Thanks to the efforts of our 2013 Board and past Cruise Coordinators, the 2013 Cruise Calendar is set and the year is planned! The group met for Pre-Planfest and carved out a 2013 cruise itinerary. Once again, almost every weekend for the entire 2013 boating season has something for us.

On February 24th, thanks to the generosity of the Mount Vernon Yacht Club for the use of their beautiful clubhouse, the 2013 OYC Cruise Calendar was rolled out to our club. Given MVYC's harbor location and warm weather, we all walked away primed for an exciting year. If you missed it, please fill out the Sign-Up Sheet I emailed to you and send it back to me ASAP.

After the general meeting on March 16 and a trip to Madigan's on the 17th, we begin our cruise calendar in April with the Early Bird Cruise to see the Cherry Blossoms. The cruise to Gangplank Marina is set for April 5th to the 7th. It's a great opportunity to check out Washington's Cherry Blossoms with great friends and without the traffic. The Predas will provide all the info.

May begins the official opening of the 2013 boating season with our OYC Flag Raising on Saturday, May 4, at OHM (Occoguan Harbor Marina). A week later is the ORMA Blessing of the Fleet on Saturday, May 11. May continues with three Memorial Day Cruises to choose from. All three cruises are from May 24 to the 27th. The 1st is OYC's traditional Memorial Day Cruise to Colonial Beach. (As noted in my Feb 6 email, be sure to call Colonial Beach at 804-224-7230, ask for Robin and say you are with OYC to sign up early, as the slips may be limited at the Colonial Beach Yacht Center. There may be other slips available at nearby marinas.) The venue will include our annual pilgrimage to the Berry Farm and Ingleside Winery, along with dock happy hours. The 2nd is the Memorial Day Cruise to Solomon's Island. Please see Scott Del Monte's article. The 3rd is the Memorial Day Raft-Up in Nomini Bay led by Mike and Karen Crouch. Tough choices.

June is a less stressful month (choice-wise) as it kicks off with a Margarita/Fajita Fest at OHM on Saturday, June 8. On June 14-16, we have the PRYCA Cobb Island Summer Kick-Off cruise. Remember to participate in the scavenger hunt for the beads! If you don't have your stowaway bikes, hitch hiking may be your mode of travel. From Cobb Island, Pat and Harry Croft will begin a three-part, three-week Lower-Bay Cruise from June 16th to July 7th. Harry will provide additional details. This is a great opportunity for newbie's to explore the Chesapeake Bay with a seasoned Captain. July is another multiple-choice month. The July 4 holiday offers our club many choices. In addition to the Norfolk portion of Harry's cruise, AI Jorsey will lead the OYC staple, the raft-up off of Capitol Yacht Club as the 2nd option. John DeDitius will lead a raft-up near the 14 Street Bridge as the 3rd option. The final option is the float-in at Washington Marina, but it is tentative due to the shuffling of boats from Gangplank due to the construction. The difficulty will be in deciding where you want to celebrate our country's 237 birthday! July 12-14 is the PRYCA Float-in at either Coles Point or Port Kinsale. Stay tuned for the latest news. Last year, besides capturing The CUP (THE CUP!), Coles Point proved to be an ideal location with accommodating facilities, good food, sandy beaches and illuminating moon rises. This year, regardless of venue, the same is on our scope. The weekend is the perfect time to get to know our other PRYCA clubs that share our waters, and show them which club is the BEST. Following the PRYCA Float-In, the next two weekends in July (20-21 & 27-28) are open, though Aguapalooza may be held on the 20-21st. The weekends are available for anyone to suggest a raft-up, or particular cruise that has not has not been scheduled.

August begins with an Old Town Alexandria excursion (Aug 2-4), a cruise designed with something for everyone. Old Town has some of the best pubs around for the men to hang while the women shop (till the men drop). Restaurants there are great, and the Saturday morning Farmers Market is one not to miss. Note this market does not allow pets, but they have a good range of produce (flowers, veggies, fruit), fresh baked bread, roasted nuts and pretzels, goat cheese, handmade soaps, handmade jewelry and specialty sauces, dips and pastas. August (16-18) is the PRYCA Dog Days Cruise to Aguia Harbor. For those who have never meandered up to Aguia Harbor, this is a real treat! The trick is to plan your cruise at high tide. But for those who get there when you can, be careful around the lily pads (hydrilla) and cautiously follow the day markers. You will be ok. The one phrase that I always hear going up Aquia Creek is "Are we there yet?" The weekend will prove to be a memorable one with the main course being Hospitality! For those of you who just can not get enough of the Bay this year, Tom Plewes is offering to lead the charge for a Solomons/St. Michaels/Cambridge/Pt. Lookout cruise August 23-30. What a wonderful opportunity to visit some of the prime Bay locations with great friends.

Now, back to the multiple options... there are again three choices for the Labor Day weekend of Aug 30 - Sep 2. Labor Day cruises include the popular cruise to Corinthian and the hot Tall Timbers cruise for the Boat Burning! Even though they are separate destinations, those of you who stay at the luxurious Corinthian but want to see the Boat Burning at the more rustic Tall Timbers, a short hop over for the festivities is planned! There will be a Tangier to Crisfield trip with information provided by Larry Freedman, leaving for Tangier on the 28th of August, eventually arriving in Crisfield just in time for the world's only crab races and crab boat docking contest on Labor Day weekend. If you can imagine a 600-horsepower crab boat, slamming the engine in reverse to back up between two pilings, then this is the adventure for you! Tangier Island, in itself, is a trip back to times lost, a must-see-to-believe location.

September starts off with our Shrimp Fest at Hoffmaster's on the 14th. Go Nats! September 20-22 is our annual trip up to the game. The cruise will go to James Creek or Gangplank Marina. Stay tuned for an update from Mike Crouch. Plan on Saturday the 21th, an evening game against the Marlins. Either marina offers an ideal location to walk over to the stadium and enjoy the game, food and beverages. Other modes of transportation will be available to and from the marina to the stadium. September 27-29 is the cruise to National Harbor Oktoberfest! This cruise has alwavs been a favorite for those Jägermeister-loving pirates! As where most of our cruises are ones to remember, this one is hard to remember! (Remember, brain cells grow back...) Tickets must be purchased separately for the Oktoberfest via on line. Tickets sell out fast; so once announced. I encourage those interested to buy your tickets early. If you dock your boat at OHM. September closes with the slip-holders' appreciation party.

October (11-14) begins the wind-down of 2013 cruises with the PRYCA End of Summer Cruise. As of this writing the location of the cruise has not been finalized; so again, stay tuned for an update. October 19 is our Election Meeting/Chili Cook-Off. Toward the end of October. around the 20th, our own Snow Goose, Tom Lensis, is planning a ten-day trip to Florida. Tom noted that any boat wishing to follow him down the ICW, contact him. Tom and Donna we will be leaving from Wilmington NC and end up in Stuart FL. They try to go outside, in the ocean if the weather is good and travel inside the ICW when the wind is up. The trip usually takes about a week from Wilmington depending upon the weather. Sometimes they might stay for an extra day when they reach a nice destination like Charleston SC. They have a nice marina picked out in Stuart that rents slips by the day, week, month or year... Loggerhead Marina. They usually use Stuart as a base, so they can take trips to Bimini, Bahamas, East Coast of Florida and through Lake Okeechobee to Ft. Myers and the Gulf of Mexico.

Okay you Hardy Souls, mark November 8-11 down! As in recent years, the Hardy Souls cruise to National Harbor has been anything but "hardy." But 2013 just may be the year to pull out that windbreaker and long johns! Saturday, November 30th is the Santa Cruise.

Finally, December 7 will be our OYC Holiday/Change of Watch Party. Well... there you have it. An awesome Cruise Packed 2013 OYC year.

Let there be a 63 mph wind!

The final instalment of articles on wind, waves and weather focuses on the construct of "wind setdown," a process that is defined as a significant drop in water level caused by winds acting on the water's surface over a long period of time. "Wind setdown" is the latest proposed scientific explanation for the Old Testament's parting of the Red Sea and was unveiled in 2010 at the National Center for Atmospheric Research and the University of Colorado as part of a master's thesis by Carl Drews with assistance from the National Science Foundation.ⁱ Using computer models, scientists were able to propose a scientific explanation for the 3000year-old mystery and re-ignite debate as to whether natural forces could have caused the parting of the Red Sea. Earlier theories included tsunamis and volcanic eruptions as possible natural events that caused the parting of the Red Sea, but the violence of these events would not have caused the slow recession of the waters as described in the Bible.

In the Old Testament, Moses and the fleeing Israelites were trapped between a body of water and the Pharaoh's advancing army. With divine intervention, a powerful east wind blew all night and gradually parted the waters, leaving a passage of dry land. The Israelites made it safely across the exposed path but Pharaoh's army was drowned when they attempted to follow.

Scientists and researchers, lead by Carl Drews, studied ancient maps and archeological records of the Nile Delta and used modern satellite measurements that traced the ancient riverbeds. They pinpointed where the Israelites may have crossed—a point south of the Mediterranean Sea where an ancient branch of the Nile flowed into a coastal lagoon. Using a computer-generated model of the ocean and surrounding waters, the researchers simulated the effect a strong, sustained wind would have on the waters, estimated to be approximately six-feet deep in that area. The animation that best fits the descriptions in Exodus shows how a sustained east wind of 63 mph blowing for 12 hours would have driven the waters back into the lake and river, exposing a land bridge of the mud flats that was approximately two miles long and three miles wide for a period of four hours. This opening could have provided an overland escape route for the Israelites. As soon as the winds dropped, the waters would have rushed back, trapping and drowning anyone caught on the land bridge.

According to Drews, "The parting of the waters can be understood through fluid dynamics. The wind moves the water in a way that's in accordance with physical laws, creating a safe passage with water on two sides and then abruptly allowing the water to rush back in. "People have always been fascinated by this Exodus story, wondering if it comes from historical facts. What this study shows is that the description of the waters parting indeed has a basis in physical laws."ⁱⁱⁱ

A more recent similar event in the area occurred in 1882, in the account of a British Army general who reported that a strong easterly wind pushed the water away on Lake Merzaleh, on the west side of the Suez Canal.ⁱⁱⁱ

As amazing as the scientific model is, it does not provide an explanation for everything—the miracle and mystery of this Exodus story are that the wind blew exactly at the right time, with the right velocity and direction and that the Israelites were in the right place at the right time to take advantage of it.

Bayeux Tapestry, Donald's Troosers, and Other Cold-Weather Thoughts

History is a great teacher. Two examples follow.

Chunky Matilda jumps up and down on the dock, calling, "Bye, Billy, give 'em 'ell," as William the Bastard¹, well dressed in warm clothing provided by Matilda, sails off to conquer England. That, with his expected success, she would now be introduced to the social set as "Mrs. Conqueror" rather than "Mrs. Bastard" no doubt lends added enthusiasm to her bounce. The warm clothing protects William from the cold easterly wind and the channel spray flying over his drakkar's bow.

And, at a later time, disgusted British Redcoats watch as pink-bootied Scotts moon them from across the river. This they had just forded by hiking their kilts over their heads, emerging on the far bank pink-cheeked but dry-clothed and little the worse for wear. The accouterments of British military sartorial splendor preclude speedy pursuit, even were their legendary reserve to permit it. A consequence was the banning of kilts from 1745 to 1782, and the replacement of "Scotland the Brave" with "Donald, Where's Your Troosers."

The cold-shrivelled point to all this is avoiding hypothermia, a quickly debilitating condition made much quicker in wet conditions. Heat will transfer about twenty five times faster in water than in air of equivalent temperature. Exactly how much faster depends on body mass (fat people *do* have more insulation), upon clothing which can act as insulation keeping a warm layer of water next to the body and reducing heat loss, and upon general physical condition. Falling overboard, or intentionally entering the water to service something, isn't the only way to invite trouble: a bit of rain, a touch of spray, even clothing that may hold sweat while rowing or paddling can do it. While we will likely see remarkably warm spring days, water temperature will remain consistently cool. At 60 degrees, survival time is only one to six hours, with exhaustion and loss of consciousness occurring long before then.

A missing piece of the Bayeux Tapestry reportedly recorded William's emergency cold weather procedures. Aside from warm clothing, avoiding getting wet, and ensuring a ready means of re-boarding if in the water, it describes the fetal curl and the limbs-to-body stances as means of reducing heat loss. For more than one person in the water, it also describes the Group or Norman Huddle to conserve body heat (and to get to know one another better). It was later adopted by the NFL as a means of staying warm on the field and, with time, lore developed that through it play strategy was imparted to the players. Sadly, at least in the case of the NFL, results show this to be pure myth. A major problem for the Normans was that they had yet to invent PFDs, a real bummer when you consider how much armor they wore.

So if you intend to venture out for an early cruise, please be safe.

¹ Guillaume le Bâtard as he was known, was the illegitimate son of Robert I and Herleva, the daughter of a tanner. He became Guillaume "le Conquérant" after he took up boating, crossed the English Channel, and conquered England. Cruise coordinators, you have a lot to live up to.
