thoughts and prayers reach out to the families in Waverly, VA, who suffered terrible damage as a result. I hope everyone in our OYC family survived without any damage to your homes and boats. Hopefully this is all a sign of warmer weather to come as we close out the winter of 2016.

I want to thank everyone who was able to attend the Planfest this year and join the fun and camaraderie in reviewing the list of events coming this season for OYC. We have many opportunities to get together throughout the year with land events and boating activities, and I look forward to any number of impromptu raftups. That time of the year is just around the corner when our marinas will re-pressurize their water systems and we can get down to the docks and begin re-opening our boats in earnest. I've seen several folks down on various docks throughout the winter, checking on their boats. Now we'll start moving stuff back onboard from the garage, restock food and beverages, clean and wax, perform maintenance of all sorts and ... wait for it ... start up those engines and clear out all the pink juice. Of course there is all kinds of pink juice to eliminate from the fresh water systems too!

In the meantime our board is planning for the annual Flag Raising including invites to VIPs and local dignitaries. We will also be inviting boat inspectors so you can get your annual inspection at this event at the beginning of the season. If you aren't able to attend, or it doesn't make sense to bring your boat, you might consider checking with your respective marina offices and see if they have scheduled a weekend for inspectors to be present. If not, you can personally schedule an inspector with the Coast Guard Auxiliary. The URL below provides contact information for those personnel available nearest you:

There are a number of good and important reasons to get an inspection, beginning with the biggest - SAFETY! This simple 45-minute inspection will give you peace of mind about the condition of your boat and your safety equipment before you get out on the water and perhaps experience an anomaly you aren't ready for. Further, this year, we are asking that all boats that want to participate in an OYCbacked raft-up kindly have their sticker displayed so the other boat owners in the group know everyone has done their part for safety. And, on that note, if we all show up at the Summer Float-In being thrown in July by the Potomac River Yacht Clubs Association (PRYCA) we will receive bonus points as a club for the competition for The Cup!

Now for a quick pause to include a few words about Rafting Courtesy from our Cruise Coordinator Handbook and Immediate Past Commodore Bud Bishop: Captains should always seek permission to raft up against another boat. Captains should not join that boat until the host captain has waved them in—he/she will need to ensure bumpers are out and set at the right height and rig lines if they haven't already done so. In seeking permission, captains should understand that permission to join may not be given – and there really is no recourse when that occurs, If this happens at Georgetown or at the Occoquan town dock and you are refused permission to raft alongside, consider asking other boats up the line or simply anchor in a safe area and utilize a dinghy to move to the dock. As a matter of courtesy, I will almost always try to host someone needing to join – times when I won't is when I am getting ready to leave (and then I'll give them an ETA in case they want to stand off and take my place) or when I don't know the boat and I don't see their safety sticker (anything that happens will directly affect me and my boat if they are made fast alongside).

Finally, it is a good time now to start talking to your friends who boat and encourage them to join OYC. It is a great way to enjoy boating and be a part of a bigger group on the river. And safety in numbers counts a lot for newer and beginner boaters. I look forward to seeing you all at upcoming meetings and Happy Hours – and our next big event, the General Membership Meeting and Photo Contest on March 19!

It's that time of year when we are all getting ready for the new boating season!! What can you do to ensure a safe boating experience? While accidents do happen, knowledge and preparation go a long way toward returning to the dock safely. Embrace these boating safety best practices to

help you prevent boating accidents. If the worst does happen in spite of your best efforts - you will have at least increased your chances of survival.

1. Always Wear a Life Jacket

The U.S. Coast Guard requires that you carry an approved personal floatation device, or life jacket, for each person aboard your vessel. I recommend wearing a life jacket at all times while boating because you never know when an accident may occur. Statistics show nine of ten drowning victims may have survived a capsizing or fall overboard if they had been wearing a life jacket, so choose a life jacket you will wear.

2. Know Your Boat

Knowing your boat is the foundation of good seamanship, which is simply the skill of managing a boat and encompasses: navigation; safety; boat handling; line handling; anchoring; troubleshooting engine problems; and appropriate emergency response.

3. Take a Boating Safety Course

Eighty-five percent of boating fatalities involve operators who did not have formal boating education. A boating course will teach you the basics of seamanship mentioned above. The knowledge you will gain by taking a boating safety course will never be wasted.

4. Boat Sober

Using alcohol is even more dangerous on the water than on land because the marine environment accelerates impairment. In boating deaths attributed to alcohol use, over half capsized or fell overboard. Besides the safety risks, boating while intoxicated, or BUI, is illegal and heavy penalties are enforced by both state and federal agencies.

5. Know the Navigation Rules

Aids to navigation such as buoys and day boards help us navigate potentially dangerous waters. Learn to read nautical charts, and keep them on your vessel to become familiar with the area in which you boat. Taking a boating safety course is the next step, where you will learn to navigate using charts, GPS, RADAR, and a compass.

6. Get a Free Vessel Safety Check

The U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary and the United States Power Squadron will inspect your boat free of charge and provide valuable guidance to help you meet the federal minimum safety requirements.

7. Equip Your Boat with a VHF Marine Radio

The U.S. Coast Guard recommends using VHF marine radio Channel 16 as your primary distress signaling device. A VHF radio equipped with DSC will generate a position to the Coast Guard in the event of an emergency, which can quicken rescue. Cell phones are not reliable enough to stake your life on.

8. Use the Kill Switch Lanyard

If you are the operator of a boat, wear a kill switch lanyard while driving. If you fall overboard or lose your balance, the boat will shut off automatically, possibly saving your life or someone else's.

9. Keep an Anchor on Board

Anchors aren't just for mooring up in a secluded cove – they have real safety application in less than ideal scenarios while boating. Anchoring if your boat is adrift due to engine failure can be life saving.

10. File a Float Plan

No boater leaves the dock expecting problems, but if trouble comes your way, filing a float plan with a loved one or friend can hasten rescue, and in some cases mean the difference between life and death.

Flag Poles and Mounts

Members,

The poles are designed to fly a 12" club burgee and are made of solid machined 316 stainless steel with rotating clips and a machined iodized aluminum mount that holds the unit to the rail of your vessel.

The Swiveler flag pole and mount I currently have available is the one-inch size (3 remaining). I will take orders for other sizes; and depending on number of requests, I will send in one more orders this season. Price remains \$65 per set for the 19" 316 Stainless pole and the anodized aluminum mount milled to specific diameter.

To order for your vessel, send me an email and indicate how many sets you wish to purchase, indicating the exact diameter of your rail (measure...do not guess). I find it easiest to use an adjustable wrench slid over the rail and then measure the opening of the wrench. Many rails are 1", 1-1/8", or 1-1/4" in diameter, and size does matter for a good fit. attendance at all 2015 Delegates Meetings. As of the time of the meeting, OYC's roster of Club Officers had been updated; however, our Club dues for 2016 had not been received.

The CBYCA Director of State Legislature for Virginia reported three (3) bills that he is following with potential impact on recreational boating: 1) HB 151 Purse Nets: Prohibits fishing for menhaden in certain waters of the Chesapeake Bay and its tributaries. 2) HB 161 Minimum Age for Operating: An individual must be at least 14 years of age and have successfully completed a boating safety education course in order to operate a motorboat of 10 horsepower or greater. 3) HB 285 Oyster Grounds: Dredging projects are allowed that improve, deepen navigation channels as approve by the Virginia Marine Resources Commission.

The Guest Speaker was Dave Skolnick, speaking on USCG virtual aids to Navigation (ATONS). New to the system of ATONS will be "synthetic" and "virtual" as depicted within the AIS system. Evaluation took place in NY and San Francisco in 2014. "Synthetic" are superimposed on existing ATONS and "virtual" will only display on charts, not physically on the water. Effort reduces maintenance cost by the USCG and improves response times. Takeaway: Keep the firmware on your systems updated.

Not to worry, just keep a gallon or two of pink anti-freeze for flushing purposes. If you have a vacu-flush, just turn it on, leave the water pump off, add enough pink, and whoosh!! This way you can enjoy the boat throughout the winter, and you don't have to leave the boat when nature calls!
