OYC Salvages Concordia; Moves Ship to Occoquan to Serve as Yacht Club Facility

The Occoquan Yacht Club is a virtual yacht club no more! Owing to the tremendous initiative on the part of the current Board of Directors, the Yacht Club has salvaged the cruise ship, Concordia, steamed it across the Atlantic, berthed it at its new berth in the picturesque town of Occoquan, and turned it into a floating yacht club.

The idea came to the Yacht Club Board at its January 2012 meeting. One board member who had just read the salvage laws discovered that anyone could lay claim to the ship that lay sunken in Italian waters. The idea came after the Club found out that it was no longer welcome to hold its board meetings at another local yacht club.

Not having much money in the treasury, the Board as a group stowed away on a cruise liner which was travelling from Baltimore to Italy on a repositioning cruise. Pretending to be part of the show, the board members joined the high stepping chorus line and took turns selling drinks to the show patrons. Unaccustomed to real work, the board members were overjoyed to see the Coliseum when they finally arrived in Rome.

As soon as arriving in Italy, the Board found their way to the nearest Toys R Us where they purchased a bunch of helium balloons. Hooking the balloons to the Concordia, they were able to right the ship enough to patch up the hole in the side with duct tape (being expert on fixing anything on the water with duct tape and a few choice words).

The lack of a captain to steer the ship back to Occoquan was quickly solved when the Board engaged Captain Francesco Schettino who didn't have much to do while waiting for his trial to come up. It turned out that he knew the ship pretty well, but had to be dissuaded several times from making close approaches to Gibraltar, the Statue of Liberty, and the Naval Shipyards at Norfolk on the way to Occoguan.

The most difficult part of navigating the Concordia was the run from Belmont Bay to the docks at Occoquan. The Board decided to form a committee to serve as the pilot for this part of the voyage. All of the committee members had a lot of experience in finding the shoals in the Occoquan. The committee agreed that the best course was to stay in the middle of the river. It was a grand day as the Concordia entered Belmont Bay and made its way up the Occoquan. School children lined the shores waving US and Italian flags as the OYC committee piloted the ship up the narrow channel and passed under the Route 1 and I95 bridges with inches to spare.

GREAT LOOP CRUISE!



OYC is excited to announce the First Annual **GREAT LOOP CRUISE!** It had long been rumored that some of our long-time members were moving to Wilmington, NC; but **THAT IS NOT THE CASE!** These seasoned "Commodores" have been secretly planning the trip of a lifetime, and now are ready to share it with you! Code name "Commodores Cruise", the group has spent years getting in shape...



Rick & Teresa Sorrenti are leading the trip with SEA DUCK TOO; Ned & Arleen Rhodes, IMPLUSE; Steve & Sue Thompson, FOREVER DREAMIN'; and Tom & Donna Lensis , COPYCAT, have also joined it. It is rumored that Joe & Gail Livingston, GAIL LYNN II, may also be joining the trip, since they have not been seen in this area for weeks! Each additional boater participating in the Commodores' Cruise will get a personalized T-Shirt monogrammed with their name and **"I Am A Looper"** printed on the back. As Ned Rhodes noted to Jim Dooley, "Don't let the size of your boat limit the size of your dream, and you won't need to rent my slip for a whole year!"

For those not familiar with the Great Loop, Rick Sorrenti explained it as a continuous waterway that encompasses the eastern portion of North America – including the Atlantic and Gulf Intracoastal Waterways, the Great Lakes, the Canadian Heritage Canals, and the inland rivers of America's heartland. It offers over 6,000 miles of safe, scenic sights, and a great place to shoot my cannon. It is close to land, hospitals, restaurants, and a different bar in every port where they have never seen me before! In addition, you will have cell-phone service over the entire voyage to insure you are going in the right direction.

Rick, who left on Thursday, March 22, said "We begin by heading down the Potomac like we are going to Carolina Beach, but once in the Chesapeake Bay, we make a left (counter clockwise) turn up the Chesapeake and Delaware Canal to Delaware Bay to Cape May and Atlantic City. The following week, open Atlantic Ocean to New York Harbor. Once in NY and after finishing off some old bottles of wine from Ingleside, we 'Loopers' will continue up the coast, up the St Lawrence River to Lake Ontario. We have chosen to take the Hudson River to Waterford and then take the Erie Canal to Lake Ontario. From there we go counter clockwise to Canada's Rideau Canal, built in 1832 (the year I was born), from Ottawa to Kingston, then the Trent Canal from Trenton, Ontario, to Port Severn on Georgian Bay. Lake Michigan is next. From here it is all down hill, the Illinois and Mississippi Rivers, down the Ohio and Tennessee Rivers, then down the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway to Mobile. We will then join to the Intracoastal Waterway going east, to Carrabelle, Florida. Since ICW now extends to Fort Myers, we can cruise the Okeechobee Waterway to Stuart. While most of us will be heading counter clockwise to Charleston, for those who may never want to return, Tom Lensis will head south to the Bermuda Triangle."

When asked why he wanted to do this trip, Ned Rhodes commented, "Seeing America by boat is like no other travel experience, and my boat is the fastest. For any American who has ever been on a real cruise, this has to be the single most life enriching "American experience" on the planet! Furthermore, you never have to make a single U-turn. And my boat is the fastest!"

For Tom Lensis, the trip is "like living the life as portrayed in Mark Twain's 'Life on the Mississippi'. You watch these grand ole paddle-wheelers making their leisurely way across the water as you head south into the land of magnificent mansions (like the one I own) that survived the Civil War (and infamous Lensis' OYC pool parties) to Catfish Camps and drinking establishment. America's Great Loop is not only a wonderful boating experience 'The Cup!', it is the boating Mecca of America. 'The Cup!' It is a voyage in the past lane. Whether you have money to burn (like me) or need more money to earn, this is a dream that is realistically attainable. 'The Cup!' While many 'Loopers' sell everything, retire and live in their boats to make the journey, I just sold some copiers and bought a boat. 'The Cup!' In the end . . . It is not the dream boat, but the dream voyage, that will give you you're most cherished memories. 'The Cup!'"

As for Sue Thompson, the Loop is her childhood dream come true. Sue explains, "You will not only meet the most extraordinary, friendly, good-hearted and enjoyable people, like me; you can also see everything there is to see during daylight; spend every night in a different restaurant, and have cell-phone and Internet service in case Publishers Clearing House calls. No, not everyone is cut out to make a long ocean passage, so the Great Loop is right for us. Steve and I look at this as our second honeymoon. The Great Loop is not anything like staying at the Holliday Inn; but for an American like me, it is a much more meaningful and wonderfully enriching experience."

Gail Livingston was quoted as saying: "It takes a special kind of person to board a vessel and sail off into the sunset, chasing horizons far away from loved ones (thank goodness) and familiar places. The Loop itself offers almost 6,000 miles of watching the Shopping Channel on Direct TV. Maybe the greatest aspect of cruising the Great Loop is the fact that I can sit back and relax, as Joe does all the driving. In addition to the hundreds of flea markets, I am looking forward to buying a Tshirt in every port."

For Joe Livingston, "Certainly, this is a safer alternative to seeing America in an RV. On the Great Loop, you are away from big city traffic jams, noise and smog. Instead of cruising down the highway 75 miles an hour, you're relaxing on your boat with 75 drinks an hour. Yes, you can boat from Mattawoman to Memphis and to Mexico, and keep a tight rope on Gail's spending, while figuring out a way to win the Commodores' Cup in 2014.

A rough cost estimate is... Miles, 6,060.57; Engine hours, 910.8 (for the engine that runs the full time); Locks transited, 114 (unless Rick forgets 'counter clockwise'); Time to "Loop," 245 days (unless you follow Tom Lensis, who may never return) COST: Dockage=\$5100.35; Fuel= \$5800.22; Groceries=\$3300.43; Dining out=\$3347.66; Insurance= \$900.32; Booze=\$1200 per 6 months; and taking the dog, add \$960. Total Cost = \$20,608.98



Location, Location, Location – More on Looking for Venues for Futures OYC Events

Saturday, March 17th, our Spring General Membership Meeting and our first meeting at the newly remodeled Fairfax Yacht Club was a big day for OYC. Not only was the meeting a great success, but the FYC clubhouse is quite impressive as well. As a FYC member, as well as an OYC member, I am so pleased to report on the remodeled clubhouse that features a redesigned, open kitchen and bar/serving area that is much more functional than before. The kitchen features cherry wood cabinets with great storage space, beautiful granite countertops, stainless steel sinks, a large new refrigerator, stove, microwave and dishwasher, tile floors in the entryway, kitchen and restroom, and new carpeting in the main part of the clubhouse. The effect of this kitchen redesign is to make the whole clubhouse look larger and the space more usable.

I had a chance to visit for a few minutes with long-time OYC members Bob Wilcox, who owns Calvert Construction, the firm that remodeled the kitchen. He just couldn't help but point out some of his favorite, notso-obvious features such as top of the line cabinets featuring self-closing drawers. These cabinets are securely anchored with 2½ inch "invisible" screws that are only 1/16 of inch wide so the heads don't detract from the surface of the cabinets. Very impressive.

For FYC, the newly remodeled kitchen and new flooring are a terrific improvement to the FYC clubhouse and represent the culmination of a lot of hard work by a number of FYC member volunteers who have worked intensively for well over a year – make that several years - on this project. Job well done!

For OYC, we now have the option of an upgraded meeting site for future OYC meetings including the Election Meeting/Chili Cookoff (October 20), Planfest (mid February, 2013), and General Membership/Photo Contest meeting (mid March, 2013). Of course, if we use the FYC clubhouse, we will have to pay the \$50/hour use fee.

That has gotten us wondering if there are other options for those meetings. What we are looking for is a meeting venue with inside seating space for up to 60 people with kitchen facilities, located in the Occoquan/Woodbridge area, with lower costs.

In this search, we welcome input from all OYC members. If you have any ideas for a place to meet, we would love to hear them.

And I want to emphasis that in looking for options, we are simply trying to be fiscally prudent. We are very grateful to FYC for allowing us to use their lovely newly remodeled clubhouse. We especially appreciate that FYC kept us fully informed on the progress of the remodeling, which fortunately was completed in time for the OYC event. So...

Spring has Sprung!

Life is good; spring has sprung... or maybe I should say it's more like summer has begun? Whatever, I am ready and excited about this up-coming boating season. With all the cruises that the OYC has charted, it looks like a busy and fun season this year for the OYC members. I have started my "Don't forget to take to the boat" list and hung it on the fridge.

I am now gathering items such as sheets, pillows and towels to put with the boxes of materials that have been stored from last year's boating season. To add on to the already overflowing boxes packed for the boat, Steve and I will buy our usual favorite cleaning supplies from One Stop Boat shop down at Hope Spring Marina, where we keep our boat for the winter.

If you are looking for an easy way to clean your boat, especially your Eisenglass, this product is for you... the Bay Safe Environmental Cleaner. Captain Steve swears by this product.

Another product we find that works exceptionally well on bird droppings and pesky spider stains is The Spider & Bird Stain Remover. Since our boat is docked under the shed at Fairfax Yacht Club (FYC), spider stains are a constant problem; this cleaner seems to do the trick without much effort.

I will also get out the flashlight, put in new batteries and check the first aid kit to see how the band aid supply looks. I will include a bottle of aspirin, Advil, antihistamine, peroxide, plenty of sun block, and a good bottle of gin which no well-supplied boat should be without.

In the box holding kitchen supplies, I will make sure the *new* blender is packed and my electric skillet, a necessity, especially for long cruises since our boat has no oven.

For those who don't know, an electric skillet with a metal rack (or if you don't have that metal rack, you can use metal jar lids placed in the bottom of the skillet) transforms the skillet into an oven for baking. I have been told you can even bake a cake in this manor.

Finally, as I fill the boat up with all these overflowing boxes of supplies, I read the best way to keep your sanity as the first mate is to make a master list of where you store items, especially so the captain doesn't come down and tear the boat apart looking for that one flashlight. This list also helps the first mate (at least this one) whose memory at times tends to be on vacation.

I have also started look for new and easy recipes to use for this boating season. Liz Plewes made a crab dip that she brought to the OYC Planfest. It was an easy and delicious dip. She sent me the recipe, which I will now share with you. Enjoy!

Liz Plewes' Hot Crab Dip:

Mix:

- 1 8oz. cream cheese
- 1 tblsp. Milk
- 1 tsp. Worchester Sauce
- 1 can crab meat (or fresh crab)
- 2 tblsp. chopped green onions
- 2 tblsp. sliced almonds

Heat in Microwave or double boiler, serve warm.

I hope to see you all on one of the OYC cruises this summer. Maybe I will even make a cake!!!
