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Commodore's Log – April 1, 2016 *Maydarker*: Hi everybody, while I was preparing my boat to de-winterize I was in my engine room checking all my valves and heard an unnerving noise coming from my hull near the waterline. I went around and

around the boat and just could not figure out what was going on. I also noticed an area near the waterline where my fiberglass was becoming dull and looked a little scratched. But for the life of me I could not figure out what might be causing the noise or the apparent scratching of my fiberglass. So like every good sleuthing boater or boating sleuther I did a straw poll and asked some of my friends their thoughts on it. That's when I learned about Polyestermites and that they may be infecting my boat. So I then went online and found the article below by Don Baker titled 'What To Do About Polyestermites'. As you prepare for de-winterizing please check your fiberglass and listen for scratching sounds near the waterline and below . . .

Not many years ago the entire boating industry and every boater learned about a new problem with fiberglass boats, osmotic blisters. A walk through a boatyard will reveal that the problem is still with us, but boatyards have learned to deal with this expensive problem. At least, a cure was found, and boat builders seem to have developed resins and application methods that have substantially, although not completely, reduced the problem in new boats. And now the Environmental Protection Agency has alerted boaters to a new and equally expensive problem with the gelcoat on fiberglass boats. Like the Zebra Mussels that first invaded the Great Lakes and killed off oysters and clams and completely fouled water intakes on boats, we are now alerted to the problem of Polyestermites. They were first noted in the Bahamas, and then a few were detected in Florida. It is assumed that they were transported to Florida by boats spending the winter in the Bahamas and then returning to Florida in the spring.

Like the Zebra Mussels, they were not native to U.S. waters, but with today's mobile society, critters in one part of the world are easily transported to another. If the environment is hostile the transported species soon die off. The EPA has been tracking the spread of Zebra Mussels for the past several years to see just how far the infestation will spread. There is not much they can do about them at this time, but ocean scientists are still searching for a method to control them.

Nothing has been written in the boating press at this point about Polyestermites. However, this spring their infestation was noted as far north as Rhode Island. Scientist had thought that Polyestermites could not survive in the colder northern waters, but the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection has now issued an alert for New Jersey boaters. An obscure article in the Federal Register has not received much attention by the press, but you can be certain that the pages of our boating magazines will soon carry large, bold headlines about this new problem for boaters.

So what the heck are Polyestermites, and what is the problem. They are small barnacle-size snail-like creatures that attach themselves to bottoms of boats, pilings and bulkheads. They seem to have an affinity for boats, however, because most are now made of fiberglass. Other than their slimy appearance, they do no damage to pilings and bulkheads. Fiberglass boats, however, are another matter. Polyestermites are not deterred by antifouling paints, and, in fact, they seem to thrive on it. They eat their way through bottom paint, and then have gelcoat for desert. They seem to secrete a substance that dissolves gelcoat into a paste that is then consumed. What is left are areas about the size of a dime where the gelcoat is completely gone leaving the fiberglass and resin exposed to salt water. Interestingly, Polyestermites cannot survive in fresh water, but most of us operate our boats in salt water.

The Federal EPA has prepared a twenty-page booklet fully explaining Polyestermites, and the procedure for their detection and repair of their damage. It also discusses preventive measures we can take to prevent their damage.

Whereas New Jersey is just now being invaded by Polyestermites, it is something with which we boaters will have to deal. The EPA says this booklet will be placed on its web site, but that probably will not occur until winter. In the meantime, we can obtain copies from the EPA in Washington. If you would like to have a copy of the free booklet, you may order one through my email address, or by leaving your name on my answering machine at the number listed in the roster.

Once the gelcoat is consumed and the fiberglass and resin exposed to the water, the water begins to degrade the fiberglass resulting in expensive repair. Repair is similar to that for osmotic blisters. The gelcoat has to be taken down to the fiberglass, and several coats of special resin that these pests seem to abhor has to be applied, and the bottom then painted with antifouling paint. Whereas the antifouling paint itself will still be attacked by Polyestermites, they cannot penetrate into the fiberglass. And since most of us haul our boats during winter, other than pockmarks in the paint, no further damage is done.

Along with the news of the IPC's new yacht, I felt it important to share the latest in nautical terms. There will be a test at the next membership meeting.

Aft - Acronym for Automatic Flotation Thing. The Coast Guard requires that you have a **p**ersonal **f**lotation **d**evice for each member on board, like the ones that are *supposed* to inflate automatically when you hit the water (and you will) to prevent drowning.

Adrift - A method of moving across the water when nothing on your boat works (or your propellers have fallen off). You normally do not have a lot of input as to where you are actually going, but you can get there.

Anchor - A mechanical device that is supposed to keep the boat in one place (see dragging). These devices are sometimes used to submerge expensive anchor lines and chain when used without proper termination at both ends of the anchor line.

Bilge - This is a storage area in the bottom of the boat for all the things you dropped and cannot find. Also a mixing area for water, fuel and head output, making retrieval of said dropped items a real adventure.

Bilge pump - An electrical device designed to remove the charge from your batteries. These devices only operate properly when the boat is not taking on water.

Bow - This is what you do in front of your banker when you are asking for more money to spend on your boat. As your boat will surely cost much more than what you initially asked for, it is imperative that you learn how to do this quickly.

Bridge - Something you cross to get to the other side of a body of water when you do not have a boat available. Can also be used for removing masts of sailing vessels if the bridge is low enough.

Buoy – A navigational aid indicating there is something worth noting somewhere close to the location of the buoy, possibly to one side or the other or below it.

Chart - The nautical equivalent of a road map. One must use charts instead of road maps because road maps usually only show roads and there are usually none of those in the water and besides you couldn't drive your boat on one anyway unless you had it on a trailer in which case you would need a road map instead of a chart. **<u>Crew</u>** - This term refers to the people working on your boat. They are usually friends or acquaintances who do not find out about the "work" part of the ride until you are away from the dock. Crews have a high turnover rate; they normally will never want to see you again, let alone set foot on your boat.

Dragging - A method of moving about when the anchor is deployed (see anchor).

Keel - A stopping device for your boat. It works by contacting the bottom of the water body you are in, thus inhibiting forward motion.

No Wake Zone - An area of a waterway in which you are prohibited from waking people who may be sleeping.

OYC South Can't Find Wilmington – Shakedown Cruise Rescheduled

OYC South had quite a scare today when we started out on our Shakedown Cruise to Wilmington. According to the past trips, this should have only taken us an hour, but the GPS and Chart Plotter indicated a five-day trip. We convened a quick captains' meeting before leaving the dock to discuss our options. The brain trust of Ned, Rick, Tom and the two Steves brought out their charts and various cruising guides and began to analyze the plotted route. After an hour of heated debate, the problem was narrowed down to an interpretation of the Indian name of the river on which Wilmington was founded.

The two Steves said that the Lenape (/ləˈnɑːpi/) are a Native American tribe and First Nations band government. They are also called Delaware Indians after their historic territory along the frequently mountainous landscapes flanking the Delaware River watershed. As a result of disruptions and political will of the white population following the American Revolutionary War and later developments such as the oft-voiced attitudes later termed manifest destiny, which in part led to the Indian removals from the eastern United States, the main groups now live in Ontario (Canada), Wisconsin, and Oklahoma. The Delaware Tribe of Indians have gone on to establish many fine casinos that have contributed much to the local economy. In addition, their Indian Taco Night and Auction are wonderful activities.

Ned and Rick argued that the Cape Fear Indians were a small tribe of Carolina Algonquian Native Americans who lived on the Cape Fear River (now Carolina Beach State Park). Their name for the area was Chicora. Of their villages, only one, Necoes, is known by name. The colonists noted Necoes as located about 20 miles from the mouth of the Cape Fear River, in present-day Brunswick County. It was estimated that the tribe's population in 1600 was 1,000. A colonial census in 1715 recorded that they numbered 206. Some Cape Fear Indians fought under Colonel John Barnwell against the Tuscarora in 1712. The remaining Cape Fear Indians were not defeated, but they retreated and left the area by 1725. Surnames among the group- Graham, Bryant, Jacobs, Bowen, Young, Lacewell, Freeman, Brown, Moore, Spaulding, Blank, Webb, Campbell, Lensis and many more families.

It was finally determined that Lensis had put in the coordinates for Wilmington, DE, instead of Wilmington, NC. By then it was too late to depart and we all agreed to start fresh the next day.

For those of you who couldn't attend, we were provided fairly thorough updates from the Board members and staff, especially regarding boating swag (from the Quartermaster), cruises, land events, and other club business. Every channel on VHF radio has a specific purpose. Channel 16 is for hailing and distress messaging only. It is meant to be monitored all the time while underway to assist in emergencies if necessary, to hear Coast Guard alerts for weather and hazards or restrictions to navigation, and to hear another vessel

hailing you. This channel should never be used for casual conversation or performing a radio check. Please keep in mind that you could (without even knowing it) be preventing someone from reaching help in a disaster.

Obscene or objectionable language, transmission of music, and subversive transmissions are forbidden. There are individuals monitoring the airwaves, and the Coast Guard can locate the origins of signals. The consequences can be severe. Children should be taught proper radio use and should never be left unattended near a radio.

To hail another vessel, simply call the name of the vessel two or three times, followed by your own vessel's name and station ID if applicable. Wait for a response then immediately switch to a working channel. (i.e. depress the microphone key and say "MAKIA 3, MAKIA 3, MAKIA 3, this is Our Therapy on channel 16, over." You must release the key to hear a response. The term "over" let's the listeners know you are releasing the key. The response would be, "Our Therapy, this is MAKIA 3, Switch to channel 68, over." Our Therapy would answer, "MAKIA 3 switching 68." Both vessels switch their radios to 68, hail each other and converse normally. At the end of the conversation, "MAKIA 3 returning to stand by channel 16," or "Our Therapy out." The term "out" signifies that you are terminating the conversation. Never say "over and out." Those are conflicting terms.

All ships should maintain watch on channel 16 (156.800 MHz) when within the service area of a VHF maritime coast station and while at sea. Ships with digital selective calling-equipped VHF marine radios should also keep watch on channel 70. After February 1, 2005 ships over 300 tons and passenger ships will no longer be required to monitor channel 16 but will be required under international law to monitor channel 70 for DSCSS signals.

Vessels not required to carry a marine radio (e.g. recreational vessels less than 65 ft. length), but which voluntarily carry a radio, must maintain a watch on channel 16 whenever the radio is operating and not being used to communicate. Such vessels may alternatively maintain a watch on VHF channel 9 (156.450 MHz), the boater calling channel. Note however that urgent marine information broadcasts, such as storm warnings, are announced on channel 9 only in First CG District waters (northern New Jersey , New York and New England). Only Channel 16 is used as the international hailing and distress frequency.

U.S. vessels required to carry a VHF marine radio, such as commercial fishing vessels, **must** maintain a watch on channel 16 (156.800 MHZ) while underway whenever the radio is not being used for exchanging communications. Every power-driven vessel of 20m/65ft length or greater, every vessel of 100 tons and upward carrying one or more passengers for hire, every towing vessel of 26-ft length or greater, and every dredge and floating plant near a channel or fairway, **must** maintain a watch on **both** VHF channels 13 (156.650 MHz) and 16 (156.800 MHz) while the vessel is underway.

Basics for radio etiquette and protocol include:

- Always monitor channel 16 while underway. Reserve calling on channel 16 for hailing and distress only. If you need to hail a vessel, name the vessel you are calling two or three times, state the name of your vessel and wait. Once the vessel responds, switch immediately to an authorized working channel. (See list.)
 - Éxample: "Vectis, Vectis, Vectis, this is Aleria on channel 16 over." "Aleria this is Vectis." "Vectis, switch to channel 71." "Vectis switching 71." You meet on channel 71 where you can converse normally.
 - The reason to state the channel you are on is that very often people monitor two (dual) or more frequencies and may have forgotten to switch back to 16 after a previous transmission.
- Conduct radio checks on channel 9. This is a hailing frequency for non-commercial and nonemergency traffic.
- Hail commercial vessels on channel 13 if you need to verify their intentions. It's better to discuss a course of action with the captain of a tanker than to create a hazardous situation. Channel 13 is also the channel bridge tenders listen to. If you need to know when the next bridge opening would be, this is the channel on which to hail the bridge operator.
- Working channels for recreational boaters are 67, 68, 69, 71, 72, and 78a. These are also the channels used by many yacht clubs and marinas for their working channels. Use care not to "step on" or interfere with transmission involving yacht races and other events. Note that channel 70 is now authorized only for Digital Selective Calling, an emergency automated distress system mandated by international treaty; channel 70 may no longer be used for voice communication.

Please also keep in mind that the *Mayday call is only for situations in which life or property is in immediate danger*. It is not for calling for help if you've run out of fuel, unless you are in imminent danger (eg, in a channel without an anchor and without alternative propulsion about to go up on rocks). When you call *mayday*, you are setting the search and rescue operations into immediate action. If you run out of fuel, run aground, or have an engine problem that is not an immediate threat, hail your towing service or the local Coast Cuard for referral to the local towing service. You may also consider issuing a *securite* warning to other vessels. If you perceive danger, but it's either not identifiable or not imminent, you may issue a *pan pan* which gets everyone to listen up for further updates. So the sequence of radio distress calls is as follows:

Least threatening: Securite, securite, securite (you are towing someone and have restricted maneuverability, and you want all others to avoid you or to let you know if there's a potential issue)

Moderately threatening: *Pan pan, pan pan, pan pan* (you have grounded and believe you may be taking on water slowly or are a hazard to navigation)

Immediate danger and distress: *Mayday, mayday, mayday* (your ship is going down, you've lost someone overboard, your vessel is being smashed on rocks, etc.) Note: On HAM radio frequencies, *Break, Break, Break* is the equivalent of *Mayday, mayday, mayday.* Never use the term "Break" three times unless there is immediate threat to life or property.

These rules apply to **all** foreign vessels, recreational vessels, federal government and military vessels as well as commercial vessels, operating within U.S. territorial waters. These rules also apply to vessels on the Great Lakes and their connecting and tributary waters.

Flag Poles and Mounts

The poles are designed to fly a 12" club burgee and are made of solid machined 316 stainless steel with rotating clips and a machined iodized aluminum mount that holds the unit to the rail of your vessel.

The Swiveler flag pole and mount I currently have available is the one-inch size (3 remaining). I will take orders for other sizes; and depending on number of requests, I will send in one more orders this season. Price remains \$65 per set for the 19" 316 Stainless pole and the anodized aluminum mount milled to specific diameter.

To order for your vessel, send me an email and indicate how many sets you wish to purchase, indicating the exact diameter of your rail (measure...do not guess). I find it easiest to use an adjustable wrench slid over the rail and then measure the opening of the wrench. Many rails are 1", 1-1/8", or 1-1/4" in diameter, and size does matter for a good fit.
