From the Commodore:

There's nothing safe about boating. If you're looking for a safe recreational activity, I'd recommend trying tiddlywinks.

We risk personal injury, damage, loss of boat and life. How many people drowned this year alone on the Potomac River? Looking back five years, there



have been 82 boating fatalities in the State of Maryland since the start of the 2013 season. Of those deaths, only nine victims were wearing a life jacket. Tragedy strikes quickly, from accidents to foul weather. The most gruesome of all boating accidents is getting chopped up in a boats propeller. Captains should never allow guests to sit on the gunnel or on the bow of their boat while underway,

I've seen this too many times, (unless you own a bow rider with forward seating). Guests can easily fall overboard during a quick maneuver or get bounced by another boats wake. Also, crew members working or standing on the swim platform while backing into your slip is inherently dangerous. Falling overboard while docking can suck your first mate into your props or crush them between the boat and dock. When rafting with other boats, typically there's people, floats and lines in the water. Never enter or depart a raft-up unless it's perfectly safe, and all members of the raft-up are aware of you and your boat entering and/or departing.

Wrapping a line around your prop can have serious consequences. Every ship, from small pleasure cruisers to large commercial freighters, operates under the authority of a Captain. The Captain is ultimately responsible, under the law, for the safety of the ship and everyone onboard, to include its safe navigation, cleanliness, and seaworthiness. Practice good seamanship and always strive to be a good safe Captain

Regardless of the risks and perils, we're resolute and we love boating. We live for it. It makes us tick. August has been a great month for boating, so let's keep it going. We had the Dog Days of Summer at Aquia Harbour, the Leukemia Poker Run and The Tides Inn cruise. It don't get much better than that. Much like a fast ball right down the middle of the plate. But more on that one next month.







To order, send me an email indicating how many sets you want and give the exact diameter of your rail (please measure...do not guess) Use an adjustable wrench slid over the rail and then measure that opening in inches. Many rails are 1", 1-1/8" or 1-1/4".



Do You Know How to Report Water-way Hazards? To keep our nation's waterways open and safe, the Coast Guard relies on the input of the maritime community to self-report hazards to navigation, such as discrepancies with buoys, beacons, or debris. The Navigation Center would like to remind all waterway users,

whether professional mariners or recreational boaters, of several options to report waterway hazards:

- Call your local Coast Guard command center via VHF radio
- Call the Navigation Center at (703) 313-5900
- Use the Aids to Navigation Discrepancy Report found on the Navigation Center's website
- Use the Coast Guard boating safety app

If you've never taken a look at the Navigation Center, I recommend you give it a test drive at: https://www.navcen.uscg.gov/ There's lots of interesting information and you can sign up for email alerts!

Safety Alert 13-18

Let us enlighten you about LED lighting! Potential interference of VHF-FM Radio and AIS Reception. The U.S. Coast Guard has received reports from crews, ship owners, inspectors and other mariners regarding poor reception on VHF frequencies used for radiotelephone, digital selective calling (DSC) and automatic identification systems (AIS) when in the vicinity of light emitting diode (LED) lighting on-board ships (e.g., navigation lights, searchlights and floodlights, interior and exterior lights, adornment). Radio frequency interference caused by these LED lamps were found to create potential safety hazards. For example, the maritime rescue coordination center in one port was unable to contact a ship involved in a traffic separation scheme incident by VHF radio. That ship also experienced very poor AIS reception. Other ships in different ports have experienced degradation of the VHF receivers, including AIS, caused by their LED navigation lights. LED lighting installed near VHF antennas has also shown to compound the reception. Strong radio interference from LED sources may not be immediately evident to maritime radio users. Nonetheless, it may be possible to test for the presence of LED interference by using the following procedures:

Turn off LED light(s).

2. Tune the VHF radio to a quiet channel (e.g. Ch. 13).

3. Adjust the VHF radio's squelch control until the radio outputs audio noise.

- 4. Re-adjust the VHF radio's squelch control until the audio noise is quiet, only slightly above the noise threshold.
- 5. Turn on the LED light(s).
- If the radio now outputs audio noise, then the LED lights have raised the noise floor. (Noise floor is generally the amount of interfering signals / static received beyond the specific signal or channel being monitored.)
- 6. If the radio does not output audio noise, then the LED lights have not raised the noise floor.

If the noise floor is found to have been raised, then it is likely that both shipboard VHF marine radio and AIS reception are being degraded by LED lighting.

In order to determine the full impact of this interference, the Coast Guard requests those experiencing this problem to report their experiences to Coast Guard Navigation Center1. Select "Maritime Telecommunications" on the subject drop down list, then briefly describe the make and model of LED lighting and radios effected, distance from lighting to antennas and radios effected, and any other information that may help understand the scope of the problem.
