Here are a few of the issues that should be surfaced:

Meeting Venues. John Heinze's article this month spells out our latest challenge with the new rules at the Fairfax Yacht Club. Frankly, we had taken their hospitality in the past as a given. We appreciate the tremendous support we have received and will continue to receive under the new rules. However, the relationship between the clubs has become more business-like. For example, the OYC Board is no longer welcome to have its monthly meeting at the facility. As John's article suggests, we need to see if there are other options. Your ideas are solicited.

Dues. This is always a hot topic. OYC has always strived to keep dues to a minimum and has generally been successful at doing that. The current membership fees (\$75 for a family, \$55 for individuals and \$30 for associates) has been unchanged for some time and is a real bargain. As we will learn at the General Membership meeting, the Treasury is in quite good shape at the present time, even though we haven't gotten all of the membership renewals that we expect. (Please send in your renewal if you haven't already.) Nonetheless, the costs of our active program, The Daymarker, and other necessary expenses have gone up; and subsidized event expenses have also risen as we have sought to keep event charges to a minimum. We have very little cushion, and in that environment the idea of a small increase in dues is always on the table. I expect your Board will be reviewing

the financial picture and dues structure this fall as we prepare the budget for 2013.

Memberships. OYC has long been a member of both the Chesapeake Bay Yacht Clubs Association (CBYCA), which represents yacht clubs all around the Bay, and the Potomac River Yacht Club (PRYCA), which represents clubs up and down the Potomac. We have really benefitted from both of these memberships. Joe Livingston is our official delegate to both clubs and Pat Croft is an officer of the PRYCA. This past year has been a difficult year for the CBYCA, with fairly intense struggle for control taking place between two competing leadership factions. The status of CBYCA is being contested in a court of law in the State of Maryland. We have stayed neutral in this matter, and your Board has recently notified both factions that we do intend to keep our membership when we know which faction is the legitimate organization.

<u>Governance</u>. Your Board meets on the second Wednesday of each month. Recently we have met at the home of Commodore Tom and Liz Plewes. The Board takes official minutes and operates with an agenda that is published to the Board members in advance. If you are interested in issues of governance, please let us know. All members are welcome to attend the Board meetings.

The Sails Are Set for 2012 !!!!

Thanks to the efforts from our 2012 Board and past Cruise Coordinators, the 2012 Cruise Calendar is set and the year is planned! The group met for a Pre-Planfest on Sunday, February 5, and took off our Superbowl hats long enough to put on our thinking caps and carve out a 2012 draft cruise itinerary. I dare any PRYCA club to even come close to OYC's venue of cruises for 2012. Almost every weekend for the entire 2012 boating season has something for us Cruising Crustaceans. We begin our cruise calendar this year in <u>MARCH</u>! Even before the Early Bird Cruise, a new Cherry Blossom Cruise to Gangplank Marina is set for March 30 to April 1. The cruise came about for those that want to take advantage of Washington's Cherry Blossoms. As details were not known at the time of the Planfest, an email has been sent out with instructions for those who want to participate. The cruise comes just in time, since our unexpected warm winter has contributed to the pains of cabin fever and an early spring is fast approaching.

The Early Bird Cruise will follow on <u>April</u> 13-15, most likely to Old Town Alexandria due to lack of slip availability at National Harbor. Details to follow for those who signed up or express interest. <u>May</u> begins the official opening of the 2012 boating season with our OYC Flag Raising on Saturday, May 5, at OHM. A week later is the ORMA Blessing of the Fleet on Saturday, May 12. May closes with OYC's traditional Memorial Day Cruise (May 25-28) to Colonial Beach. As noted in my February 6 email, be sure to call Colonial Beach at 804-224-7230, ask for Robin and say you are with OYC, to sign up early, as the slips may be limited at the Colonial Beach Yacht Center. There may be other slips available at nearby marinas. The venue will include our annual pilgrimage to the Berry Farm and Ingleside Vineyard, along with dock happy hours.

June kicks off with a Margarita/Fajita Fest at OHM on Saturday, June 9. On June 15-17, we travel down to the PRYCA Cobb Island Summer Kick-Off cruise. Remember to participate in the scavenger hunt for the beads! If you don't have your stowaway bikes, hitch hiking may be your mode of travel. From Cobb Island, Pat and Harry Croft will begin a 5-part, 4-week Mid-Bay Cruise. Part 1 (June 15-17) is to be the Cobb Island weekend. Part 2 (June 17-21) will be fun and fishing around Pt. Lookout. Part 3 (June 22-28) is to include Onancock, Shad Landing and Vera's. Part 4 (June 29-July 7) continues to La Trappe, Herrington South, Baltimore for 4th of July, Annapolis and to White Point. Finally, Part 5 (July 8-13) heads back to Coles Point for our PRYCA Float-In. Harry notes that you can join in on any part of this cruise, at any time. Weather and safety are to play a major part in the cruise destinations, while allowing newbie's the opportunity to explore the Chesapeake Bay with a seasoned Captain.

The July 4 week/weekends offer our club many choices. From Baltimore Harbor, Tim's I or II, National Harbor, Washington Marina or Old Town, there is something for all. The difficulty will be in deciding where you want to celebrate our country's 236 birthday! Earlier than usual this year (July 13-15) is the PRYCA Float-in at Coles Point. Last year, besides capturing The CUP (THE CUP!), Coles Point proved to be an ideal location with accommodating facilities, good food, sandy beaches and illuminating moon rises. This year, the same is on our scope. The weekend is the perfect time to get to know our other PRYCA clubs that share our waters, and show them which club is the BEST. Following the PRYCA Float-In, Tom and Liz Plewes head out for a Tourista Cruise (July 15-20) of the Mid Bay. Ok, how about the Nationals! Go Nats! September 7-9 is our second annual trip up to James Creek Marina. Plan on Saturday the 8th, an afternoon game against the Marlins. James Creek offers an idea location to walk over to the stadium and enjoy the game. food and beverages. Other modes of transportation will be available to and from the marina to the stadium. Be sure to pull up to the gas dock for your slip assignment and measurement. September 21-23 is the cruise to National Harbor Oktoberfest! Looking for Venues for Futures OYC Events

The Planfest at Mount Vernon Yacht Club (MYYC) on February 18th was a great success. Part of what made it such an enjoyable event was the lovely facilities provided by MVYC. As OYC Commodore Tom Plewes pointed out in his opening remarks, one of the advantages of OYC is that we just focus on cruises and land events and consequently have very low dues. A disadvantage is that we don't own a club house - which would require much higher dues and a lot of time and effort to manage - and so we are always looking for places to have OYC functions. That was the reason that when the Fairfax Yacht Club (FYC) clubhouse, where we usually have the Planfest, was undergoing renovations, we had to look for an alternative site and found MVYC.

Fortunately, FYC will very shortly have completed their renovations and, assuming our user application is approved, we will have the benefit of use of a new kitchen, carpet and tile at the FYC clubhouse for the OYC General Membership Meeting and Photo Contest on March 17th, 2-4 pm. This will be another fun activity with an opportunity to sign up for cruises, a chance to show off and win prizes for your favorite boating photos from 2011 and a brief OYC business meeting.

However, OYC members should know that with the renovation, FYC has instituted a new policy of charging \$250 cleaning fee deposit which is forfeited if the room is not left clean. The cleaning fee deposit should be no problem as we intend to leave the clubhouse cleaner than we found it. In addition FYC is also charging a \$50/hour user fee for any use of their facilities that is not an FYC function. This use fee has caused us some concern.

It's not that the amount of the fee – it's the principle that is the issue. A number of OYC members are also members at FYC and thus pay significant yearly assessment fees, which include the cost for upkeep of the clubhouse. Consequently, the user fee seems like a duplicate charge. On the other hand, a suitable option for an alternative site was not easy to find on short notice. After discussion and vote, the OYC Board decision was to hold the General Membership/Photo Contest meeting at FYC and to continue looking for alternative venues for the OYC events that we have traditionally held at FYC. Those events include the Election Meeting/Chili Cookoff (October 20), Planfest (mid February, 2013), and General Membership/Photo Contest meeting (mid March, 2013). In this search, we welcome input from all OYC members. The parameters for a meeting space include inside seating space for up to 60 people with kitchen facilities, location in the Occoquan/Woodbridge area (broadly defined) [we are the <u>Occoquan</u> YC] and costs lower than FYC (otherwise what is the point?).

I hope this discussion of the cost for use of the FYC clubhouse doesn't discourage you from attending the General Membership Meeting and Photo Contest. On the contrary, please come and see the lovely new FYC facilities. And if you have any ideas for any place that would be better to meet, we would love to hear them.

To cut down on travel times back home, we will stop off at Annapolis before entering the Potomac and heading for home. **WAIT**..not so fast!!! Fishing, on the hook in small bays, and just plain soaking up the beauty of the river is planned. 
