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COMMODORE'S COMMENTS

MEMBERSHIP MEETING ELECTS NEW BOARD, CHANGES DUES STRUCTURE (AND ENJOYES SOME **FABULOUS CHILI)!**

The General Membership meeting held on Saturday, October 20, at the clubhouse of the Fairfax Yacht Club was both decisive and fun. The Club is set on a great course for next year.

The membership elected the Board for 2013, which will be inaugurated at the December 8 Change of Watch Ceremony at Laurel Hills Country Club. The new elected officers for 2013 are:

Commodore – Jim Dooley Vice Commodore – Don Bennett Rear Commodore – Bud Bishop Treasurer - Joe Livingston Secretary – Carol Belcher

The incoming board will appoint the remaining leadership positions, to include the Quartermaster, Membership Committee Chair, Historian, Daymarker Editor and Web Master.

In other business, the membership approved the new dues structure to begin with dues for 2013. The change in the dues structure had been proposed by the Board and, in accordance with the by-laws, was taken to the membership at this meeting.

For some years now, the Club has been operating in the red in that dues and fees have not kept up with rising costs of the Daymarker, cruise expenses, and the annual Change of Watch function. The shortfall has been made up by 50/50 raffles, Quartermaster sales profits, and contributions from members of the Board and Club. Although the Club has avoided special assessments or general dues increases, because of these measures it is becoming more difficult with each passing year to make ends meet. The Club's major expense is the Daymarker, which costs an average of \$35 per year for each member. It has been suggested that we could make ends meet if we were able to cut back on the costs of printing and mailing the monthly newsletter by converting to an all-Web (email) distribution. However, some members would prefer to have a monthly hard-copy version.

The Board proposed to raise the annual dues to \$95 for family memberships, \$75 for individual memberships and \$50 for associate memberships. Each of these membership categories would be given a \$20 discount if the member would elect to receive the Daymarker via the Internet. For those opting for Internet delivery, the dues would be \$75 for a family membership, \$55 for an individual membership, and \$30 for an associate membership. This new dues structure was approved at the meeting.

The new forms that will be sent to the membership along with the invitation to the Change of Watch party will incorporate this new dues structure. For those electing to get an Internet copy of the Daymarker, dues will remain the same as in 2012. For those who wish to receive a hard copy in the mail, the increase of \$20 will come close to covering this expense.

Also the membership decided that along with the newsletter and occasional email blasts, the Website, which has recently been upgraded by Don Bennett, would be the primary means of communicating with the members. The membership decided not to approve a proposed rejuvenation of the Facebook page, which has been dormant for a while.

The annual Chili Cook-Off first prize was won by Steve Prada who agreed to share his Carolina-based recipe with the membership. Other chilli honors went to Harry Croft and the DelMontes.

WINTERIZATION CONTINUED...

Continued from last month's *Daymarker*. We spoke of moisture and odor. A simple thing to assist in and around berths. Place a bar of soap under the edge of mattresses and also place laundry fabric softener sheets under the mattress...really helps with odors. If you have a foam mattress, place something under the mattress to allow additional air flow and remove bedding if you will not be using the bed. Cabinet doors and drawers can be left slightly ajar to allow additional air flow.

Do you winterize your own potable (drinking) water systems? Two methods are often used. One, drain/empty the holding tank and service lines and then use an air compressor to blow the remaining water from the system. This can be effectively done by opening the faucet farthest from the fill fitting. If you have a shore water system as well, make sure you blow that additional system out as well. Plan also to disconnect and blow out your wash down/fill hoses from dock faucets. When preparing for this method, prior to draining the water, add 6-8 ounces of household Clorox and let set for several hours or over night to help kill bacteria. The second method is to run the pink (potable) anti-freeze through the system. Here you drain the system and then add back enough anti-freeze to run throughout the system...making sure you open each faucet and shower head...and that they are running pink. You can also add the Clorox to keep bacteria down. With either method, pour a guart or so of pink stuff in each drain to protect the drain pipes and traps (anti-back flow/siphon). Do not forget the water in the hot water tank, if installed. Some systems have by-pass valves and some have only drain valves. In either case, make sure electrical power is shut off prior to draining so heating elements are not damaged. One more warning, if you have ice makers installed or units in a refrigerator, make sure you disconnect and drain these lines...they are small and prone to freeze damage.

Reverse cycle heat/air conditioning systems can be winterized in much the same methods as the fresh water systems. The compressors have cooling tubes that use water to cool the system by the use of a circulating pump that pulls sea water in through a seacock and pumps it back overboard at a thru-hull fitting. You must protect this system from freezing either by blowing all the water out or by running anti-freeze through the system. The pink stuff is good here as it is better on the environment than usual engine anti-freezes. You normally introduce the anti-freeze at a strainer above the attached seacock and you must protect the hose and the seacock as well. I usually disconnect the hose at the seacock which drains it and then vacuum the connecting pipe to the seacock and then fill it with ant-freeze.

As an additional comment, I normally close all seacock's and the disconnect, drain and reconnect all hoses attached to all seacock's after pouring anti-freeze in the fitting, if the vessel will remain in the water during lay up. On the other hand, if stored on shore, leave all seacock's open so they will drain freely. Remember also check the condition of the hoses and clamps (double clamps) as part of this procedure.



Rejoice, Ye Sufferers of Sickness, Whether of Space, Car, or Sea! NASA Has Your Back!



Water filters. Cordless tools. Shoe insoles. The list of life-improving products developed at NASA is long and nerdy and wonderful. And it is, wonderfully and nerdily, about to add a new item: a nasal spray that fights motion sickness.

Yes. Rejoice, ye sufferers of sickness, whether of space or car or sea! NASA has your back.

Motion sickness, of course, is a long-standing problem for astronauts -- particularly those on the space station, who spend much of their time flipping and flopping in the stomach-tossing environs of zero gravity. And NASA researchers have found that nasal sprays can work much more quickly -- and much more reliably -- than other methods to mitigate space's stomach-churning effects. So the agency has contracted with a Epiomed, a California-based pharmaceutical firm, to develop a nasal spray that will fight motion sickness. Because the teamup makes sense! And because you can't spell "nasal" without NASA.

NASA and Epiomed will initially collaborate on clinical trials and work together to ensure that their products are meeting FDA regulations. The agency will then transfer sponsorship of future trials and approvals to Epiomed.

And here's the good news for the Earth-bound: Epiomed is planning to commercialize whatever nose-born stomach-soother emerges from the collaboration. Soon, if all goes according to plan, we'll all be able to end motion sickness with a spray. And we'll all have NASA to thank for it.


