For those of you who may not have participated in a PRYCA Float-In or missed previous articles, this is an annual event put on by the Potomac River Yacht Clubs Association, where member yacht clubs compete in contests designed to promote boater safety and knowledge. The winner gets to keep The Cup until the following year's competition, along with bragging rights for the whole year. This year marks the 28<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Float-In, which was held July 18-20 at Point Lookout Marina. With the theme of *Pirates of the Potomac*, a total 58 boats and over 100 attendees were beyond primed to enjoy the weekend.

Friday began with most boats coming in early on smooth seas with relatively cool temperatures. Despite our efforts, OYC failed to earn a bonus point for 100% of our boats arriving with their VSE decal in place. Friday night found us feasting on a wonderful buffet preceded by the pirate parade and the arrival of OYC's Occoquan Pear!!!!



Saturday morning started with a continental breakfast followed by morning classes that featured *Shell Design* by Peggy Myruski and *Riding the Winter Vortex to South Georgia* by George Cajigal and Polly Parks. The second session included another session of *Shell Design* and *Pirates of the Chesapeake* by Dr. Susan Langley.

At 1130 our two top-notch Navigation and Safety testers, Harry Croft and Jamie Jo Perry, took 3rd place overall. This year's exam included tying four knots, which proved no problem for our seasoned team. At 1345 we began phase two of our guest for The Cup with the Scavenger Hunt. Our OYC team pulled together and found all but two items ten minutes ahead of another team with the same number of items, allowing us to take 1<sup>st</sup> place. It took tremendous OYC teamwork to do so well. Thanks!



With sunny skies and no threat of rain, the Blind Dinghy Race for the Treasure began at 1500. Our team of Dan Kent and Karen Crouch were last to compete, providing an awesome example of giving and following orders, resulting in 2<sup>nd</sup> place.



The Walk-the-Plank – Rescue by Life Ring followed, with our tenacious team of Rich Ellison and Min Lee being the first to compete and taking 4th place.





The final event was the Walk-the-Plank – Rescue by Dinghy event with Mike and Kari Langerman providing an awesome display of athleticism resulting in a 1st

place finish.



At 1800 we began our evening with the great buffet at Spinnakers Restaurant. Following dinner, PRYCA Commodore Chevy Rice and Pat Croft scored the days events; and the winners were... Mount Vernon/D<sup>2</sup> (Debbie and Dan Ruttenberg) won The Cup with 25 total points; OYC took 2<sup>nd</sup> with 23, and Westmoreland came in 3<sup>rd</sup> with 20. After awards, we danced the night away to the 25<sup>th</sup> Hour Band; and then, Sunday's breakfast and liquid refreshments fortified us for the trip home.

### CREW'S NEWS

#### **Our St. Michaels Cruise Adventure**

On the 12<sup>th</sup> of June, Nancy and I embarked on a 11-day, 315-NM cruise to St. Michaels, Maryland, on the Eastern Shore of the Chesapeake Bay. As many of you know, St. Michaels (named after the archangel) is a quaint, small town of about 1,500 residents with touristy shops, fabulous restaurants, old houses dating back more than 200 years, and the Chesapeake Maritime Museum. You can visit a winery and a brewery, then seek redemption at Christ Church (1878) as bells ring each quarter hour.

Our itinerary included outbound stops at Colonial Beach, Port Kinsale and Herrington Harbour South; the return went through Solomons Island, Coles Point and Colonial Beach. As you might expect, a trip of this length and duration came with a number of highs and some lows. The following shares what we now refer to as our St. Michaels adventure.

If you recall, the weather around the Father's Day weekend was very hot and humid. So as to avoid afternoon thunderstorms, our approach for departures was to leave early. Sailboats typically average five to six nautical miles per hour. As such, legs of our trip were purposely scheduled to accommodate midafternoon arrivals. However, no matter how well you and your boat are prepared, bad things can happen on the water.

During our first day out, we ran into a thunderstorm in the early afternoon as we approached the 301 bridge. Winds and rain from the south were so strong that



visibility was reduced to about three or four boat lengths. With an open cockpit as shown in the attached photo, I felt like I was in a car wash. Although the rain finally stopped after about 25 minutes, the wave energy in the river continued almost until our arrival at the Colonial Beach Yacht Center. Finally secure, a couple of drinks and a great dinner made everything better.

Port Kinsale was next. To our surprise, the dockmaster leaves for the day at 2:00 PM, two thirds of the slips were vacant and the marina restaurant was permanently

closed. Now I know why the PRYCA Float-In was moved to Point Lookout. We learned of a restaurant in town, but with no cab service, needed a ride. Fortunately, the restaurant ownership (a man from Arlington) provided transportation. The food was good, we appreciated the hospitality, but something bad is happening at that marina.

With plans to reach Herrington Harbour South and nothing going on at Port Kinsale, it was early to bed. Under the best of conditions, this longest leg of the cruise would have us on the water for about ten hours. While checking the next day's weather, I saw predictions for a Small Craft Advisory (SCA). Winds were forecast out of the north at 16 to 20 knots predicted to end by 2:00 PM. Why is it that we are always going into the wind? Having safely endured SCAs before and really wanting to depart Port Kinsale, I made an ill-advised decision to leave the safety of the marina. I now know that a Small Craft Advisory on the Bay is much more severe than what we experience on the upper Potomac.

Once under way and reaching Point Lookout, it was clear that conditions were getting worse. Sustained winds were in the high teens gusting from 22 to 25 knots with swells, which appeared to be in the range of six to eight feet. White water was coming over the bow and, although motoring with no sails, we were making little if any headway. With the boat being bounced around, we donned life jackets. Nancy later admitted to me that, in all of our years of sailing, this was the first time I said, "We need to put on life jackets".

As we approached the noon hour, the weather was not improving. Knowing that we would not reach Herrington Harbour, I radioed Zahnizer's Yachting Center at Solomons and was grateful that they could accommodate our emergency transient request. This action along with wearing life jackets was obviously the smartest thing I did all day. As it turned out, the SCA was extended to 9:00 PM and continued to blow, even making docking an adventure.

Herrington Harbour South is a bit of a resort along with being a rather large marina. Our trip was uneventful in comparison to the previous day with the exception of now being in the shipping lanes for commercial vessels headed to Baltimore and beyond. Giving them a wide birth and negotiating their wake, all was good. The approach to the marina is basically a shallow, two-lane fairway with a lot of traffic going in both directions. The grounds are manicured with rental accommodations, but the restaurant is very slow and seems to cater to a bar and party crowd. I like fun, but not sure I would return.

Finally it was off to St. Michaels. A moderate wind continued out of the north, which was perfect for our north-easterly heading. The fastest point of sail for sailboats is when the wind comes directly across the beam of the boat. As such, we had a short, delightful

sail to St. Michaels. Because of our OYC membership, I made reservations at the Miles River Yacht Club.



The club shown in the photo, located about one mile north of the city, is first class with several dining rooms, a pool and shower facilities. General Manager, Bob Dean, made us feel very welcome.

We had several great meals at the Club along with a fabulous lunch at The Inn at Perry Cabin, the hotel featured in the movie, Wedding Crashers. With a couple of drinks, the entrée, dessert and tip, the cost was a neat \$100.00. Harry Croft also warned me about a jewelry store in town called the Deep Blue Sea. We did see a beautiful opal necklace in the shape of a sailboat that we initially didn't buy, but is now on order. All in all, a great two-day stay.

It now was time to start the journey home. With winds this time out of the west and an outgoing tide, we had a wonderful sail back to Solomons. Zahnizer's is a first-class marina with a pool, an excellent on-site restaurant (see photo), mechanics, a laundry and individual shower facilities. During our two night stay, Nancy shopped and visited the Calvert Marine Museum and Drum Point Lighthouse. I used the opportunity to have my standing rigging checked; all was good! We enjoyed the pool and highly recommend their Dry Dock restaurant.



Leaving Solomons we again had an outgoing tide with winds now out of the north. All of this had us surfing down the Chesapeake, but again created a helpful beam reach as we started up the Potomac. As we

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approached Coles Point at low tide, we found ourselves in a one-lane fairway in six feet of water. Since we draw 4 feet - 4 inches, I was concerned that we might run aground and block the entrance to the marina. I'm still not sure how two opposing boats negotiate this fairway at the same time. Electing to abort this approach, I called Colonial Beach. The good news was that they had a slip; the bad news was that our current seven-hour trip was extended by another three hours.

Since we made the Memorial Day Cruise with the club last year, we were familiar with Colonial Beach, rented a golf cart and made it a point to have one dinner at the Lighthouse Restaurant... excellent as usual. After two nights, it was time to come home.

Now it's Sunday morning, we have an incoming tide which is good, but absolutely no wind and begin motoring. As we approached the 301 bridge, I noticed the temperature rising with our diesel engine. What is it about me and that bridge? Water appeared to be coming out of the exhaust, but so was some steam. I immediately shut down the engine, checked the antifreeze reservoir and then the raw water pump. What I found was one vane of the impeller broken off and, thank goodness, lodged conveniently in the exhaust of the pump. Having a spare part onboard, I replaced the impeller; and we made the rest of the trip without incident.

#### What we did wrong:

 Made a very poor decision to leave the safety of a marina during a Small Craft Advisory

#### What we did right:

- Filed a Float Plan with neighbors and our marina; reported status each moving day
- Donned life jackets and had a Plan B for seeking shelter during a storm
- Avoided a potential grounding condition at Coles Point
- Diagnosed and repaired the engine overheating with spare parts onboard
- Enjoyed our wonderful and well-built sailing vessel

For sailors, like life, it's about patience and the journey and not just the destination!

Joining the raft this year was *After Hours* (Eric Reuter and Lisa Graybill), *Beach House* (Jim and Pam Poulos), *Hi-Jinx* (Bud and Heidi Bishop), *Makia III* (Mike and Karen Crouch), *Bergie* (Les and Kathy Bergmann), a guest boat (non-member), *Last Syrah* (Mike Schneider and Alithea McKinney, new members), *Persephone* (John and Suzy Cornicelli), *Next Activity* (Jeff and Nadia Lippman, new members), and *Resilient* (Jamie-Jo Perry, new member). Not shown in the picture above is the photographer's boat, *La De Dah* (Chris and Alison Rose), whose boat didn't fit into the raft due to the postraft setting of markers by the USCG... Yes, we had a front row seat with inches to the foul line.

We even had our own Marine Safety activity/course; the crew of After Hours discovered flooding conditions and, in a sea of lights, were trying to get the attention of the nearby fireboat. Unable to distinguish the waving flashlights from all of the other lights in the area, the fireboat responded to red flares sent aloft by other OYCers in the raft. With a bit more assistance from our participants, fireboat members were able to join the raft. pump out the water, stop the leak, and Tow Boat US provided After Hours with a late-night tow back to port. Notes from the event: Broadcast the Mayday / position of your vessel and the number of persons aboard and don life preservers. In a flooding condition, the generator will stop and the batteries will short out once the water covers them — It will be very difficult to find things in the dark and you may not get much notice of the loss of electricity. Therefore, having a handheld radio and an emergency overboard kit with a flashlight and other signalling devices will be important and essential when your boat goes dark (especially if you are anchored or traveling alone).

In this case, members of the OYC raft took over... members directed the fireboat to the boat suffering the casualty, the boat tied alongside posted a watch on the forward and aft lines with knives to cut those lines should the boat go down (avoid damage/capsizing the attached boat – also good to do if you are towing someone and they take on water and sink abruptly-have a knife ready to cut the lines so your boat doesn't follow suit) and other members of the raft (John

Cornicelli and others) helped the fireboat crew de-water the raft, find the leak, and restore the vessel to seaworthy conditions.

We hope Eric and Lisa have their boat underway again soon and come out and join us for a re-do event!

Boating IS fun, although not when you are going through an emergency. And while we appreciate the training event, the PRYCA Float-In competition is much less stressful!!!

Following the 0230 departure of *After Hours* for homeport, the rest of the raft members spent a calm and restful night. On Sunday, all OYCers jumped on Tim's shuttle and went ashore for brunch and bloody marys; then departed and went their separate ways. Some continued the weekend raft at Mattawoman, where they were joined by *Rx to Relax* (Bob Hill and Min Lee), and *Little Ender* (Paul and Monica Fineberg). Overall, it was a busy and event-filled weekend, complete with AWESOME fireworks.

See you next year at Tim's Not-on-the-Fourth-of-July Fireworks 2015! We may try anchoring in Mattawoman next year and use one of the boats to shuttle guests home after the firework display...but more to follow.
