Explaining the Mysteries of the Masthead

The masthead section on the wonderful OYC Website that was recently redesigned by OYC member, Don Bennett, proudly announces that OYC is (multi-year) "PRYCA Cup Champions" and also announces that we are members of two organizations: the Potomac River Yacht Club Association (PRYCA) and the Chesapeake Bay Yacht Clubs Association (CBYCA). We have been members of these organizations for so long and have generally been so comfortable in our membership that we seldom think about what they bring to us. The associations do very important work that contributes to our safe and responsible use, as well as our enjoyment, of the wonderful water resources we have in the Chesapeake Bay and its tributaries. In this article, I will summarize the history, purpose and contributions of the two associations with which we are affiliated.

The senior and largest association of yacht clubs in our region is the CBYCA. It has been around since 1957. It now includes over 80 yacht clubs in its founding state of Maryland and in Virginia, Pennsylvania, Delaware, New Jersey, and the District of Columbia. The CBYCA has three areas in which it focuses most of its attention: to protect the interests of better boating in the Chesapeake Bay area through legislation; to define standards of recognition for yacht clubs in the region; and to act as a liaison and coordinator between yacht clubs as to coming events, such as Opening Days and

Commodore Balls, and to prevent overlap when possible.

At the national level, CBYCA represents yacht clubs in this region as a member of the National Boating Federation (NBF), which gets involved with the U.S. Coast Guard on national administrative matters and with Congress on legislative matters affecting recreational boating. Most recently, NBF took on the issues of potential interference with the GPS signals posed by implementation of Light Squared expansion plans and on the issue of mandatory 15% ethanol content in gas.

Importantly, CBYCA is represented on the Virginia Boating Advisory Board, which is charged with review of proposed Virginia legislation and advising the Commonwealth on matters affecting recreational boating. The interests we have in our piece of the Potomac River are ably represented in Richmond by Sally Kenavan, a member of the Aquia Harbour Yacht Club.

This past year was a difficult year for CBYCA as different factions vied for leadership of the organization resulting in litigation in Maryland courts and much confusion. For a while, the OYC withheld its membership pending the sorting out of the status of CBYCA leadership. We can report that CBYCA has sorted out the leadership questions to our satisfaction and OYC has now re-joined the organization.

The Potomac River Yacht Club Association has not been around quite so long, having formed in 1971. Its aims are a little closer to home for the interests of OYC: to encourage boating safety; to encourage the advancement of yachting clubs in the Potomac River Basin; to represent member clubs; and to promote social interactions

among member clubs and their individual members. OYC actively participates in the main PRYCA events each year: the summer kick-off cruise (in recent years this cruise has been to Cobb Island); the annual Float-In (this year scheduled for July 13-15 at Coles Point); and the annual Change of Watch Ball (usually held at the Springfield Hilton Hotel in January). OYC is well represented in the leadership of PRYCA, holding 3 of the 11 Board positions – Mike Crouch is Vice Commodore; Joey Sowell is Treasurer; and Pat Croft is a Member-at-Large. Joe Livingston is the OYC delegate to both the CBYCA and the PRYCA. Yes...we are well represented, to say the least.

These organizations work hard to improve our boating experience and take on issues for OYC at the national and commonwealth level which would be difficult for us to take on as one yacht club. They deserve our support.



For you must understand that on a sailing vessel a **rope** is a **line** when tied to the dock; but a **rope** is a **sheet** for controlling the set of a sail.

The absence of the Gail Lynn II on Club cruises has now documented that repairs are ongoing. Well, we had planned to attend the Cobb Island Summer Kick-Off with my son and grandson (OYC members, Jay and Alex); but when Jay was told we probably will not make it, as motivation, he started looking at sailing vessel charters out of Annapolis. 
