dock, we ultimately tossed the dice and trusted the builders (with a little help from an engineering consultant). Once a dock manufacturer had been selected, (we bought the docks ourselves to save middleman expenses) a contract for a general contractor was awarded. FYC took a chance on a very young man who seemed to know a great deal. FYC hasn't been disappointed. At times we all wondered why things were taking so long, but the project finished on time and under budget. Under budget!!

Then there was the electrical contractor who can only work in dry weather. Silly goose, what's a little water mixed in with electricity! Would you estimate that on

one dock alone, we had 19,500 feet of wire!! That's nearly four miles! Plumbing was next up and luckily they can work in all weather. Water doesn't seem to bother them.

Change orders are a contractor's best friend! So you want to add or change something?? Honey, order tickets to Tahiti!! No one, absolutely no one, can think of everything that is needed for a project of this magnitude. Just think of how many trips to Home Depot you have to make for a simple home project. Hose hangers, line hangers, little slip signs so people can find their own slip, and of course since everything is torn up, let's add a pump-out station!! Cleats, how many, how big, and where do you want them?

Oh, I almost forgot the wonderful process of getting permits. What started off as a simple building permit turned into a new Special Use Permit, a Minor Site Plan, a Non-Residential Use Permit, and of course the amended building permit because the first permit wasn't compliant with the old special use permit. The county people really understand your need for fast and simple process, more changes, more permit fees, and hearings. Lastly there is the BZA (Board of Zoning Appeals) hearing for the new Special Use Permit which was necessary since the very first permit didn't reflect what was actually built in the first place. Gin and tonic please!


So at some point around November 1st, all the planning is done, the contractors are ready, and now we have one of the worst winters in near history. The April 1, 2010 finish date doesn't look so good. That's the date when everyone wants to start de-winterizing their boat. All 170 owners, including me, are wondering when in July will this project be done. After the last snow storm, I began to secretly make plans to leave the area. Angry E-mails are pouring in....abandon ship!!!

As if all this fun isn't enough, the OYC Commodore is all over my case (I chose another word, but the editor nixed it) to get rid of the dredge bag that blocks the parking lot and makes getting to the clubhouse a chore.

As I write this, the dredge bag is still in the parking lot, but there are plans to rip it open and start hauling the muck away to the landfill. The new docks are all in place, the piling is complete, electrical and plumbing is nearly complete, and only the finishing touches remain incomplete. By April 10th, all the fuss and worry should be a fading memory, and I can get back to retirement, softball, golf, and boating. The irony in this dock rebuild project is that MY "E" dock, where I keep the *Bay Dreamer* was not part of the rebuild project.


