Here is what one of our OYC members said about it:

"I received my canary flex yesterday. Took about 5 minutes to setup once app was downloaded. It created a large 9 min video once I triggered movement. The app/account asks for a lot of personal stuff, but the product/s can be used for much more than I need. Download of video was easy and went to my iCloud account once authorized to access it. At home the app still seems to be the cheapest as long as you have an old android or apple smart phone. Motion detection seems to be a bit delayed. I'll increase sensitivity over the weekend."

This past month, some folks were talking about security and I wanted to pass along some ideas that were being discussed.

Was doing some research and here is an option. The setup may be a pain, but I like the rest. Not too expensive, does day and night vision in high def (which you need to identify people), and it has the 2 way speaker so you can scare them off (maybe). The system can be based on motion detection, can sent you alerts and may be viewed by your cell phone. I would not mount the device and I figure I can put the camera in a drawer when not in use and we're only talking about 1 device. If your marina has a good internet system, the reviews on this suggest that installation is difficult so this may not be a good answer.


Electrical Problems?

I often read about how electrical problems can not only be a boat's biggest bugaboo, but also its biggest hazard...as I understand that the majority of boat fires are caused by electrical problems. We bought our old Chris 3 years ago with an updated 120v AC panel that passed all its tests just fine. So what's to worry?

Well, we always had problems keeping both air conditioners running without popping circuit breakers during the heat of the summer, and I'd attributed much of that to the 80 degree river water the pump was circulating for cooling. I'd also assumed the old compressors were drawing too much current, and although new ones would eventually be needed, they should draw less and at least stay running...right???

Well...not so much. As you can see from the pictures, a myriad of sins were committed by her previous owner(s). Into the photo below, the middle circle shows how an overheating wire nearly made us a statistic. Someone in the past ran a 20 amp shore cable about 30' and put the main (home, not ignition protected marine) circuit breaker at the very end. Running electricity that long through undersized cable causes resistance and...you guessed it, generates heat! Heat causes arcing (the dust in the circle on each side) chars the wire (the middle wire should be white, not dark gray), burns through insulation, and voila, it becomes not a question of if, but when!



In this one, notice the yellow insulation that wraps the whole kit & kaboodle? Someone used an exterior shore power cable as part of the main boat wiring! It too is undersized by ABYC standards, and while it works well when used with a waterproof plug on the end, you can see on the black wire where the copper wiring has turned green from heat and corrosion.



In hindsight, the warning signs were there and I knew it...I just didn't realize how close to a disaster we really were. The morale of the story is if you're seeing the signs too, don't wait. Have a certified electrician check it out so you can continue to enjoy our great Yacht Club!

Sunscreen!

Some families have members who are expert plumbers or craftsmen in other specialties. When a need arises, they're a fantastic resource. In our family, Karen's twin brother is a well-respected skin cancer researcher, so we're often warned against the dangers that we face as boaters concerning exposure to the sun.

A couple of interesting statistics... As we grow older, men are 3 times more likely to get skin cancer than women.

In the past three decades, more people have had skin cancer than all other cancers combined.

Since the activity of boating puts us in outdoor situations for large blocks of time, we're all more susceptible to this type of cancer. There is really only one way to protect yourself - stay covered. Covering involves three things - clothes and hats that block UV, sunglasses that block UV, and sunscreen. Let's focus on sunscreen.

There are two basic types of sunscreen - physical and chemical. Physical sunscreens generally contain titanium dioxide or zinc oxide. They sit on top of your

skin to deflect UV rays from penetrating and doing damage. They are often thicker, greasy, and less comfortable. They need total coverage in order to form a shield from the sun. But they last a long time and continue to protect as long as they sit on top of your skin.

Chemical sunscreens contain organic compounds (oxybenzone, octinoxate, octisalate, and avobenzone) that are able to convert UV rays into heat. The heat is released from your skin and you become protected. They are usually thinner and more comfortable. Less is required since a physical barrier is not needed. But they typically need 20 minutes on your skin before they work. They can cause some skin irritation. And because they are consumed through the UV conversion, you have to apply more if you're in the sun. It's this last point that most of us fail to do - re-apply more sunscreen following the directions.

It's also important to recognize that over-exposure to chemicals absorbed by your skin might also create a risk. So it's imperative that you look into the sunscreen you're selecting and make sure that the chemical makeup isn't putting you in contact with substances that are more dangerous than the sun.

Most of us use the chemical sunscreens, yet this last point is one that is often overlooked. Selecting a sunscreen by the lowest price at the nearby Dollar store might not be the healthiest way to proceed. Instead, check out the Environmental Working Group who test nearly all sunscreens every year and produces a report about their finding::

Skin cancer is serious. Read the EWG guide to pick and use the right products for you.

And while we're lucky that Karen's brother can remind us how to stay safe in the sun, wouldn't it have been nice if he'd also taken some classes in holding tank maintenance for his PhD?

Looking for Flag Poles and Mounts???

The Swiveler Flag Pole set is designed to fly the club's 12 " burgee. Many of our members consider this flag pole the best on the market; and the solid machined 316 stainless steel pole, with rotating clips and machined iodized aluminum mount, securely holds and protects the flag. Review at www.originalswiveler.com.

Each set costs \$65, and the mount is milled to a specific diameter. To order, send me an email indicating how many sets you wish to purchase, give the exact diameter of you rail (measure please...do not guess). I find it easiest to use an adjustable wrench slid over the rail and then measure that opening in inches. Many rails are 1", 1-1/8", or 1-1/4" in diameter. Sets are currently available.

The Occoquan community re-invigorated the Blessing of the Fleet in 1999, when the tradition was embraced by the merchants, marinas and yacht clubs of the Occoquan River Maritime Association. Since then, dedicated to safety afloat, the ORMA has launched each new boating season with the Blessing of the Fleet, weather permitting.
