I hope all had the chance to partake of the Flag Raising and the Blessing of the Fleet. Thanks go out to Bud Bishop and Joe Livingston for their efforts in coordinating the events.

Quick note in response to questions about the cannon. Here is a reprint of the write-up by John Heinz: It's not just any cannon but a British deck gun from the early 1800s salvaged by former OYC members Dennis and Joyce Moeller, who had the brass cannon cleaned and mounted in its present gun carriage. The cannon has been used in OYC Flag Raisings since 1988. In May, 1989, when the Moeller's left the Washington, DC, area, they generously donated the cannon to OYC. For some years in the late 1980s and early 1990s, the cannon was

proudly displayed on OYC Commodore Merilyn and John Piper's 60-foot motor yacht, Dunmoen. From what I can gather, given the bore size, it was most likely a swivel gun or signal cannon.



As our season is well underway, I'd like to take a moment to welcome our new members as well as all of the other repeat offenders / returning members. © As an aid to the new members and as incentive to new volunteers, I'd like to take this opportunity to briefly explain the positions of your Board / Bridge (with an attempt at a comparison to corporate positions). The full explanation of the positions will be available on the website.

The Board is comprised of the Executive Board and the Appointed Committee Chairs. The General Membership elects the Executive Board, and the Commodore appoints the Chairs.

# The Executive Board:

<u>The Commodore</u> (Chief Executive Officer) is the principal leader of OYC and should place due emphasis on leadership, overall administration of the club and winning The Cup!

The Vice Commodore (Chief Operations Officer) is the principal assistant to the Commodore, is second-in-command and maintains overall coordinating responsibility of OYC's cruising and land-based events. The Vice Commodore is also responsible for the management and coordination of the Fleet Captains and will serve as the next Commodore.

The Rear Commodore (Chief Procurement Officer) is primarily responsible for logistical support for club activities, principally land events, while maintaining custody, cleanliness, security and overall responsibility of the club's storage shed. The Rear Commodore provides for the purchase, availability, delivery, recovery and storage of supplies, foodstuffs, utensils, disposable materials and equipment required for support of club events on land and will serve as the next Vice Commodore.

<u>The Treasurer</u> (Chief Financial Officer) is responsible for accounting for all income and expenses of the club, maintains the club's bank account and club funds, and maintains accountability with and from Event Coordinators regarding the collection and disbursement of funds. The Treasurer requires Event Coordinators to prepare income and expense statements for each event following completion.

The Secretary (General Council) is responsible for records of the club, and any written correspondence by the Board. The Secretary prepares and preserves the minutes of board and general membership meetings and distributes the minutes prior to each board or general membership meeting for approval and retention.

The Immediate Past Commodore (IPC) (Board of Directors) serves as a member of the nominating committee, which prepares a slate for the annual election of officers. The IPC serves as a non-voting member of the Executive Board and maintains a clearly understood historical record of the Board to guide successor Commodores in carrying out their duties.

# **The Appointed Committee Chairs:**

<u>The Membership Chair</u> (Director Human Resources) maintains all membership records and responds to all requests for membership.

<u>The Daymarker Editor</u> (Director Advertising / Marketing) is responsible for all processes, which culminate in the production and delivery of *The Daymarker*.

<u>The Quartermaster</u> (Director Sales) is responsible for the purchase and resale of OYC burgees, clothing, jewelry and other membership articles as directed by the Executive Board.

The Historian (Director Graphic Arts) maintains all OYC photographic archives. The Historian shall periodically display recent pictorial history to members assembled for local OYC events. The Historian is responsible for taking and collecting pictures of the OYC events and providing pictures to the Daymarker Editor and Webmaster.

The Fleet Captains (Business Development) are responsible for encouraging boaters operating out of their respective marinas to become OYC members. Fleet Captains shall perform liaison duties between their respective marinas and the Executive Board.

The PRYCA/CBYCA Delegate (Director Customer Relations) maintains inter-club relationships and interfaces with the Potomac River and Chesapeake Bay Yacht Club Associations. The Delegate shall attend the PRYCA Commodore's Call and all major PRYCA events if possible.

<u>The Webmaster</u> (Head Geek) is responsible for all processes, which culminate in the production and maintenance of the OYC website. The Webmaster shall ensure the display of information as directed by the Executive Board.

I hope this brief description of the roles and responsibilities will help you in the coming season and spark interest in becoming a part of the Board.

Speaking of the website, changes will be coming to the site this month as we work to protect personal information with the unveiling of the Members Only section. Members will be provided their login information in the coming weeks. The new section will include the following: Board Meeting Minutes, Current Daymarker, Daymarker Archives, Event Photos, Cruise List with contact information, OYC Directory, Board Roles and Responsibilities, and other information...

# From the Captain's Chair of Hi-Jinx2

Typically, all of us on the board tend to outline the same upcoming events in our articles—so to make it more reader friendly, we are taking pains to do the opposite. From the Rear Commodore's perspective, the landbased events are the focus and the events that are on our calendar include many of these. Most important are the competitive events at the Float-In—prior preparation will prevent xxxx-poor performance, as they say. SO, areas of interest in the competition are: getting your safety inspection (see p. 8), knot-tying, navigation rules, scavenger hunt (know what is on your boat and where it is—the more junk the better), throwing a lifepreserver (you should probably break yours out and throw it once a year for practice—it is an art, and it will save a life), and donning a life vest in the water (you should practice that once a year as well). Other important, life-saving, land-based events (or at least events while still tied to land):

- Check the water in your batteries (monthly)
- Shoot one of your out-of-date flares into the water, away from people and things. (yearly)
- Try lighting one of your out-of-date flares remember how to do it? Night, bad weather is not the time to try to remember. (yearly)

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- Re-check your oil level. (today!)
- Once free of land: teach your first mate how to do the Williamson turn. Yes, let the first mate drive...after checking around you that there are no boats headed your way.

The **Williamson turn** is a maneuver used to bring a ship or boat under power back to a point it previously passed through, often for the purpose of recovering a man overboard. It was named for <u>John Williamson</u>, USNR, who used it in 1943. However, according to *Uncommon Carriers* by <u>John McPhee</u>, the maneuver was originally called the "Butakov pipe" and was used in the <u>Russo-Japanese War</u> as a way of keeping guns at the same distance from an enemy.

The Williamson turn is most appropriate at night or in reduced visibility, or if the point can be allowed to go (or already has gone) out of sight, but is still relatively near. For other situations, an Anderson turn (quickest method) or a Scharnow turn might be more appropriate. The choice will in large part depend on prevailing wind and weather conditions. It was also used by U.S. Navy nuclear submarines to clear their sonar dead zones.

- 1. Put the rudder over full.
- If in response to a man overboard, put the rudder toward the person (e.g., if the person fell over the starboard side, put the rudder over starboard full).
- 3. After deviating from the original course by about 60 degrees, shift the rudder full to the opposite side.
- 4. When heading about 20 degrees short of the reciprocal, put the rudder amidships so that vessel will turn onto the reciprocal course.
- 5. Bring the vessel upwind of the person, stop the vessel in the water with the person alongside, well forward of the propellers

If dealing with a man overboard, always bring the vessel upwind of the person. Stop the vessel in the water with the person well forward of the propellers.

# SHIPBOARD FIRE

The recent and ongoing news of troubled cruise liners got me thinking about a 1965 fire aboard a Panamanian registered cruise ship, the SS Yarmouth Castle. Before you wonder if I am older than dirt to have recalled that terrible incident, I confess to learning of it as a child through the haunting song The Ballad of the Yarmouth Castle sung by Gordon Lightfoot, a much-beloved Canadian folk singer.

SS Yarmouth Castle was on route from Miami to Nassau, Bahamas in November 1965 when fire broke out in the 'forward staircase area' and quickly spread fore and aft. Lightfoot's words evoke heartbreaking images of that terrible night on the seas for passengers and crew. The survivors were rescued through the heroic actions of the crews of *Finnpulp* and SS *Bahama Star*, the *Castle's* sister ship which had been on a track 12 miles behind the *Castle*. The Finnish freighter,

Finnpulp, came alongside the port side of the furiously burning Castle and pulled survivors off, staying in place until the paint on the deck began to smoke and bubble. (..."Jump down! Jump down," the captain cries, "We'll save you if we can." And the paint on his gunnels is a-fryin") The Bahama Star launched its lifeboats and pulled them up on the starboard side of the burning ship. The final death toll was 90 people, 87 of whom went down with the ship. Only two of the dead were crew members.

The tragedy was investigated by the US Coast Guard through a Marine Board of Investigation, even though the ship was in international waters when it burned and despite its Panamanian registry. The ship was old and was exempted from many of the existing safety regulations of that time. In November 1968 Public Law 80-777 (R.S. 4400 (c); 46 U.S.C 362 (c), Fire Safety Standards for Foreign and Domestic Passenger Vessels, came into effect. This law required the Coast Guard to verify that foreign cruise vessels entering US waters and ports complied with the 1966 fire safety amendments.

The Coast Guard documents are fascinating to read but the lyrics and music of Gordon Lightfoot's song convey the story more viscerally. The story of this fire is a 'safety first' reminder to us pleasure boaters—although we don't carry large numbers of guests, unlike the cruise liners. Still, it's a good idea for all of us to check our fire emergency plan, to share it with the guests aboard our boat and to check our fire extinguishers. Do you have a robust fire extinguisher in your sleeping area? In the cockpit? In the guest guarters? Is the needle in the green or is it hovering at or in the red zone? Do you have an escape hatch in your sleeping area big enough to let you out if there is fire between you and the main hatch? How about the guest state room? How will the guests get out? Do they have a fire extinguisher that they can use, if they have to get out via the main hatch? How about wool fire blankets—where are thev?

Now that the boating season is truly underway, think of fire safety and take proactive steps to minimize the danger and likelihood of an on-board fire. Here's to having only happy boating memories this year.
