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### COMMODORE'S COMMENTS

Sometimes inquiring minds just want to know, and so it was that I went in search of the history of the OYC Commodore's Cup. The cup is being restored this year, and I wanted to check the accuracy of some details before having the plates re-engraved. I looked to one of our long-standing members, Arleen Rhodes, for the answer to a question regarding the first presentation of the award. Arleen told me that was before her time, but she knew where to look for clues.

Ned Rhodes, our Webmaster, has diligently scanned and archived all past issues of the *Daymarker*, even some that were before his time, and the list is remarkably complete. They can be found on our website, <a href="https://www.occoquanyachtclub.org">www.occoquanyachtclub.org</a>, and they offer some interesting insights into our club's history. I was all too easily distracted from my original inquiry.

The earliest issue, Vol. 1, Issue 1, was published in May 1984. The look and format of the *Daymarker* itself has changed dramatically over the years, but of greater interest to me were the changes in some of the club's traditions since the inception of the club.

It appears that the Hardy Souls' cruise has been a mainstay of the cruising schedule since the very beginning, although for a number of years it was referred to as the Hearty Souls; it was some time before anyone realized that intrepid, cold-weather sailors would be hardy, not hearty, although they might require some hearty libations

after enduring the harsh conditions of boating in November.

However, 1984-1987 *Daymarkers* report a cruise that takes top prize for hardiness: the Thanksgiving Day Raft-Up. For several years, a group of 8-10 OYC boaters actually took their boats out to Mattawoman Creek, rafted up, and enjoyed their Thanksgiving feast on the water! Now that's a hardy souls' event! I found mention of the Thanksgiving Day Raft-Up through 1987, but that must have been the last time it was officially on the OYC calendar. Anyone willing to volunteer as cruise coordinator to revive the Thanksgiving Day Raft-Up? No?

The Santa Cruise is another tradition that goes way back. It's mentioned in every November *Daymarker* from 1985 on, but it used to take place the first Saturday in December. Sometime around 1995, the Occoquan Merchants Association began asking us to deliver Santa a week earlier on the Saturday following Thanksgiving. Also about 1995, Walt Cheatham became the coordinator for that fun little holiday jaunt, and he has faithfully fulfilled that commitment every year since.

When the club began in 1984, the Change of Watch, with a slightly different title, was a single purpose event, not combined with the Holiday Party as it is now. It was held at the end of October as a dinner and swearing-in ceremony for the new officers before their term began November 1st. By 1986 the Past Commodore's article lamented the need to cancel the Change of Command Ceremony, which had been planned as a formal event at Ft. Belvoir, due to lack of participation; 39 members had made reservations, but an additional 36 would have been required to

meet the guaranteed number. It was at this point that the Change of Command was incorporated with what was then billed as the Christmas Banquet, and that has evolved into the Change of Watch/Holiday Party that we are so busy preparing for right now.

The shift forward of the installation of officers to December created a bit of a dilemma; our By-Laws state that the officers will serve from November 1st, but they are not sworn in until the second Saturday in December. Thus, it is now our custom that the November Board meeting serves as the transition, with both outgoing and incoming officers present.

In keeping with our by-laws and with tradition, we elected a new Executive Board at the October General Membership meeting, and we are preparing a gala ceremony at which they will be installed in conjunction with the Holiday Party on December 11th.

But I digress...back to the original search regarding the Commodore's Cup. Arleen informed me that the Commodore's Cup was not given to an individual in 1985, because that was the year that Commodore and Mrs. William Shaw presented the cup to the club; it was another year before the club presented it to a member. That set me to wondering about the specific requirements of the award, so I consulted the archives myself and was surprised to discover that the Shaw's original intent was to honor the "member whose vacht best typifies the title 'Yacht of the Year,' considering underway operation, maneuvering and docking, anchoring, and yearround appearance and upkeep." Hmmm. Somewhere along the way, the Commodore's Cup has come to be awarded for traits quite different from those the First Commodore stipulated.

Upon closer review of the archived issues, I found that it should be referred to as the First Commodore's Cup, having been initiated by OYC's first Commodore, Bill Shaw. The First Commodore's Cup was awarded in accordance with the first Commodore's instructions up until about 1993, when the *Daymarker* reported that the recipient had shown "all around excellence in boating, seamanship, support for OYC activities, and helpfulness to others." That was the first documentation I could find that the qualifications were beginning to morph from performance as Yacht of the Year to performance as most supportive of OYC.

Just as the reasons for choosing the honoree have changed, the trophy itself has been updated. The silver cup is the same, but it is now mounted atop a rosewood base, which is surrounded by four silver plates with the names of recipients more clearly detailed in black. It is the most meaningful award presented at the Change of Watch; the two other awards are rather dubious honors, based on some degree of misfortune. The First Commodore's Cup is based on extraordinary service to the club.

The 2010 and the 2011 Boards will determine this year's winner when they meet in November. Now that I am aware of the requirement that the recipient should not only have contributed greatly to the success of the club but that his or her yacht should typify the Yacht of the Year, the nominations and deliberations will be doubly difficult! Join us at the Change of Watch/Holiday Party to find out who among us is worthy of the First Commodore's Cup.

### Bloody Marys a la Myndi

As it is now mid-October, it's time to cancel the Sirius weather and put the bathing suit back in the cedar drawer. Although I really enjoy Fall, I feel like I didn't get a lot of boating time in this summer so I am in somewhat of a melancholy mood. With that in mind (and being bugged), I have decided to share my Sunday Morning Brunch recipe for Bloody Mary mix.

### **Bloody Mary Mix**

- 32oz bottle of V-8 juice
- 32oz bottle of Clamato juice
- 2T Horseradish
- 2T Worcestershire sauce
- 1/2 t Celery salt
- ½ t Everglades seasoning (I got mine in Florida, but it can be found at Bloom in the NoVA Area)
- 3T Old Bay
- ½ t onion powder
- · 2t black pepper
- 3t lemon juice
- 2 t jerk seasoning (I use the "wet" variety)

Place all ingredients in a large jug and shake. I find it better to make a day or two prior. Serve in a large glass with ice and as much or as little vodka as you like.

Garnish can include celery, asparagus, or shrimp! Enjoy!

### The Last Overnighters of 2010 – Two Trips to National Harbor!




